Please don't submit the article or story in HTM or .PDF format. It can make editing and formatting quite time consuming and difficult.



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
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should check the winners list at the Information Desk before you leave



Bob has been a member of NTPCUG since




the earliest days, with member number 105. Re-

About the NTPCUG Proposed Bylaws Changes

The Board of Directors is proposing four bylaws changes to simplify the administration of the club. These changes are minor compared to the major modifications that were made last year. However, they are needed as we move to a more electronic environment, and try to keep the club in tune with the Internet age. These changes fall into two categories: (1) allowing the Board of Directors to add membership classifications, and (2) making e-mail an official communication method. With this change, postal mail, e-mail, or a combination of the two may be used for official communication with members.

In the future you may be able to vote by email, but for now votes must be cast in person at the business meeting on January 20th or by giving your proxy to the Board of Directors. You can do that by sending a signed piece of paper with your member number and a state-



ment that says, "I give the Board of Directors the right to cast my vote." to:

NTPCUG Conference Center

NTPCUG has implemented a feature called Web-Board, which in many ways replaces the old BBS (Bulletin Board System) that was so popular years ago before the Internet came along. It also replaces use of NTPCUG Newsgroups, which <u>didn't</u> catch on.


WebBoard allows members to exchange questions, answers and information at all hours of the day or night, year-round. It works through either a Web browser or using e-mail, so can be accessed from almost anywhere.

WebBoard is marketed by **O'Reilly & Associates**, and was provided to NTPCUG at no cost. Our thanks to O'Reilly for their support of NTPCUG.

To use our WebBoard via a Web browser, you must establish a Logon Name and Password, and supply your e-mail address. To use the email feature, you will also need to specify which WebBoard conference areas you wish to receive messages from.

Establishing a WebBoard Account

To establish your account, go to *www.ntpcug.org*, and click on "WebBoard" in the left-hand menu list. This will take you to the NTPCUG Conference Center. Click on the NEW USERS button, then enter the required items (with red dots). Your logon can be whatever you wish, but your First and Last names must be accurate. If you are a NTPCUG member, please provide your member number. Add



other optional information if you wish, or you can do so later.

Now, click the "Create" button. You should receive a response saying "Welcome to NTPCUG", and a list of all the current conference areas. Your account is now established. In the future, you will use the Name and Password just entered to access the system via a browser.

NOTE: There are periodic reports of a "glitch" in the logon creation process just described, the cause of which is currently being researched. It is evidenced my a message at logon creation saying:

WebBoard Error: Invalid Board

You must specify a valid board using the following syntax:

http://webboard.ntpcug.org:8080 ~board_name

The error goes on to say that "cookies" my be a problem, although they generally are not. If you get this error in creating

your WebBoard account, PLEASE e-mail *post-master@ntpcug.org* and provide the logon name you want established. We will create it for you and advise you by return e-mail. You can change the password the first time you logon.

Once you get in successfully, let's look over the first screen. The leftmost column lists all the current conference areas, and is naturally subject to change. Each conference has a number at the right in parenthesis, which indicates how many total messages are in that conference. If there are any new messages since your last visit, that number appears as well along with the word "**NEW**."

For each conference that contains messages, there is a + sign at the left. Click on the + to get a list of current messages. If more + signs appear beneath the conference name, you can click on those as well to further expand the list of messages.

As you expand these conferences, you will note various levels of indention. These indicate replies to previous messages. Clicking on the topmost message of such indented group will generally show you ALL the messages in that group, so it is unnecessary to click on each one individually.

Reviewing and Sending Messages

Clicking on messages in the left column will cause their content to appear in the right column. With all such messages, you can create a reply that will be added to the list at the appropriate point. The **REPLY** can be your thoughts by themselves, or by using **REPLY/QUOTE**, you can include the previous message content beneath your own comments.

The **EMAIL REPLY** option lets you send an email directly to the creator of a message. Such e-mails will not be posted to WebBoard. Use this method to contact a user when it would be inappropriate to send to everyone.

