

EasyWriter I System... Finally!

How many of my fellow hackers spent the original princely sum of \$175 for EasyWriter 1.1 when you first got your PC. We loved it because it was easy to Tearn but soon learned to sneer at it because it simply wasn't very powerful.

Later some of us switched to Wordstar and developed an even better love/hate relationship. To be sure, the MicroPro product still ranks right up there with the best, but it is still awful to learn, especially for the novice PCer.

In my search for other word processors I found they often lacked the essential features of spelling checker mailmerge function. I've been looking for all that capability at a reasonable, i.e. cheap, price!

I've recently received an advanced copy of a new word processing system from IUS (Information Unlimited Software) which published the original Easywriter 1.1 marketed by IBM. Following the repackaging of their old product EasyWriter 2.0 products into the EasyWriter II System which retails for \$395, IUS used that same philosophy with the release of the EasyWriter I system. This is a dynamite product retailing for \$250. It also features an 80,000 word dictionary, has a mailmerge function, and can run on a PC, an XT, and even a PC jr!

In testing the EW I product I am extremely happy to find that I can translate the old EasyWriter 1.1 (DOS 1.1) to EW I (DOS 2.1) with only minor changes to the translated copy. That has really saved me a many, many hours of work and re-typing. I am also pleased to see that it responds much faster, especially to cursor-movement commands. It underlines, has superscripts, subscripts, and its dictionary(lexicon) can be customized to your needs.

In short it does everything I have ever wanted a word processing system to do. The mail-merge function is a little crude and it can't do same-page footnotes(I don't do much learned-paper writing these days anyway). It's capacity of 55,000 characters per file doesn't limit me as it still allows me to produce about 25 double-spaced pages. In all, it is a neat product and at a great price even though IUS isn't offering trade-in for our old 1.1's.

The club price for the EW I System will be greatly reduced and should be available by the time you read this.

On the jr., Graphics is Gold!

/* The following article is a reprint from the N.Y.P.C. Hewsletter, March, 1984

For the past two weeks I have had the opportunity to experiment with and write code for the jr., specifically in the area of graphics. The jr. shapes up to be a first class graphics machine.

Here are some of the special things I found.

New commands: PALETTE

PALETTE USING

LHEETTE OFTE

PCOPY

SCREENS (3 through 6)

CLEAR ,,, (video semory)

The most exciting command is PALETTE. With this command you gain palette color independence in ALL modes. To understand the impact of the PALETTE command we have to look at what the PC currently provides.

The PC gives three normal SCREEN modes: 0 for text, 1 for medium resolution graphics, and 2 for high resolution. Color choices: Sixteen foreground colors and eight background colors when using text mode, four colors in medium resolution graphics and two colors in high resolution mode.

Medium resolution graphics lets you assign any of sixteen colors for background, and two palettes containing standard colors: palette 0 gives colors green, red and yellow; palette 1 gives cyan, magenta and white. They come as sets and no substitutions are allowed. High resolution graphics is only white pixels against black background.

Playing with the PC's mode and color registers will give you new intensity combinations for foreground and background in medium resolution, and in high resolution, you can have any of sixteen colors for foreground against a black background. And that's it, unless you go to the non-IBM boards and programming beyond standard BASIC.

Four new screen options have been added to the jr., 3 thru 5, and here is what they provide:

Screen 3: Low resolution graphics, 160 by 200 pixels, with 16 colors and 20 characters per line for

25 lines. All graphics commands work in this mode, and you use 16K of RAM memory per screen.

Screen 4: Same as screen 1, medium resolution limited to four colors, but PAGING is permitted. This means that you can display one screen while constructing another, handy for games or drawing programs. At 16K per screen, you must set aside double the screen memory using a new parameter in the CLEAR command.

Screen 5: Medium resolution with SIXTEEN colors! This is the capability we have all been waiting for. Now drawings diagrams and graphs can have the richness we've always wanted. To store that much color informationmeans we must devote four bits to defining each pixel; that adds up to double the amount of memory devoted to screen display: 32K and again, this must be CLEARed first.

Screen 6: High resolution (640 by 200) with any four colors for more precise drawings and diagrams, including 80 characters across, just as in screen 2. 32K per screen is also required in this mode.

By past PC convention, each of the sixteen colors has been assigned a number. O is black, I is blue, etc. The PALETTE command lets your re-assign NEW colors to each of these numbers. Now when working in medium resolution under screen I, you can use ANY FOUR of the sixteen colors in your graphics, or use ANY TWO colors in screen 2 high resolution. PALETTE lets the colors be changed at any time. This opens up all kinds of opportunities for animation, games and dynamic charts and graphs.

Animation for example might be done in this way: Using the PALETTE command, assign blue to color numbers 0,1,2 and 3. This lets you draw three steps of an animated figure, all blue on blue, across the screen without any of the drawings showing. To animate, you simply cycle through the drawings like this. Assign white to 1 making the first drawing visible, then assign white to 2 making second drawing visible and blue to 1, then white to 3 and blue to 2, then white to 1 again and blue to 3, and so forth. The effect will be a white figure snapping through three positions across the

screen in rapid animation. When combined with several screen pages, this can be quite effective.

This manipulation with the PALETTE command is sometimes known as "COLOR LOOKUP TABLE ANIMATION". The PALETTE USING command lets you re-assign all SIXTEEN colors in one command through the values stored in a sixteen element integer array. That command promises some REAL HOT STUFF!

The other new command which vitalizes the expanded paging capability is PCOPY, which lets you copy from a SOURCE page to a DESTINATION page, a very necessary tool when doing "page animation" or preserving a complex working drawing before trying a tricky paint process.

I would like to mention that the jr. now makes the other 128 extended ASCII characters available under the graphics modes as well. They are stored along with the lower 128 ASCII characters up in the BIOS ROM. (Attention PC GRAPHICS PROGRAMMERS: For those who have been too lazy to define their own versions of the extended sets, you can now just copy them out of jr. ROM onto a disk file, then load them into the PC and set up the alternate character set pointers. This finally makes it possible to get quality screen dumps of those special characters using screens 1 and 2.)

By the way, the mode and color registers, &H3D8 and &H3D9, used on the PC are not recognized for modifying screen output on the ir. You don't need it anyway. While the Motorola 6845 CRT controller device is still used, output is channeled through a new programmable device called the VIDEO GATE ARRAY which manages the color table/palette, the mode control and other elements of the display. The expanded video memory capability is achieved by redirecting reads and writes made to the normal PC graphics memory at HBB000 to jr. RAM below The ir. technical reference manual claims that there is no performance penalty for this redirection. You must also remember that reserved video memory (which builds down from the top of 64K or 128K RAM) reserved by the CLEAR command becomes unavailable for programming. Once again (as the original PC technical reference manual) there is a coy, throw-away statement which makes enigmatic reference to a "highly programmable subsystem with respect to raster and character parameters which makes many additional modes possible with PROPER PROGRAMMING". This may refer to modes for use by games programmers.


