

Elections


The Board of Directors and I are working on a slate of candidates for five director positions and a President position. If you are interested, contact one of the current directors.

Book Review:

Programming Microsoft Access 2000

Written by Rick Dobson, Published by Microsoft Press ISBN 0-7356-0500-0 List Price US\$49.99, CDN\$74.99, UKP46.99


Review by Larry Linson, Microsoft Access SIG Leader

Rick Dobson begins his introduction with "This book is for database developers who want to use Microsoft Access 2000 to build custom applications." He aims for three groups: Access developers who want to learn about the "advances introduced in Access 2000", developers using other databases who want to learn "how to implement the concepts within Access", and for Access power users who want to graduate to developing solutions for others.

He succeeds admirably, with sufficient coverage so each class of reader can emphasize the areas they need most to address. It's not intended to be a book for the Access novice or casual user, nor a reference for the power user who doesn't want to become a developer. It's also not intended to be the kind of heavy-duty, industrial-strength reference for advanced developers as is the perennial standby "Access Developer's Handbook". This is a self-study book and a good one — a tutorial for becoming a developer, or for bringing yourself up-to-date on the changes in the latest version of Access.

There are fourteen chapters. These start with a

basic tutorial on Visual Basic for Applications and Access' two database programming approaches, Data Access Objects (DAO) and ActiveX Data Objects (ADO). They continue with table and query design and implementation, forms and reports, and the three types of class Modules: class, form, and report. From the shared objects of Microsoft Office, Rick moves to integrating Ac-



cess with other Office software. He covers multiuser databases, database replication, the new Access Projects and the Microsoft Data Engine (MSDE), Access for Web development, and the Office 2000 Developer Edition Tools.

There's much good about this book: it is well-written, the topics are appropriately chosen and covered in appropriate depth for the purposes of the book, and Dr. Dobson has a talent for clear explanation that makes the topics easy to understand. It is easy to see why he is a popular speaker at conferences and why he is asked to write so many articles. Included with the book is a CD-ROM with sample databases for each chapter, all the book's source code plus other examples, third-party utilities and trial software, and a complete electronic version of the book, fully-searchable. You can take the CD on the job and refer back to it without lugging the book around. For the audiences targeted, I strongly recommend it.

My complaints were few and minor. It was a little disconcerting to me to see Rick use some conventions more common to Visual Basic developers than to Access developers, that is, the "dot notation" to refer in VBA code to controls on forms and specifying the ".Value" property which is the default property of data-containing controls in Access. Neither is improper, but both are unconventional in writings about Access.

The voice of experience — Installing Microsoft Office 2000

Now that we have had some experience installing Office 2000, it seems time to pass along some of the lessons learned. The rollout has gone relatively smoothly, with most customers being able to install smoothly and begin enjoying the new features of this newest version of office. More people are learning how to manipulate data on the World Wide Web, and the seamless operation of the new file format is a pleasure to work with in Web applications. There are a few pernicious problems that crop up during some customer's installations, and I've given those some space below so you can eliminate some frustration if you should encounter one of them.

(2351/2355Error) If you receive either of the following error messages when running Office 2000 Setup:

Internal Error 2351

Internal Error 2355

please perform the following steps, in order:

IMPORTANT: If you receive this error and still have Office 2000 Setup, cancel Setup immediately by



pressing CTRL+ALT+DEL and using End Task! If you keep running Setup after receiving either of these error messages, your system may be damaged and unable to properly restart.

If your machine is in an unbootable state, call Microsoft Windows Support line.

You may want to check to see if any firmware updates are available for their CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drives. (Firmware is similar to a computer's






NTPCUG SIG5 ARE back...

BIOS.) Customers with DVS, Hyundai, or Samsung DVD-ROM drives may be able to obtain the latest firmware at http://www.dvs.co.kr/sup-port/supp.html.>

If your computer boots properly into Windows, try the following steps before you escalate the call:

Set the CD-ROM to "No Cache / No Read-Ahead". Then, using the Device Manager (right-click My Computer > Properties > Device Manager > CD-ROM > Properties > Settings), turn off the DMA setting for your CD-ROM drive and restart the computer.

