

Graphics should be submitted in one of the "standard" formats, i.e., .TIF, .EPS, .GIF, .PCX or .JPG files. While "native" CorelDraw (CDR) files are also OK, other graphics editor native formats may not be convertible.

PROGRAMS & PRESENTATIONS . . . VINCENT GAINES

NTPCUG - MAIN PRESENTATION

Daniel Ogden, Co-Leader of the Application Developer Issues SIG, will present

"Microsoft Windows-PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE"

His presentation will focus on what the general Windows user needs to know about the various Windows operating systems in order to use his or her PC in the most efficient and enjoyable manner.

Dan will begin with a very brief overview of Windows through version 3.11, and then spend most of his presentation talking about how the Windows 95/98/ME operating systems compare to Windows NT/2000/XP. SOFTWARE REVIEW: QUICKEN 2003 DELUXE

Intuit's product line for PC's now includes: *Quicken 2003 Deluxe*, \$60; *Quicken 2003 Premier*, \$80, contains additional investment aids; *Quicken 2003 Premier Home and Business*, \$90, includes business cost estimates and invoices, and *Pocket Quicken, v 2.0*, \$40, for PDA's.

Intuit has discontinued *Quicken Basic*.

Quicken 2003 Deluxe has a new screen look. While the top menu bar looks and works very much as older versions did, the main screen has a new vertical menu that makes access to your accounts available with a single mouse click. The center portion of the screen shows the register for the currently open account with a tab that switches to a summary of that account

The budget and tax-planning tools are still present and can be helpful if you anticipate change in your income or expenses (perhaps a different vacation).

I experienced one minor difficulty in opening the home inventory data created in a previous version, but no problem with the bulk of my Quicken accounts. When finally opened, the home inventory worked as it always has and now opens easily.

The emphasis this year is on improved online banking and investments. Downloading from stock brokers is the primary additional focus of the Premier version. Downloading from banks and brokers has been available for the last several versions. The list of supported organizations continues to grow.

A small (76 page) manual is included which contains simplified instructions for many activities and directions to assist in finding additional information in the help files. I found the book useful in getting started. Chapter headings are:

1. Get the most from Quicken (decide how much detail you want to record)

2. Manage your income and expenses
3. Bank online
4. Manage your investments
5. Track investments online
6. Plan for tax time
7. Determine your net worth
8. Develop a long term plan
9. Contacting Intuit

The booklet explains the difference between using your bank or brokers Web site vs. downloading directly from sites the Quicken program has listed.


The included home inventory program is not mentioned in the booklet.

For more detailed explanations you might want to get a copy of *Quicken 2002, The Official Guide* by Maria Langer, published by Osborne/McGraw-Hill. There may be a new version for Quicken 2003, but I have not seen it yet.

Quicken has available for additional cost pre-printed checks, a Quicken Credit Card, On line bill payment, and a new arrangement with Muriel Siebert (a stock broker).

This Quicken user is not yet ready to enter PIN's into the program for automatic online connections, preferring to enter these manually. All things considered I like this new version. It continues the guided set up process and greets you by name each time it is started if you have entered your personal information.

Intuit product information is available at <http://www.intuit.com>. Additional products include Quick Books (accounting) and Turbo Tax (tax preparation and submittal). Computer stores in the DFW area currently stock most of these programs. If you are upgrading from a previous version, you can send off for a \$20 rebate from Intuit, provided you apply within 30 days of purchase and by November 30, 2002. Or you can purchase the product on line for a \$10 discount.



LINUX INSTALLATION IN A DUAL-BOOT SYSTEM WITH WINDOWS

[Ed Note: The following article was originally submitted as the September Linux SIG note by John McNeil. Because he presented the steps in a very detailed manner with significant cautions applicable to any OS installation, it is being published separately.]

Last month we talked about loading Linux, but let's face it; you can't dump Windows yet. Most of your files and almost all of your games are still attached to Windows. And even if you stopped playing games and move all of your data to Linux, there are reasons to keep Windows around after all. If you give me a few minutes I may even be able to think of some of them...