At any time, when anywhere within a conference, you can click **POST** to create a <u>new</u> message. This, and any replies, will open a new box in the right window. Pick a useful subject line and insert in the Topic area, then your thoughts on that issue in the large window below. You have other options to choose from, in-

cluding attaching a file. But when ready to send, click the **POST** box. By default, a spell checker will initiate to catch spelling errors. Then click **POST** again to send it on its way.

The above information should get you started. If you want to practice, use the **Test Area** conference to play around in. We'll purge this area periodically to keep it at manageable levels.

WebBoard by E-Mail

So far, we have talked about Web-based access to WebBoard conferences. But many folks prefer to receive information about the availability of conference messages without having to go to the Web. As it turns out, you can do most things in WebBoard by e-mail if you wish.

WebBoard can send you a copy of each new conference message as it is posted. To activate this functionality, log in to WebBoard using your Name and Password, and select the **MORE** option across the top of the screen. Then choose **MAILING LISTS**, and click the box next to the conferences you are interested in. (**Note** the abbreviated name for each conference, contained in parenthesis at the right.) Now click the **SAVE** button to lock it all in. At that point, anytime a message is posted in any of the selected conferences, you will receive a copy by e-mail, and can reply to that message by e-mail as well.

Each conference area has an abbreviated name that is used when sending messages (from my **Note** above). For instance, the **TEST AREA** conference has "test_area" as its short name. <u>New</u> message posts can be sent to this area by addressing to "test_area@web-

board.ntpcug.org". The new message will post just as though you did it from the Web page itself.

To reply to a message e-mailed to you, just click **REPLY** in your mail software, and it will format the return e-mail address for you. For replies, the format of the address is *test_area.134@webboard.ntpcug.org*. The difference between a **POST** and a **REPLY** is the addition of a reference number after the conference abbreviation, to tie the reply to the proper posting. For replies, you won't need to know this number -- it is done automatically.

As you set up WebBoard to send your e-mails, you can make note of the abbreviated name for each conference you may want to post to. However, a complete, current list of all conferences can be acquired by sending an e-mail to *webboardlist@ntpcug.org*. The full list will be sent to you immediately and <u>automatically</u>.

This should be sufficient to get you started using our WebBoard. I strongly encourage you to try it out now. Ask some questions of your fellow members, and let's make WebBoard as useful to our membership as the old BBS was.

function of developing solutions in the .NET world. His presentation will predominately use VB.NET and C# in the examples and demonstrations and will focus primarily on the new features of ASP.NET, Web Forms and Web Services. Brian's presentation will begin at 11 AM in the **Application Developer Issues SIG** and will span both that SIG and the **Access SIG**.

Our congenial Microsoft host, Greg Nicholson, was originally scheduled to demonstrate and discuss Access 2000's Data Access Pages (DAP): This is the Access interface to databases for use on an Intranet or a special Web site where all the users will be using Microsoft Internet Explorer 5.0 or later. Greg has been preparing demonstrations and examples for Microsoft customers in this area. He will demonstrate Data Access Pages working and give a tutorial on how to prepare them. Since Brian's presentation will last two hours, Greg's presentation on Data Access Pages will occur at a later meeting date, probably in February.

In December 2000: SIG Leader Larry Linson talked about some unobvious lessons he learned while working on A Simple HTML Editor in Access to prepare these SIG notes. His conclusion was that you can write a text editor in Access, but there are better software tools for writing text editors. The PowerPoint presentation and the EditHTML.MDB example database can be found at the Application Developer Issues SIG's download page, http://members.tripod.com/appdevissues/downloads.htm (live link on back page of this issue).

We had another nice assortment of goodies in our December drawing: a boxed copy of Windows 2000 and Tshirts for the drawing, provided by our host, Greg Nicholson, of Microsoft's local office. Coming soon to the Access SIG:

Access Data Projects (ADP): ADPs use ADO to provide access via OLE DB or ADO Data Providers directly to Microsoft SQL Server. This eliminates the overhead of linking through Jet and translation by ODBC drivers. The drawbacks include no Access security on your application and no provision for local tables.

Simple Web Interface: What's the hot database topic these days? It's Web interfaces to databases. One of the easiest tools for creating simple Web sites, Microsoft Front Page, can interact with Access (and also some server databases) to provide a user-friendly and inexpensive 'Web database interface'. We will cover at least two approaches to using Front Page with Access. Why do I call it inexpensive? Street price is under \$100, and it comes free with some editions of Microsoft Office 2000.

