

A Humorous Aside May Actually be Serious in Retrospect—Apple Really Could Port Mac OS X to Wintel PC's

BUT, Would Apple Giveup HARdWARE CONTROL?

Something I wrote in humor two months ago—who could replace Microsoft if they (MS) discontinued Windows—has led to some interesting speculation about Apple. What if Apple did decide to port OS X to the Wintel (Windows-Intel) platform? I concluded earlier that Apple really didn't want any part of the Wintel arena, but may have been mistaken.

Apple did in fact announce release of a version of their fabulously successful *iPod* digital music player to work with Windows. It should be on

the market this month (August) and is reported to have the same capabilities as the Apple iPod version. Only caveat is that it operates only with a high speed FireWire port.

Other than fact it's an obviously superior player according to media critics, why is this important and what may it mean in terms of Apple's long-range planning? Maybe nothing and maybe a whole bunch. (How's that for noncommittal?)

Lots of Folks Hate Microsoft -And MS Windows & Office

There are a lot of people that hate Microsoft and especially hate Windows in any version as a result of Windows past history as a notoriously unstable platform. How many? Reading letters to editors and visiting Usenet newsgroups would indicate that the number is not trivial, perhaps much more substantial than Microsoft would find comfortable.

For most of these people, Linux probably isn't a reasonable alternative at this point given the installation, maintenance and lack of interoperable applications software. (Please don't suggest StarOffice or 602Pro PC as solutions to the software issue, both are laden with bugs and suck in general.) Walter Mossberg, The Wall Street Journal, and Doug Bedell, The Dallas Morning News, have both reviewed the Microsoft Office alternatives in recent and lengthy articles. Mossberg was pretty negative in his impressions while Bedell gave an almost glowing review.

'Real' Suite Reviews Take Time, Lots of Time...

One of the problems with suite reviews is the amount of time necessary to get to "know" the products. I tend to have more faith in Mossberg's review than Bedell's since he did describe


the alternatives, their features and their bugs quite well. I still feel that both writers were remiss in failing to mention Corel's *WordPerfect Office* suite or Lotus' *SmartSuite*, since both are quite well written and can be significantly less expensive than the Microsoft product.

han the Microsoft product. Can Apple Have the Ideal OS and Application Solution?

Apple on the other hand may have an ideal solution—a Wintel port of OS X if it could be managed at reasonable cost. Also there are OS X versions of Microsoft Office already available for the operating system. A lot of people may hate Microsoft, but they also admit that MS Office is still the first choice in business settings.

Apple's Stability Reputation

Reputation for stability would be a major selling point for Apple. Whether fully deserved or not, the Mac OS's have been



touted as much more reliable and stable than Windows in the past. One of the plus factors for Apple in the stability arena has been their control of both the OS and the hardware it was running on. This may be one of the reasons that Steve Jobs withdrew the Mac OS license from the "alternative Mac vendors," i.e., clone makers, several years ago. That is, Apple would no longer have absolute control of the hardware, which might have led to unpredictable bouts of system instability.

Many, Many Versions of the PC a Major Problem for Microsoft OS Development

This has always been a problem for Microsoft. There are so many combinations and permutations possible with the Wintel hardware platform that designing a stable operating system appears nearly impossible unless the OS is customized for each platform variation. That, by the way, is what users actually do with successful Unix and Linux installations and what Windows attempts to do during installation and setup.

Notice I used "attempts" in describing Windows' installation and setup. Both Win 2000 and Win XP do a really good job of managing these processes compared to earlier versions and other OS software. I still shudder remembering similar efforts with OS/2 and am convinced that this and not IBM's lack of marketing capability at the end user level is what killed the very promising IBM OS.

Unix Should Have Been 'Universal' PC OS

A little "history" is in order here. Unix should have been the "universal" OS, but for a few trivial issues. Chief among these was Unix vendors' need to "tweak" their version of Unix, combined with hardware vendors' need to "tweak" their systems to "enhance" performance. Another factor (at the time) was the huge appetite Unix demanded of PC resources.

