Additional functions include unassembling instructions and manipulating memory and disk contents. Author of the program and Group Chairman Neil Bennett presented the program. TRACE86 is being released by Morgan Computing Co., Inc.

How to be Rich and Famous

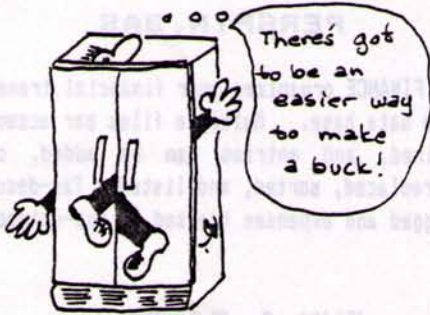

I can make you famous and rich beyond your wildest dreams! Just answer any two of these three questions.

Question #1. Does the light in a refrigerator go off when you close the door?



Preamble to Question #2. I have just discovered the ultimate in display systems for a microcomputer. It is a flat screen device, fantastic resolution, full color, uses no electricity and is very inexpensive to manufacture. It shows a true 3-dimensional image! It's called a mirror.

Question #2, Demonstrate how to hook one of these displays up to any popular micro. Describe the controller circuitry and outline how to write a driver for this display.

Postamble to Question #2. If you have ever had a look in a mirror, you may have noticed that the image is swapped from side to side. This undesirable side-effect has an alienating effect on mankind! Have you ever seen a photograph of yourself and thought it did not look quite like you? The reason is that you are used to seeing yourself in a mirror (and swapped etc.) Look at the photograph in a mirror! It looks better, doesn't it? Here's another example; take someone you know well into the bathroom and look into the mirror together. Your friend will look slightly different, but you will appear to be normal. (Although your friend may not think so).

Extra credit for Question #2. Devise and describe an algorithm to send images to the display without this side-effect.

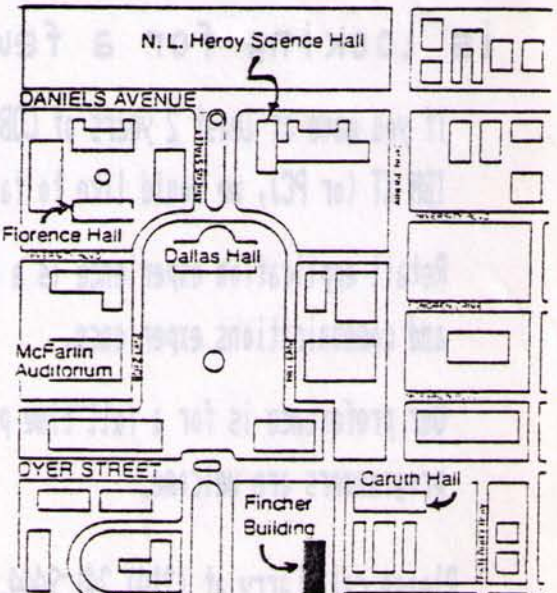
Preamble to Question #3. There is a lot of interest these days in 3-dimensional graphics. Everywhere you

look there are Sopwith Camels and Space Shuttles flying around inside micros. Naturally, for us to see them, they have to be displayed as visual images. See the article in BYTE November 1982 on the theory of perspective images (page 474). If you are a whiz at trigonometry and matrix algebra this will be a breeze for you. Let me assure you there is some heavy number crunching involved. Try this experiment. Get your scale model of a Sopwith Camel (if you don't have your scale model of a Sopwith Camel handy a banana will do), take it in front of your mirror and perform a loop-the-loop and a barrel roll. Note carefully the images displayed (including the automatic hidden line suppression). Estimate how many millions of floating point operations per second are actually being performed by your banana to generate those images with that screen resolution.

Question #3. Devise and describe a graphical computing device which is capable of producing perspective images in real time by the same technique as described in the preamble.

DISK OF THE MONTH

SPECIAL FEATURE: PC-TALK III

An upgraded version of Freeware's famous PC program for asynchronous communications is the highlight of the next Disk of the Month issue. This version requires at least 64K of memory and one disk drive, and provides for sending ASCII and binary files and automatic error checking. The dialing directory has been expanded from 15 to 60 phone numbers, and now includes setup of advanced features such as selective character stripping/conversion. 40 input strings of up to 126 characters each can now be defined using the function keys and their combinations with shift, ctrl, and alt.

A file containing 70 pages of documentation provides complete information on use of the program. This includes a table of contents for fast reference, detailed explanations of each feature, and a brief explanation of communications parameters. An appendix describes the XMODEM protocol for detecting transmission errors and providing block re-transmission when an error occurs.

PC-TALK III is supplied in an interpreter BASIC source code version for systems with 64K of memory and a compiled BASIC version for systems with 128K or more of memory. Batch files are provided for initiating either version.

WILLTELL.BAS

The complete William Tell Overture. A short BASIC program which plays a 4096-byte data file.

PERSFIN.BAS

PC Update

The following news items are reprinted with permission from Computer Industry Update published by Industry Market Reports, Los Altos, CA.

Daystar Systems of Dallas, TX announced the 512KB Ultraram add-on memory for the Personal Computer. It is \$895. The Ultraboot dynamic memory allocation utility is \$40.

Informatics General announced the Terminal Application Processing System/PCConnection, a word processing/office automation product allowing communications between up to 128 PC's. The hardware and software combination provides electronic mail, document filing, automatic calendar, message recording and forwarding, directory maintenance and name and address files. The package costs from \$500 to \$800 per computer.

Microperipheral of Redmond, WA is offering the PCConnection enhanced plug-in telecommunications card with direct-connect modem, real-time clock and an additional serial I/O port for the PC. It is \$375.