ActiveX Data Objects (ADO): ADO

is Microsoft's newest candidate for Access Method of the Future. We'll take a look at where it is (not quite as complete as DAO just yet), where it pays to use ADO, where it pays to stick with DAO instead, and demonstration of ADO in Access. Perhaps we can also discuss the different model of the suc-

Application Developers Issues

January Meeting

Brian Moore, Developer Tools Specialist from Microsoft's South Central District Office (and the local Microsoft developer guru replacement for Thomas Lewis), will present an overview of the Microsoft .NET Framework and Services. He gave an overview of the evolution of a small network from sharing files and printers using a crossover cable to installation of a network hub. Gil also discussed integrating Internet connection sharing on a LAN and implementing Internet security using both software and hardware router firewalls. Gil's presentation also generated some lively discussion as several attendees discussed their experiences with networking and Internet security. Thanks to Gil for his taking the time to share his experiences with us.

October Meeting

Adam Cogan of Superior Software, Sydney, Australia, who was in town to attend the Microsoft Exchange Server Conference in Dallas, gave a presentation on "Building e-Business Applications Using XML." XML has rapidly become a subject that no one can afford to ignore these days as it is central to just about every new development for the Internet (and is certainly also usable and useful in some non-Internet situations). Adam, whose presentation carried over into the Microsoft Access SIG, also demonstrated SSW's performance analyzer for Access applications. Dan also touched on such features as system file protection, kernel driver memory protection, Kerberos security, Active Directory, COM+, disk quotas, file encryption and performance enhancements to support his conclusion that Windows 2000 is the superior platform, Microsoft or otherwise, for application development. In **ThumbsPlus** (version 4.0) you can make contact sheets of just about any size and format you want, including fonts used for headings, etc. Under each thumbnail is name of picture, size, and resolution with options of file time, keywords, annotations, dimensions, which you determine when setting up your contact sheet. To do this, though, the pictures must be in the same directory (and subdirectory if that is the

case). It will also set background color...You can choose output of BMP, GIF, TGA, WMF, JPEG, TIF and ICO format. For background, if you don't want color, you can choose a graphics file of any of numerous choices for your background. You can choose borders (none, simple, sunken); margins, thumbnail size, headers, footers. As you can see, there are numerous options. Thumbs Plus can be tried at www.cerious.com (live link on back page of this issue) and can be purchased (electronic distribution) for \$74.95. Packaged version is \$79.95. Note this is somewhat more expensive than when I first started using ThumbsPlus several years ago, but the upgrades thereafter are quite reasonable...\$25.00, and this is for numbered upgrades, as in 3 to 4. Interim upgrades 4 to 4.10 are free.

Another package I have tried is Extensis Portfolio, now in Version 5.0. With Portfolio, you can create a database of images, which can come from any number of sources. They do not have to be in the same directory. And you have fairly extensive DB options in Portfolio such as rules, mappings, single or multiple file types, and DB strings. The databases in Portfolio are called catalogs and can also be stored wherever you wish. There is lots more info at the Extensis Web site. You can download a trial version at www.extensis.com (live link on back page of this issue) and the full version is \$199.95; (\$189.95 at retail outlets such as PC Connection or Micro Warehouse)...upgrades are \$99.95 (\$89.95 retail outlets). You can also get Portfolio server and Portfolio SQL Client Server versions for large workgroups.

The following note was sent to me by member **Bob Mumme**. I thought you might find his comments interesting:

"It was good to be in your SIG back in November. At that time I was having a problem with my CD ROM, which went away when I went to WIN 2K. Following is a report that I sent out to several friends about our experience with Windows 2K. (We are heavy computer users but technical illiterates.)

"A couple months ago one of our grandsons told us that Windows 2000 was very fast and that it didn't crash. But there are difficulties in getting some programs and hardware to work without new drivers.

"That 'doesn't crash' sounded good to me, since we were rebooting Windows Me several times a day.

"Then I went to a presentation by Power Quest, suggesting that new Operating Systems could be tried out safely by installing dual OS's and trying out the new while retaining the old, by using their Partition Magic program and their Boot Magic program to select the OS.