Once you have restarted the computer, try installing Internet Explorer 5.0 by running IESSETUP.EXE in the IE5\EN folder.

Once Internet Explorer 5.0 is installed, try running Office 2000 Setup again. If you receive Error 2351, cancel Office 2000 Setup *immediately!*

If Office 2000 will still not install, copy the contents of the Office 2000 CD-ROM to a hard drive, restart the computer in Safe Mode, and try running Office 2000 Setup again. If you receive Error 2351, cancel Office 2000 Setup *immediately!*

You may be able to copy the contents at the DOS prompt by using the Windows 98 Startup Disk and the XCOPY command shown in the "Technical Information You Should Know" section below.

If you have NT4 on your computer, you should install Service Pack 5 before attempting to reinstall Office 2000.

If you have anti-virus software installed and are having trouble, uninstall it. Once you have removed your anti-virus software, try running Office 2000 Setup again.

(DellInspironError) If you receive error messages such as Installer Terminated Prematurely or Error 1905 when installing Office 2000 on a Dell Inspiron laptop, check to make sure that DMA is disabled on your CD-ROM drive, restart the computer, and try installing Office 2000 again.

If Office 2000 will still not install correctly, you may need to call Dell Technical Support. Some models of the Inspiron laptop contain CD-ROM drives and/or cables that are in need of replace-



ment; Dell Technical Support can assist you in getting their computer updated.

Also, please make sure that you have the latest BIOS from Dell's Web site (http://www.dell.com/).

(CDROMReadError) We have CONFIRMED that the following CD-ROM drives cannot read CD1, CD3, CD4, or CD5 (Developer CD) included in Office 2000; only CD2 is readable:

HP SureStore CDWriter 6020

Phillips CDD 2600 E/N CD Recorder

We are working on a method to address this problem. Possible workarounds include:

If you are on a network, see if you can share the Office 2000 CD using another computer's CD-ROM drive, and then run Office 2000 Setup using that drive.

If you have another CD-ROM drive, or a DVD-ROM drive, try running Setup using that drive.

(CDKeyError) If you have an invalid or missing CD Key, or if you receive the following error messages documented in Q231664 (OF-FICE database) when installing CD2:

Setup failed to locate a valid qualifying product on your machine. Please select the drive where a qualifying product can be found.

Error 1608. Could not find any previously installed compliant products on the machine for installing this product.

Call the Support number to get a validation key when you see this error.

Other Issues

(AcademicRegistration) If you are having trouble registering your Academic edition of Microsoft Office 2000, here's some information that you can use.:

Normal Academic packages can be installed and registered on two different machines; for example, a desktop and a laptop. If you attempt to install and register Office 2000 on a third machine, you will not be permitted to.

When you register your Academic edition of Office 2000, you should receive a *confirmation code*. Write this code down, and keep it for future use! The confirmation code can be reused on the same machine if you are forced to reinstall Office 2000 at any time.

- 1. Start Outlook 2000.
- 2. Press F1. In the Help window, select the Contents tab.
- 3. Click the plus sign (+) next to the following items, in order:

(*IPFInsertingPictureFromFile*) If you receives an **Invalid Page Fault** when you click Insert > Picture > From File, try the following steps:

- 1. On the Start menu, click Run. Type "regedit" and click OK.
- 2. Go to the key HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\Microsoft\Office\9.0\Common\Open Find. Export this key to a separate REG file (just insurance), and then delete the key from the registry. Careful with editing the registry. Make sure you have a good windows 98 Startup disk available.
- 3. Exit Registry Editor. Then, reinstall Office 2000. (Remove and reinstall office 2000) May be necessary if the Office applications won't start.
- 1. Uninstall Microsoft Office 2000 from the Add/Remove icon in the Control Panel.
- 2. Run Offcln9.exe from CD1.
- 3. Reinstall Microsoft Office 2000.