Microsoft of Bellevue, WA is offering the four-function Systemcard with both serial and parallel interfaces, a calendar/clock and up to 256KB of memory. A 64 KB version is \$475, and a 256KB version is \$995.

Quadram of Norcross, GA is offering a 12" color monitor with 690 by 480 dot resolution and 16 colors for \$795.

Retail Solutions of Sunnyvale, CA introduced the Retailer inventory management business accounting system based on the PC for stores with two cash registers. It is \$4,950.

Rixon of Silver Spring, MD introduced the Model PC212A Bell 212A-compatible modem for the PC for \$495.

Tallgrass Technology of Overland Park, KA introduced the Model 3035 35MB subsystem with 45MB tape backup for use with the PC. It is \$5,595. The Model 4020 20MB tape backup subsystem, compatible with XT or PC computers, is \$2,195. Both will be available this quarter. A 70MB subsystem with 45MB backup will be available next quarter.

Tecmar of Cleveland, OH cut prices on its PC Compatible add-in memory and multifunction cards. For example, the 64K card is now \$389 and the 256K card \$589, dynamic memory cards are \$289 for 64K model and \$489 on the 256K card. The 64K RAM add-on kit was cut to \$85.

3Com of Mountain View, CA plans to sell networking products for the PC in the retail market.

Advanced Software Products of Delray Beach, FL introduced an IBM 3101 terminal emulator for the Displaywriter and the PC. The emulator is available on a trial basis for \$25 and perpetual license for \$300 per system.

Alpha Software of Boston, MA announced the Data Base Manager II which integrates spreadsheet and word processing with data base capabilities. It is compatible with WordStar, VisiCalc, 1-2-3 and Multiplan. The package is \$295

Alpha Software also introduced the Executive Package of Basic and VisiCalc spreadsheet programs and tables for the PC. The software expands the problem solving capabilities for \$145.

California Software Products of Santa Ana, CA is offering the Baby/34 program for the PC which allows System/34 applications to run without program modification.

Computer Susteans Research of Avon, CT introduced the Data Center Manager Series courses for the PC to develop leadership skills among computer management. Prices range from \$1,500 to \$2,500 per module.

Computer Task Group of Buffalo, NY introduced the Hercules vehicle maintenance and reporting package for the PC for \$1,995.

Continental Software introduced the Megafile data base management package and SBA General Ledger program for the PC and XT for \$195 and \$395 respectively. Both are file-compatible with VisiCalc and WordStar. The SBA General Ledger is file-compatible with dBase II and Lotus Development's 1-2-3. The software will be available in June.

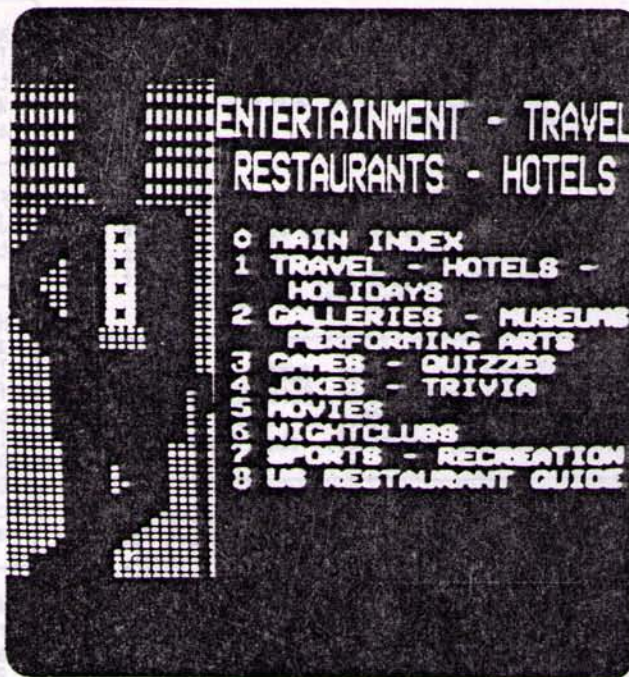

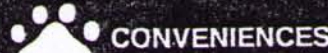

Cullinet Software of Westwood, MA announced a mainframe data base link using the PC. They also announced the Cullinet Personal Computer System integrated set of management and decision support tools for the Personal Computer. The package offers spreadsheet, graphics, financial modeling, document processing and personal relational data base in a singel package. It is \$1,000 per computer.

Datatek of Clearwater, FL released the Datatext Word Processing software for the PC for use under PC-DOS and CP/M-86. It incorporates the Datatext Editor and can use files created using dBase II. Datatext is \$450.

Execucom Systems of Austin, TX introduced the Interactive Financial Planning System/Personal, a distributed decision support system which allows a Personal Computer to obtain files from mainframe data bases and to upload data from PCs to mainframes. It is \$20,000 for a minimum order of 10 copies.

Foresight Software of Irving, TX is offering the Foresight Data Manager which can convert files from other data bases. The Data Manager is \$200.

Hi-Tech Software Engineering of Memphis, TN is offering the PC200 program shich allows the Personal Computer to emulate a Data General D200 display terminal. It is \$100.

Informatics General and VisiCorp announced software to link Personal Computers to mainframe data bases.

Insoft of Portland, OR is offering the Data Design menu-driven relational data base management system for the PC. It is \$225.

Isys of Cambridge, MA is offering the Macro/Scan self-contained software and investment data base service for screening, selecting stocks, acquisition search and analysis, and industry analysis. The Macro/Scan service with software and 12 months of data disks is \$6,250 per year.