"This we did, and IT WORKED OUT WONDERFULLY. WINDOWS 2000

DOES NOT CRASH, AND IT SEEMS TWICE AS FAST AS WIN 98 OR ME.

"We installed it "clean" rather than as an upgrade.

"We expected to fine tune 2K for several weeks before making it our default OS, but on the first computer we made it the default the second day. Now we are using 2K on all 3 computers as the default, and only have to go back to 98 for one or 2 seldom used programs.

"Windows 2000 is worth the trouble. In fact, IT'S LIKE HAVING NEW AND FASTER COMPUTERS THAT REALLY WORK."

One point introduced was the value of having command line login only, because it is possible to bypass security on the graphical logon. The only real question that came up during the session was a problem using the Internet via dial-up. The



problem? An inability to surf to a site using the URL. The browser would hang or get error messages. It sounded to us like a problem with the DNS server.

DNS, or Domain Name System, is the method by which URLs are resolved to specific IP Addresses. IP Addresses are a series of four numbers (or Octets) that are the Net Equivalent of Street Addresses. When we tell people to go to the Lake Highlands Freshman Center for The NTPCUG Monthly Meeting, they have to be able to take a phonebook and find that the Lake Highlands Freshman Center is the same as 10200 White Rock Trail. If they don't have a phonebook, they're pretty much lost. It is the same with your computer and URLs. You are telling your browser to go to www.ntpcug.org but your computer doesn't understand this. It needs a phonebook or DNS server.

BYLAWS Of The North Texas PC Users Group, Inc.

ARTICLE I

GENERAL MATTERS

Section 1.1 NAME

The name of the corporation is the North Texas PC Users Group, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the "Users Group", a corporation formed under the provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act.

Section 1.2 PURPOSE

The Users Group is formed exclusively for the purpose for which a corporation may be formed under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act and not for pecuniary profit or financial gain. No part of the assets, income, or profit of the Users Group will be distributable to, or inure to the benefit of its members, directors, or officers except to the extent permitted under the said Non-Profit Corporation Act. The Users Group will not take steps which will serve to facilitate the transaction of specific business by its members or promote the private interest of any member or engage in any activities which would constitute a regular business of a kind ordinarily carried on for profit.

This Users Group is formed to unite into a common organization those individuals who are users of and those who share a common interest in the various versions of the personal computers, peripherals, operating systems and software (hereinafter referred to as "Personal Computing Devices"); to provide the membership with a forum for the exchange of information of interest and for the benefit of the membership; to render services designed to meet the needs and interests of the membership; and to provide to the membership any form of assistance that will lead to the more efficient and effective utilization of the membership's Personal Computing Devices.

Section 1.3 OBJECTIVES

The objectives for which this Users Groups is formed are:

- (a) To provide an opportunity for both formal and informal education in Personal Computing Devices.
- (b) To provide a medium of communication with user groups in other areas (location and orientation.)
- (c) To provide an opportunity for the formation of special interest groups.
- (d) To provide a medium for the exchange of public domain and contributed software. The illegal copying, use, or distribution of software will not be condoned.
- (e) To assist members in acquiring computer hardware and software.
- (f) To promote the effective interchange of ideas between members and vendors of Personal Computing Devices.

Section 1.4 PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The Users Group's principal office is in Dallas County, Texas. The Users Group may establish and maintain offices at any other place, as the Board of Directors determines.

Section 1.5 REGISTERED OFFICE AND REGISTERED AGENT

The Users Group shall have and continuously maintain in the State of Texas a registered office, and a registered agent whose office is identical with such registered office, as required by the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act. The name of the registered agent and the address of the registered office shall be fixed by majority vote of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 2.1 ELIGIBILITY

Membership is open to any person not suspended or expelled from the Users Group by action of the Board of Directors or otherwise disqualified by the terms of the Bylaws, who has an interest in Personal Computing Devices and who submits an application properly filled out in such form as the Board of Directors shall prescribe. Any member whose dues are paid in full and who has not resigned or been suspended or expelled shall be considered a member in good standing.