(HelpWon'tStart) If you are unable to use Help in any of the Office 2000 programs, or if no results are returned when you search help, there may be a problem with your Help system. Here are a few things you can try:

If you are using the Office Shortcut Bar (OSB), turn *OFF* the AutoHide feature of the OSB. We have seen at least one case where AutoHide prevented Help from appearing.

Also, turn *OFF* the AutoHide feature of the Start menu/taskbar.

Clear the "Use Office Assistant" check box in the Office Assistant options dialog box.

Switch to the Standard VGA video driver, or restart the computer in Safe Mode.

Check the file size and either the version or the modified date of the following files:

C:\WINDOWS\SYSTEM\HHCTRL.OCX size 520,528 bytes version 4.73.8412

C:\Program Files\Microsoft Office\Office\Office\1033\MSOHELP.CHM size 17,256 bytes modified date 12/3/98

If either of these files is incorrect, exit all Office programs, rename *both* files, and then run Internet Explorer Setup and perform a Repair. You may also need to Repair using Microsoft Office 2000 Setup.

Try the following:

Start > Run > "C:\Program Files\Microsoft Office\Office\1033\Msohelp.exe" /regserver > OK

This will re-register the Microsoft Office Help program.

In the Registry, go to HKEY_LOCAL_MA-CHINE\Software\Microsoft\Windows\HTML Help and view the list of registered CHM (the help files have a CHM extension) files. If the CHM file you are trying to use is not registered, this can cause a problem. In this case, use Office 2000 Setup to remove the program(s) in which Help is not working, and then reinstall the program(s).

If your help window does not appear, you may be able to correct the problem by deleting the following key from the registry:

HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\Microsoft\Office\9.0\Common\HelpViewer

Delete this folder, or all of the values stored within. Exit and restart your Office 2000 programs, and see if Help appears correctly.

Handy Technical Info for Installing Office 2000

(IE5WindowsInstaller) Please remember that Internet Explorer 5.0 does not use Windows Installer technology. You cannot correct Windows Installer problems by installing or removing Internet Explorer 5.0.

(ScanregRegsvr32) If you are receiving registryrelated error messages when installing Office 2000 or using any of the programs included in Office 2000, take note of the following:



If you have Windows 98, you can use Scanreg to scan the registry for errors and correct any detected problems.

To run Scanreg and look for errors in the registry while in Windows, Start > Run > "scanreg" > OK.

To run Scanreg and correct errors in the registry, restart your computer, hold down the CTRL key, and boot to the Command Prompt. Type "scanreg /fix" and press ENTER.

To optimize your registry using Scanreg, type "scanreg /opt" and press ENTER.

To re-register a specific file in the registry while in Windows, Start > Run > "regsvr32 < fileame>" OK. This can be useful if you receive Error 1904 or any other error message that mentions a specific file.

(DualBootSituation) If you have a dual-boot system (for example, Windows 98 and Windows NT), and want to run Office 2000 in both operating systems, you must install Office 2000 twice, once under each OS. If you want to customize Office settings in one OS and migrate the settings to the other OS, use the Office Profile Wizard to do this.

Things Not To Forget

Please remember to disable ALL anti-virus programs and all other non-essential programs when you are installing Office 2000!

You should *not* use the Eraser97 utility on a computer where any Office 2000 components are installed. Doing so will remove your Of-

fice 97 files, but it will also *break* your Office 2000 applications.

Make sure you don't have any other programs running when you run Office 2000 Setup, especially anti-virus programs!

Office 2000 Setup creates a log file every time you install Office 2000 on your computer. These log files are stored in the C:\WINDOWS\TEMP folder, and they can be invaluable if you have trouble with an installation.

In order to query the KB, sometimes you have to have the exact message, or you won't be able to find what you're looking for.