Result was that applications software had to be reconfigured/ re-compiled for each hardware platform and costs became prohibitive. While



this wasn't a problem for large shops with specific applications spread over a large user base, at the individual desktop it meant death. A major exception to this was the "workstation." Since these typically ran in the \$20,000+ range several years ago, they really weren't seen as "desktops," but as specific applications platforms for such tasks as CAD/CAM, graphics, stock tracking, etc.

That's a long way around the Apple OS X question. Could Apple do this for the Wintel platform? Sure. OS X is based on a Unix kernel (that Linus Torvalds, Linux creator, called 'ridiculous') and should be as easily ported to the Wintel platform as Linux. Would it be as stable as Win XP? That's a good question given the many, many variations of the Wintel platform and the vagaries of any installation and setup under such conditions.

My best guess is that Apple probably wouldn't want to invest the resources that would be needed to develop a Wintel-stable OS. I may be mistaken, though, and Apple may see this as an opportunity to expand their user base beyond the Macintosh.

Maybe Some of the MS v. Everybody Suit Demands to Port MS Office to Linux Aren't so 'Unrealistic' After all...

Looking at this from a different viewpoint, since MS already has ported Office to a Unix-based platform (Mac OS X), would it be that difficult to port Office to Linux?

I'm sure Microsoft would answer with another question: "Which version of Linux?" That's a realistic question as we are already seeing trends for divergence among the various "brands" of Linux available.

Microsoft Yields-Will Reveal Windows XP API's Other Data

Meanwhile, Microsoft yields to pressure and agrees to make some effort to supply information to vendors concerning the Windows XP API's and other factors needed by competing software products vendors. This had to be a soul wrenching and very painful (maybe) decision for the Redmond, WA, software giant.

It's a long way away from some states AG's demands that Microsoft unveil the Windows source code entirely and go into the world naked, so to speak. Microsoft has absolutely no intention of revealing any more intellectual property than is necessary to meet Federal demands. I have a suspicion that even this move left a very bad taste in Microsoft's leaders' mouths.

Microsoft appears to be really trying to walk the razor's edge—yielding some important data in the spirit of cooperation while protecting the greater bulk of Windows source code from competitors and erstwhile sworn enemies. It may not be enough for the state's AG's who have opposed any outcome to the massive antitrust case other than dissolution of Microsoft. These folks act as if they think the only "suitable" outcome would be having Microsoft executives Bill Gates and Steve Ballmer publicly drawn and quartered.

Fact that most of these stalwart defenders of the public weal are acting out of self aggrandizement and political ambition makes their behavior even less savory. I won't even suggest possibility of campaign contributions on the part of AOL/Time Warner, Oracle and Sun Microsystems as possible incentives to this AG's behavior.

AOL Under the Magnifying Glass? Good AOL PR Dofsn't Last Forever

Ahhh AOL/Time Warner. Guess whose accounting practices are coming under the magnifying glass? AOL has been skating for some time with the glory of being the largest Internet ISP and having fun keeping other competing ISP's from using "Instant Messaging" with/for AOL users. Several recent media reports indicate that AOL



may be playing a number of games with accounting practices and hedging on agreements with third-party program vendors.

In addition to 'musical chairs' with executives, accounting questions and discordant relationships, AOL is rapidly gaining a reputation for being the most difficult ISP to divorce for unhappy users. I've heard from several disgruntled AOL users that they have been extremely frustrated in attempting to sever their ties with AOL as their ISP. This has been repeated in several media studies that indicate that AOL has made divorce extremely difficult.

This is offset by multitudes of users who are very happy with AOL and who are surprised that anyone could be unhappy with the relationship. May be same tendencies that make some of us swear by MS Office, and others swear at MS Office and swear by some other office suite.