Section 2.2 MEMBERSHIP CLASSIFICATIONS

<u>Membership classifications will be established as needed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. At a minimum, T</u>there will be four (4) classifications of membership as follows:

- (a) Regular membership shall be that of any individual who is the owner of or has an interest in Personal Computing Devices and does not meet the requirements of any other membership classification;
- (b) Student membership shall be that of any individual who otherwise qualifies as a Users Group member and is also enrolled on a full-time basis as a student in any public or private institution of learning.
- (c) Associate membership shall be granted by a majority vote of the Board of Directors to other user associations, computer industry corporations, or trade publications. The rights and privileges of an Associate Member shall principally consist of the receipt of the Organizational Newsletter and such other rights and privileges as shall be individually granted by the Board of Directors.
- (d) Lifetime membership shall be granted by a majority vote of the Board of Directors to a current member or members of long standing, whose distinguished service to the organization over a period of years warrants permanent recognition. The rights and privileges of a Lifetime Member shall be a lifetime membership with the full rights and privileges of a Regular membership, and such other rights and privileges as shall be granted by the Board of Directors.

Section 2.3 VOLUNTARY RESIGNATION

Any member may withdraw from membership by submitting a written notice of resignation to the Users Group Secretary. All rights, benefits, privileges, and the interests of a member in the Users Group cease on termination of membership. Resignations are effective upon fulfillment of all obligations to the date of withdrawal.

Section 2.4 VOTING RIGHTS

Each member in good standing shall be entitled to one vote on matters submitted to a vote of the members.

ARTICLE III

DUES

Section 3.1 ANNUAL DUES

All members shall pay dues annually in advance in accordance with the requirements established by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote establish an initiation fee.

Section 3.2 AMOUNT

The amount of the annual dues shall be established by the Board of Directors by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote. Different membership classifications may be charged different dues as established by the Board of Directors.

Section 3.3 NOTIFICATION OF DUES

Members will be notified of their membership renewal date. However, failure to give such notice will not relieve the member from payment of dues.

Section 3.4 FAILURE TO PAY DUES

When any member is in default in payment of dues or other fees for a period of thirty (30) days from the member's annual renewal date or such other period for which such fees become payable, the member's membership shall automatically be terminated.

ARTICLE IV

MEETING OF MEMBERS

Section 4.1 ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the members of the Users Group shall be held at the first regular meeting in January of each year at the time and place prescribed by the Board of Directors. The members shall elect the members of the Board of Directors and the President-Elect at the annual meeting and conduct such other business as shall properly come before it.

Section 4.2 REGULAR MEETING

The regular membership meeting shall be held each month at a time and place disclosed in any manner the Board of Directors may deem appropriate, stating the date, time and place of the meeting, not later than five (5) days and not more than fifty (50) day prior to the meeting.

Section 4.3 SPECIAL MEETINGS

- (a) PREREQUISITES. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, or upon written request submitted to the Board of Directors by not less than ten percent (10%) of the membership; such written request is to contain the subject or subjects to be covered. The meeting must be called by the Board of Directors within fifteen (15) days of receipt of request.
- (b) NOTICE. Not less than five (5) days before a Special Meeting, each member will be sent to his or her last known mail or e-mail address a notification of such meeting. This notification will contain the subject or subjects to be considered and the date, time and location of the special meeting. Only matters contained in the notification may be considered at said meeting.

Section 4.4 PARLIAMENTARY RULES

The usual parliamentary rules as prescribed in "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised" or its equivalent will govern all deliberations, when not in conflict with these Bylaws.

Section 4.5 QUORUM

The members holding ten percent (10%) of the votes which may be cast at any meeting shall constitute a quorum at such meeting. If a quorum is not present at any meeting of members, a majority of the members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

Section 4.6 PROXIES

At any meeting of members, a member entitled to vote may vote by proxy executed in writing by the member or by his or her duly authorized attorney-in-fact in accordance with the requirements of law.

Section 4.7 VOTING BY MAIL

Where Directors or officers are to be elected by members, such election may be conducted by mail <u>or e-mail</u> in such manner as the Board of Directors shall determine.

ARTICLE V

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 5.1 GENERAL POWERS

The affairs of the Users Group shall be managed by a Board of Directors who shall be members of the Users Group.