BEWARE THE 'SANdbox'Bug!

From Gil Brand

To all NTPCUG members:

There is a new, potentially very dangerous security "bug" that has been discovered in Microsoft's Internet Explorer 4 & 5. This bug allows a malicious web site to run a Java applet that could do anything it chooses to your system. I recommend installation of the patch if-you run Internet Explorer 4 or 5.

Note that there have been NO reports of such web sites, but the likelyhood increases now that the bug has been publicly announced.

READ the installation instructions (on the MS download web page) carefully. There is a manual

step AFTER the installation process reboots your machine.

Also, We need some volunteer help to do this type of research and 'spread the word'. Preferably someone who is experienced with security issues and/or does this as part of their day job. Email me at gil.brand@ntpcug.org if available.

The Issue

The Microsoft VM is a virtual machine for the Win32(r) operating environment. It runs atop Microsoft Windows(r) 95, 98 or Windows NT(r). It ships as part of each operating system, and also as part of Microsoft Internet Explorer. [Ed. Note: The VM is designed to run Java applets in a "Virtual Sandbox" and not allow access to other areas on the user's PC.]

The version of the Microsoft VM that ships with Microsoft Internet Explorer 4.0 and Internet Explorer 5.0 contains a security vulnerability that could allow a Java applet to operate outside the bounds set by the sandbox and take any desired action on the user's computer. If such an applet were hosted on a web site, it could act against the computer of any user who visited the site.

Affected Software Versions

Microsoft VM, all builds in the 2000 and 3000 series

NOTE: The affected versions shipped primarily as part of Internet Explorer 4.0 and 5. The FAQ provides instructions for determining the specific build on your machine.

[Ed. Note: Acquiring the patch to "cure" the sand-box vulnerability is simple, but may be time-consuming if the user has a "slow" dial-up connection. Go to http://www.microsoft.com/java/vm/dl_vm32.htm and follow the download instructions. This file is very large, 6.3 megabytes in size!

The instructions at the download site may not be as complete as those on the FAQ, since, as Gill states, you will need to do one more step after installing the patch for Win 9x and NT, and this involves getting to a command prompt.

Easiest way is to use the Windows "Start" + "Run" and then type "COMMAND" on the box command line, then pressing "Enter" on the keyboard.. You will see a DOS box with the usual blinking prompt. Type the following:

clspack -auto

(There's a single space between "clspack" and "-auto," and it's important.)

Each time I have booted my PC since entering the IE patch, I've gotten a message asking which filetype I wish to use to open Microsoft OFFICE.ACS. I have no idea what this means and everything appears to be functional so far, but it is still somewhat troublesome. 

in disk files is simple and eliminates the need for the automation server, but raises issues of redundant storage in multi-user environments and exposes the image files to "outside influences" (accidental deletion, for example). (3) Storing the images in the database, but as "Binary Large Objects (BLOBs)" rather than as OLE objects can reduce storage needs and eliminate the requirement for each user to have an automation server installed, but increases processing time. Live demonstrations will augment the discussion and, as usual, expect a giveaway of valuable prizes.

In August: Dan Ogden, attorney, Leader of the ActiveX Application Developers SIG, presented an overview of the Microsoft Office 2000 release and began his presentation of Access 2000 (with demonstrations of features as he discussed them). He continued this two-hour joint session at 12:00 in the ActiveX Application Developers SIG. Dan has a most impressive demonstration - he tells me it is nearly 200 PowerPoint slides and, amazingly, is almost entirely emphasizing only new or enhanced features. That means, to me, that this is a most impressive release of Microsoft Office, although there is controversy and concern in the Access development community over certain features and functions, and few people have expressed enthusiasm for the new HTML Help engine. Dan plans to complete the Access 2000 presentation and discuss other Office software in the September meeting of the ActiveX Application Developers SIG - see that article for more information.