H-P Dumps Dell? Possible Dell Printers?

A last note this month is reputed rift between Dell and H-P over the ink jet printer issue. Dell supposedly has been considering branding their own inkjet printers and forsaking the H-P line they have been selling. Media reports that H-P, getting wind of these plans, has decided to discontinue their connection(s) with Dell. I'm not that sure I understand this move. H-P probably sells their printers at cost—or a loss—anyway, and counts on a profit from the inkjet replacement cartridges. Sounds like a tempest in a teapot—or inkject cartridge to me



A man was crossing the road one day when a frog called out to him and said, "If you kiss me, I'll turn into a beautiful princess."



you like about the camera and what you don't like.

We learned several new things about digital cameras in July. For instance, there can be a very long lag time from when the photographer presses the shutter button to when the camera actually captures the picture. This can make capturing fast action very difficult. I have done some more research on this subject and found that some higher priced cameras actually have mechanical shutters. On many cameras priced under \$1000 the shutter sound you hear is faked. Some cameras actually have menu options to turn the shutter sound off! I have heard concerns about some lower-end cameras that apparently have no mechanical shutter. With these cameras it is possible that inadvertantly pointing the lens at the sun could damage the CCD array. It might be good advice to keep the lens cap on until you are ready to take pictures, at least outside. See you at the meeting.

WOW! I Didn't Know That

Saving a Word Document in RTF Format

If you receive documents from others who use another word processing program, you probably experience problems working with those documents. Ask the sender to save their document in RTF, Rich Text Format, rather than their own application's format or even Word format.

In general, RTF is an excellent way to ensure file compatibility between word processing applications. Tables will work, inserted ClipArt will work, but you may lose some of Word's special features. For an everyday type of document, RTF is fine ... for sharing documents between different word processing applications.

What's Your Problem?

Marvin Brooke wanted to create a watermark of the word "Draft," diagonally on the page. Vertical, horizontal ... no problem; but, diagonal ... hmmm. Just when we think we know what we're doing, Word throws us a little surprise. :)

Rather than create a watermark, create a WordArt object. Here's how ...

It is easiest to do this on a "Whole Page" Zoom size (Edit | Zoom).

- 1. View | Header and Footer
- 2. From the Menu Bar: Insert | Picture | WordArt
- 3. At "WordArt Gallery," choose and edit a font, if necessary | OK
- 4. At "Edit WordArt Text:"
- a) At "Font" choose a font, if necessary
- b) At "Text" type: Draft | OK

"Draft" will still be in the font color of black. The WordArt toolbar should appear. If not, right-click either toolbar and choose: WordArt.

- 4. If necessary, drag the word "Draft" to a new location and resize it as needed
- 5. From the WordArt Toolbar, click: For- *FrontPage, Visio, and MapPoint Today* mat WordArt
- 6. On the "Colors and Lines" tab, at "Line | Color" choose: No Line
- 7. On the "Layout" tab, at "Wrapping Style," choose: Behind Text | OK
- 8. When done ... on the Header and Footer toolbar, click: Close

To Edit the WordArt ...

- 1. View | Header and Footer or- Double-click in the Header
- 2. Click on "Draft". "Draft" should have handles surrounding it, and the WordArt toolbar should be opened.
- 3. Make any changes provided by the WordArt toolbar
- 4. When done ... on the WordArt toolbar, click: Close

Operating Systems

Living with *Windows XP* has proven to be a somewhat mixed bag. After several months, I've really come to appreciate XP's stability and memory management. It's superb compared to Win9x, especially when running complicated operations.

Word 97 is a good example of the difference a stable OS can exert on a marginal application in some operations. I find myself frequently combining documents via copy and paste into a much larger document, then using global search and replace to alter formatting and finally shifting document fonts and sizes. In Win9x I have to be very careful in such operations to avoid a GPF

SIGs

error, i.e., the dreaded "Illegal Operation" message. I have yet to see such a message in *Windows 2000* or Win XP using Word 97 since both utilize "real" memory management.