Section 5.2 NUMBER, TENURE AND QUALIFICATIONS

The Board of Directors will consist of seven (7) members, including the President, President-Elect and five (5) members elected at large by the members at the annual members' meeting. Each of the five (5) at large Directors shall hold office until the next annual meeting of members and until his or her successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 5.3 CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

The Board of Directors may annually elect a Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board shall provide leadership of the Board of Directors during his or her term of office and shall preside over all official Board of Directors' activities. In the event of the Chairman's absence from an official Board of Directors' activity, his or her appointed alternate shall carry out the Chairman of the Board's official duties.

Section 5.4 ANNUAL MEETING

The Board of Directors shall hold their annual meeting immediately following the annual meeting of the members.

Section 5.5 REGULAR MEETINGS

The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of additional regular meetings of the Board without notice other than resolution.

Section 5.6 SPECIAL MEETINGS

- (a) PREREQUISITES. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by or at the request of the President or any three Directors. The person or persons authorized to call special meetings of the Board may fix any place (in the greater D/FW area) for holding the special meetings of the Board called by him/them.
- (b) NOTICE. Notice of any special meeting of the Board of Directors shall be given at least two (2) days previous thereto by written notice delivered personally or sent by mail or electronic messaging system to each Director at his or her address as shown by the records of the Users Group. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited with the U.S. Postal Service properly addressed, postage prepaid. The Directors may waive notice of any meeting by telephoning the Secretary or by an electronic message to the Secretary.

Section 5.7 QUORUM

A majority of the Directors, present in person or by written proxy shall constitute a quorum at any Regular Meeting of the Board. If there is less than a quorum, then the only business the Board may conduct at any such Regular Meeting is to adjourn from time to time until a quorum is present. At any Special Meeting, no quorum shall be required and the Board my act by majority vote of the Directors present in person or by written proxy.

Section 5.8 PARLIAMENTARY RULES

All meetings of the Board of Directors will follow parliamentary proceedings as prescribed in "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised" or its equivalent when not in conflict with these Bylaws.

Section 5.9 ACTION WITHOUT MEETING

Any action which may be taken at a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors, may be taken without a meeting by majority vote of the Board of Directors communicated to the Chairman of the Board by telephone or electronic messaging system within the time limitations established by the Chairman of the Board for voting on any such action.

Section 5.10 VACANCIES

Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors and any directorship to be filled by reason of an increase in the number of Directors, shall be filled by majority vote of the Board of Directors. A Director elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his or her predecessor in office.

Section 5.11 NOMINATING COMMITTEE

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint a three (3) member nominating committee at least ninety (90) days prior to the annual meeting of the members, the function of said committee shall be to propose a slate of nominations for the positions of the five (5) Directors at large and President-Elect. Said slate of nominees shall be published in the Newsletter at least thirty (30) days prior to the said annual meeting of the members.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS

Section 6.1 OFFICERS

The officers of the Users Group will be the President, President-Elect, Treasurer, Secretary, and Program Chairman.

Section 6.2 ELECTION AND TERM OF OFFICE

The officers of the Users Group, with the exception of the President and President-Elect, shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors. Each officer shall hold office until his or her successor shall have been duly elected and qualified. The President-Elect shall be elected annually by the members for a term of one year and upon the expiration of his or her term of office shall succeed to the office of President for a term of one year.

Section 6.3 QUALIFICATIONS

Any member in good standing shall be qualified to be an officer of the Users Group.

Section 6.4 DUTIES.

- (a) PRESIDENT. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all membership meetings of the Users Group, to appoint and/or remove all committees ordered by the Board of Directors. He or she will be a member of the Board of Directors. He or she will make a monthly report to the general membership at each regular monthly meeting. He or she will also be empowered to outline the necessary work for and give instructions to all committees.
- (b) PRESIDENT-ELECT. It shall be the duty of the President-Elect to perform such duties as the President may delegate in the event the President is temporarily disabled or absent from meetings. The President-Elect shall coordinate all committee activities. The President-Elect shall become President at the completion of his or her term of office.
- (c) TREASURER. The Treasurer shall be responsible for preparing and monitoring the budget, making recommendations to the Board of Directors on financial matters, and monitoring and auditing all funds collected and disbursed by the Users Group. The Treasurer will make a Summary report of financial position to the general membership annually at the end of the then-current fiscal year.