tures and functions, and few people have expressed enthusiasm for the new HTML Help engine.

and September: Dan will complete the Access 2000 presentation and discuss other Office software in the September meeting of the ActiveX Application Developers SIG. Although Access 2000, with its database and Web development enhancements, has stolen a lion's share of the press coverage, there are enhancements to every software component of Microsoft Office 2000. One of the newsworthy ones is that Microsoft has "frozen" the file formats for Word and Excel, so that a Word document or an Excel spreadsheet created in Word 2000 or Excel 2000 can be read and used in Word 97 or Excel 97 – they say they will continue this in the future, but warn that you may lose some features of the new release when using the files with the older releases.

Likely topics for October: Our topic for October hasn't been decided, but we've talked about doing something on one of the following: (1) More on Office 2000 (seems it is an inexhaustible subject), (2) Reviews of a book pertinent to the interests of the SIG, or two or three, as time permits, by Dan or Larry or both, (3) More on ActiveX Data Objects and OLEDB, Microsoft's chosen successor for both Data Access Objects (DAO) programming and Open Database Connection (ODBC), (4) A tutorial on Microsoft Front Page 2000 or detail review of a sample chapter or two of one of the Microsoft Press self-study books on Front Page, or (5) a topic on which we might receive "sudden and unexpected inspiration" in the meanwhile. Expect more information at the September meeting; it should be decided by then.


The ActiveX Application Developers SIG addresses issues of developing applications under the Component Object Model (COM) using ActiveX Controls and other ActiveX components. Just because so many of our attendees work in Microsoft Office and other software using it, we have considerable emphasis on Office and VBA issues. But, don't forget, ActiveX components and VBA are not at all limited to Microsoft products - there's a long list of products now using VBA as their programming (that used to be called "macro") language. Visio was the first to do so. A surprising addition to that list was Corel's Word Perfect. We still ask and answer a few questions about Open Database Connection (ODBC) technology, too, but the questions now are concentrating on ActiveX Data Objects (ADO) because it is new and because Microsoft is touting it as the replacement for all previous data access methods. As hot as the Internet is, our topics aren't necessarily about Internetting, since ActiveX controls work equally well on the desktop and in client/server environments as in Internet applications. That's one of the attractive features: one type of control, usable in many environments. Many of the topics we cover are of interest to developers using other tools, working in other environments - for example, some such subjects we have covered in



DOS/Operating Systems


The DOS/Operating Systems SIG for September will focus on that most joyous of all (next to configuring a PC with "Plug 'n Pray hardware and software) PC tasks — backing up. There are lots of ways to back up, including using the Microsoft-supplied utility in Windows 9x or the DOS version for those still running it. My personal preference is still the Seagate/Veritas Backup Exec, now in version 3.0 for Win 9x.

There are other programs probably as good, but I have and like this package for a number of reasons including the ability to write to almost any media you can imagine and an Emergency Restore operation that really works. But, that's not the point of this note although doing full backups is a very good idea, especially before making any major system changes.

Point here is less than full backups made necessary by incremental

program updates, i.e., program patches like the recent, 6.3 megabyte IE 4&5 "sandbox" patch. It's easy to lose track of all the patches a user can download from various Internet sites, many of which require previous patches before they can be installed.

My solution used to be 3.5" floppies for each vendor. This started getting out of hand since I have a propensity to avoid labeling each floppy, thinking I'll get around to it "later."

ZIP® disks provided a much better solution. I simply created a directory for each vendor and copy the update files immediately after downloading from the Web or FTP site. So far I haven't begun to fill a 100M disk as I also remove those update files that have become obsolete. Even when it is filled, a second ZIP disk will be much easier to keep track of than the 20 or so 3.5" floppies.

I use ZIP because it is available in an internal SCSI form. Actually, any of the removable, high-capacity media should do a fine job in this application.