Before anyone screams "What do you expect from a 'legacy' application," I also have Office 2000 and Office XP versions of Word. But, Word 97 does some things much better than the later version (or, I haven't figured out how to make them behave the way I wish yet).

That's the good news.

Trying to do anything that Microsoft didn't think a *totally novice user* should do is the bad news. Windows 2000 is miles ahead of XP in this respect and definitely more intuitive and easier to configure if the user wants it their way rather than Microsoft's way.

Inability to get rid of unwanted Microsoft "options" in many menu operations is becoming another sore point over time. I'm really tired of being pointed at MS's "partners" during many operations.

Compatibility is another area of pain. Although XP is much better at running legacy applications than Win 2000, there are still a number of applications that "almost work" in XP that I would rather not have to replace. This is one good reason for continuing in FAT32 in a dual-boot system.

About Last Month

Did our SIG have a fine meeting in July? You bet we did. We started our monthly demonstration with putting together power cords, LAN cables, VGA monitor cables, logging on to network, initializing digital projector, and greeting those wonderful members and guests.



New digital camera concepts are compared to the 35 mm camera as a necessity for understanding performance specifications. Also considered were some of the limitations of digital cameras due to size of sensors and practical size of working memory.

We had another fine hour with **Alan Lummas** at the helm. Alan gave us Part II in multimedia with sound. How to record audio. Which application programs to use. And of course, those free programs for the download and those that come with your Windows.

For August, we will explore Page Layout techniques with emphasis on using the CSS2 Positioning encouraged by the W3C.

As the Internet continues to evolve, one of the primary goals for Web designers is to speed up processing requests. Separating the content from the way the page should look does just that. It requires a modern browser to use the CSS2 standard, but my latest informal poll showed 85% of all visitors to one of my sites were using IE 6 or Netscape 6.x.

Using CSS for formatting and positioning allows you to:

- standardize a site
- * make changes quickly and easily
- speed up the page loads
- control the location of any element on the page

make fluid pages that change to accommodate the visitors device and software

Presentations is a lot of fun ... and easy! Use an existing outline in Word-Perfect or create your own from scratch. Add some sound and a little ac-

tion, and in no time, you've got a professional presentation!

September - Enhanced Shapes

WordPerfect 9 provides over 100 new shapes. You can choose a shape from any of the new shape palettes or use the Basic Shapes, Arrows, Stars, Banners, and Flowcharting Tools. Action Buttons prompt the assignment of an action; call-out shapes have pointers that can be anchored anywhere in the document. All shapes have the new Text-in-Shapes feature, which allows text to be added into the shape on the fly.

October - Bullets and Numbering

WOW! I Didn't Know That

Short Macro to Move to Last Position

Users of DOS versions of WordPerfect may remember Ctrl+Home as the shortcut for jumping back to your previous position. In Windows Ctrl+G, Alt+L, Enter will achieve the same thing. That's waay too involved for me.

Instead, you can create a short macro and add it to your toolbar or assign it to your keyboard.

Create the Macro

- 1. Open any document *-or-* at a blank document, type a few random characters
- 2. Tools | Macro | Record



- 3. When prompted, name your macro (for example, lastpos)
- 4. After the Macro toolbar appears, press: Ctrl+G, select Last Position | OK
- 5. Tools | Macro | Record ... again, to stop recording the macro

That's it for the foundation ... keep going!

Add this Macro to Your Toolbar

- 1. Right-click the toolbar | Edit
- 2. Macros tab | Add Macros button
- 3. Select your macro from the file list | Select
- 4. When prompted to save the macro with the full path, choose: Yes
- 5. OK ... to save the change

The macro is now the last button on your default toolbar (with the cassette image). The next time you need to jump back to your last position, just click the new button.