- (d) SECRETARY. The Secretary shall be responsible for the taking of minutes at the regular monthly and special meetings, and any other such duties assigned by the Board of Directors.
- (e) PROGRAM CHAIRMAN. The Program Chairman shall be responsible for all activities related to selection, planning, coordination, and supervision of programs for the regular general membership meeting and any other special programs as may be designated by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE VII

COMPENSATION

Directors and officers shall not receive any compensation for their services, but the Board of Directors may by resolution authorize reimbursement of expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. Such authorization may prescribe procedures for approval and payment of these expenses.

ARTICLE VIII

SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS

Section 8.1 OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the User's Group Special Interest Groups (hereinafter referred to as "SIG") shall be to provide an organization and common meeting ground for subgroups of the general membership. The purpose of these SIG's will be to provide for and encourage the sharing of information, insight, and techniques related to the subgroup's designated field of special interest.

Section 8.2 SIG COORDINATOR

The SIG Coordinator shall be appointed annually by the Board of Directors. The SIG Coordinator shall be responsible for all SIG activities and affairs. The SIG Coordinator shall report directly to the President.

Section 8.3 SIG CREATION

The SIG Coordinator may create special interest groups. The creation of a SIG will require the documentation of the area of special interest that will be addressed by the SIG. Additionally, a minimum of eight (8) User's Group members of like mind must be ready and willing to participate in the proposed SIG. Each SIG must have a SIG Leader. Each SIG may adopt rules for its own government not inconsistent with these Bylaws or with rules adopted by the Board of Directors.

Section 8.4 SIG TERMINATION

Any SIG unable to maintain the criteria for SIG creation set forth in these Bylaws may be terminated upon the recommendation of the SIG Coordinator and the approval of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX

COMMITTEES

The President or Board of Directors may create committees. Creation of a committee will require the documentation of the purpose, the requirements for a quorum, and procedures for filling vacancies. Each committee may adopt rules for its own government not inconsistent with these Bylaws or with rules adopted by the Board of Directors. Each committee will have a chairman.

ARTICLE X

NEWSLETTER

Section 10.1 OBJECTIVES

The Users Group Newsletter objectives are to provide a medium for the distribution of information which is useful and beneficial to the general membership; convey official announcements and information related to the functioning of the members of the Users Group, as prescribed in these Bylaws.

Section 10.2 DISTRIBUTION

The Users Group newsletter is to be named "North Texas PC News." The Users Group newsletter is to be distributed monthly, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Directors, and is the responsibility of the Newsletter Publisher. The Newsletter is to be distributed to the general membership in any manner approved by the Board of Directors no later than five (5) days prior to the regular scheduled monthly general meeting.

Section 10.3 FUNDING

Funding for the Users Group Newsletter is to be through the sale of advertising copy. Any surplus receipts over operating expenses are to be posted to the Users Group's general fund. Any shortfall of revenues are to be offset by transfers from the Users Group's general fund.

Section 10.4 NEWSLETTER PUBLISHER

The Newsletter Publisher will be appointed annually by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XI

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Users Group commences on the first day of July and ends on the last day of June.

ARTICLE XII

SEAL AND CORPORATE EMBLEM

The Users Group may have a seal and corporate emblem as adopted by the Board of Directors. The seal may be used by the President and the Secretary to attest the documents of the Users Group. The corporate emblem is to be used on the publications of the Users Group and may be used in other manners under guidelines established by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XIII

INDEMNIFICATION

By Resolution of the Board of Directors, the Users Group may indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any potential, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Users Group, or is or was serving at the request of the Users Groups as a director, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against expenses, including attorney's fees, judgments, fines, and amounts paid in settlement actually and necessarily incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding so long as he or she acted in good faith and in a manner he or she reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interest of the Users Group, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, he or she had no reasonable cause to believe his or her conduct was unlawful, and he or she was not guilty of negligence or misconduct in respect of the matter in which indemnity is sought. The termination of any action, suit, or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent will not, of itself, create a presumption that the person did not act in good faith and in a manner which he or she reasonably believed to be in, or not to be opposed to, the best interests of the Users Group, and, with respect to any criminal proceeding, had reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was not unlawful.