In September, Michael Bodner, assistant SIG Leader will present examples of the drop-down list box for looking up values for cells. This was a request a couple of months back. We also have a few leftover items from last month's topic of Pivot Tables. As usual we will take questions from the group at the beginning of the meeting.

- Using and creating Web queries

At the August meeting we demonstrated Pivot Tables using the Northwind mdb file as an external data source. Once we established the source query using Microsoft Query we were able to summarize data in the orders and related tables. Within 15-20 minutes we had summarized the data in about a dozen different ways. If you have not tried Pivot Tables, give them a trial. The Pivot Table is by far the most powerful tool available in any Microsoft Product.

Internet - Beginning

The Internet continues to be a fascinating medium for communicating information. Within our User Group, we provide free Internet email as a basic member benefit, and have been doing so for years.

Just recently, after moving from our old Bulletin Board System (BBS) to our new Windows NT server, we began providing "newsgroups" to our members as a means to communicate throughout the month. Newsgroups are conference areas where you can leave questions and information intended for the membership at large. Messages left in newsgroups can be viewed by other members at their option, and at whatever time they prefer. If a question is being asked, another member will hopefully know that answer.

Newsgroups do not require that the involved parties be online simultaneously. Messages posted to a newsgroup remain there until removed by an administrator, or until "canceled", so can be read anytime. Replies to an initial message are associated together as a "thread", meaning that the original message and any subsequent replies are grouped together to make reading them easier.

There are both public and private newsgroups. The publicly available newsgroups on the Internet are referred to as Usenet newsgroups, and number well over 20,000. Many contain very useful information. Others are associated with topics that the average person would never begin to consider "normal". Just looking at the list of newsgroups is an experience in itself. You "subscribe" to the ones you want to review, and ignore the others.

Our User Group newsgroups are private, intended for members only. For that reason, registration is needed to confirm your membership, at which time your name will be added to our "Newsgroup" server. To register, send an e-mail to postmaster@ntpcug.org, and advise of your name, member number, and membership expiration date. Include the ID you want to logon with, and your desired password. You will receive a reply when you are set up. If you already have an NTPCUG e-mail account, we suggest using the same logon name and password for newsgroups, just to make it easier to remember.

Once registered, you will need to configure a newsgroup reader so it knows where to find our newsgroups. Newsgroup software is built in to Internet Explorer and Netscape. There are other such products available as shareware or for purchase, such as Free Agent from Forte' (www.forteinc.com). Instructions for setting up the Internet Explorer version were provided in the June 1999 newsletter, or can be e-mailed to you after you request registration.



At the September meeting, we plan to demonstrate how to set up a browser to retrieve newsgroups. Bring your questions and we'll see if we have the answers.

In August, we discussed SPAM, the Junk Mail of the Internet. Whether a "newbie" or a professional Web surfer, we are all impacted by it. SPAM takes up space on your hard drive, increases the length of your downloads, and generally wastes your time as you decide whether these items are worth reading (they usually are not). We talked about what constitutes SPAM, how to reduce the likelihood of being added to SPAM mailing lists, and what you can do to "get even" when it arrives. The questions rolled over to the Advanced Internet SIG as well.

the various categories and confirming the legitimacy of the individual debits. Occasionally, we are even confronted

with a problem that no one can solve. But, it's rarely due to lack of effort.

Here is a sample of an unsolved "Quicken Challenge". Employee A has a choice in his Qualified Pre-Tax Retirement Plan. Accept \$550/ month for life or alternatively accept \$511./mo with a guaranteed period of 15 years -or life-whichever is longer. Interest rate is assumed to be 6-3/4%. A elects the guaranteed option and wants to show the annuity portion as an asset on his financial statement for family estate purposes.

Using Quicken features, how should A set up the annuity asset account which should be amortized over the 180 guaranteed months?



Solution clue: Treating the pension annuity as a "loan receivable" fails to recognize the 100% (taxable) income nature of the pension payment whereas with a loan receivable only the interest portion is income - the principal being return of capital.