ARTICLE XIV

FISCAL MATTERS

Section 14.1 GENERAL

The Users Group may use its funds only to accomplish the objectives and the purposes specified by the Bylaws. No part of its funds will benefit or be distributed to the members of the Users Group.

Section 14.2 EXECUTIVE AUTHORITY

No member of the Users group shall be authorized to make purchases in the name of the Users Group, nor shall members represent themselves as having such authority, except as provided by Users Group rules governing such matters. No member (or Officer) of the Users Group shall be authorized to obligate the credit of the Users Group beyond its current free credit balance in the Users Group's bank account(s). Expenditures by any Officer in the name of the Users Group in excess of \$100.00 must have prior approval of the Board of Directors. All checks, drafts, or other orders for payment of money, notes or other evidence of indebtedness issued in the name of the Users Group in the excess of \$500.00 shall be signed by two duly authorized officers, except that the Treasurer shall be permitted to pay for routine, regularly occurring expenses as approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 14.3 BOOKS AND RECORDS

The Users Group shall keep correct and complete books and records of account and shall also keep minutes of the proceeding of its members, Board of Directors, and committees having any of the authority of the Board of Directors, and shall keep at the registered or principal office a record of the names and addresses of the members entitled to vote. All books and records of the Users Group may be inspected by any member or his or her agent or attorney for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.

Section 14.4 DEPOSITS

All funds of the Users Group will be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Users Group in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Directors may select.

Section 14.5 MATERIAL PROPERTY

Material property that may be obtained from time to time by the Users Group in its name, will be controlled and the responsibility of the Users Group President or other personnel so designated by the Board of Directors. All such material property shall be used only for the benefit of the Users Group and shall not be used for the personal benefit or gain of the appointed caretaker or any third party.

Section 14.6 GIFTS

The Board of Directors may accept on behalf of the Users Group any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purposes or for any specific purpose of the Users Group.

Section 14.7 DISSOLUTION

In the event of the liquidation or dissolution of the Users Group, whether voluntarily or involuntarily, no member will be entitled to any distribution or division of its remaining property nor its proceeds. The balance of all money and other property received by the Users Group from any source, after the payment of all debts and obligation of the Users Group, will be distributed in accordance with the applicable law and exclusively for purposes therein set forth with the **intendment of Section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code 1954 and the regulations thereunder as** the same now exist or as they be hereafter amended from time to time.

ARTICLE XV

AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

Section 15.1 PROPOSED AMENDMENTS BY THE BOARD

The Board of Directors, by majority vote, may propose amendments to the bylaws.

Section 15.2 PROPOSED AMENDMENTS BY MEMBERS

Members may propose amendments by submitting them in writing, with rationale, to the President for consideration by the Board of Directors. Any member may propose an amendment to the bylaws, for consideration by the membership, upon collecting the signatures of ten percent (10%) of the membership in favor of the proposed amendment.

Section 15.3 NOTIFICATION AND VOTING

Notification of the general membership of an upcoming vote shall be made at least five (5) days prior to the scheduled date of the subject vote. These bylaws may be amended, repealed, or altered in whole or in part by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all members present and voting or by written proxy at any regular or special meeting or by mail <u>or e-mail</u> ballot adhering to the same voting requirements.

ARTICLE XVI

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Section 16.1 CONTRACTS

The Board of Directors may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents of the Users Group, in addition to the officers so authorized by these Bylaws, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and in behalf of the Users Group and such authority may be general or confined to specified instances.

Section 16.2 WAIVER OF NOTICE

Whenever any notice or notification is required to be given under the provision of any law, Articles of Incorporation or the Bylaws of the Users Group, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, will be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

Section 16.3 GENDER

The use of pronouns in these Bylaws is intended generically.

Section 16.4 NOTIFICATION

All notification required herein will be deemed served by announcement in the Users Group newsletter, "North Texas PC News," which is the official publication of the Users Group and is distributed to each member of the general membership in any manner deemed appropriate by the Board of Directors.