At this point in time there's no real need to rush out and buy a brand new PC. Most of them would probably come with Windows anyway, and **Lindows** seems to have no idea what they want to do, so you may as well just install Linux and let Windows and the Penguin reside happily on your system, together. Yes, both **Bill** and **Tux** can be roommates, just be sure Bill picks his dirty laundry up off the floor from time to time.

While you can get away with using the same PC for both Operating Systems, you may need to go out and buy some new hardware to make sure very thing goes smoothly, but we'll talk about that in a minute. At this point you're all surprised I didn't say, "Yes, just format c:\, and pop in your Linux CD." Well, remember those reasons I mentioned? Well I thought of some, and no, I don't have a headache...

First, Microsoft does have the Lion's share of the market; not only in operating systems, but in office applications, so if you ever work on stuff from the office at your PC at home, then you may need Windows. Second, if you create documents, you're going to want to print them, and Linux just isn't very good at printing yet... Third, most of you are probably using a dial-up Internet connection, and some modems (called WinModems) will only work under Windows, because they need special software to run. Naturally it is included in Windows, but it is usually not available in Linux, unless someone has written a version specifically for the penguin. Fourth, and most importantly to my mind, it is somewhat easier for a novice

user to make Windows somewhat secure. While it is true Linux can be hundreds or even thousands of times more secure than Windows, it takes some knowledge to make it so.

Now down to brass tacks. You want to install Linux, and you want to dual boot. Most of you are still waiting for me to say, "Okay, now you can format c:/ but forget about it because we are not there yet. The first thing I am going to say is:

'Back Up Your Data.'

Yes, I said it. You would think I shouldn't have to, but, there are probably going to be people who read this some day who won't be as smart as you or I, so I'm covering my – uh... Anyway, always back up your data, and I'm not talking about the programs you installed. I'm talking about the Letters to Grandma, that future New York Times Bestseller your writing, and yes even those MP3s you downloaded when you thought the RIAA wasn't looking. Make sure you've got everything...

Playing the Partition Shuffle.

So you've backed up everything, and you've rushed ahead, wanting to get the install over with. You've popped the CD into the drive, rebooted and are now in the Linux Installation program. Hmm, you muse to yourself, this doesn't look so bad What language do I speak? English, of course! Keyboard? Whatever the standard is, it must be this one that's selected... How

many mouse buttons does my mouse have? Uh, one – two – three – and uh, oh! Hey! There’s my name brand mouse listed!

But then you come to a nasty looking section that asks you to partition your hard drive. You see two buttons: one that says fdisk while the other says Disk Druid. You remember fdisk from your DOS days so you choose it, but then are thrust into an unfamiliar looking environment. You back out and use Disk Druid. This looks more comforting, but you’re not really sure what is what when it comes to which partition is which. Well this just goes to show that you can’t just install a system willy-nilly. You have to prepare.

In order to continue with the installation you must know on which partition your Windows system resides, which partition your data resided on and which partition(s) are available to install Linux is on. More than likely, your system and data is all on one partition, and since the object of the game is to install Linux that means you need to free up space. As you know, in most cases, you can’t create a new partition without destroying an old one and the data it contains. There is one exception to this rule: **Partition-Magic** from **PowerQuest** [] and similar programs can dynamically rewrite the Allocation Tables that form the Table of Contents for any partition. They can convert file systems [the formatting, such as FAT, FAT32, and NTFS]. They can resize partitions, making them larger or smaller. They can move partitions on a drive, taking a partition at the beginning of a hard drive, and putting it at the end. Of course, the easiest way to get more space, however, is to just add another hard drive!

Whatever method you use to resize, create, or delete, be sure to make note of which is which, as you will need to know that in order to do an install. Choosing the wrong partition onto which you wish to install, could mean loss of data, or the loss of your current Operating System.

Know Your Stuff.

By now you know that being unprepared could be near disastrous. One wrong move could mean the lost of a perfectly good and working system, or valuable data. Even if you don’t have either of these, it will

still be less work for you if you know what you have inside the case, the way the hard drives are installed and partitioned, the resolution of your monitor, etc. Incorrectly configuring an install could mean it won’t work. After all, if you can’t see what’s on your screen, you can’t log on, you can’t click on icons, and you can’t read your E-mail.


The best way to find out what you have installed is to look in Windows. The Device Manager can be an invaluable tool for finding out all the valuable little tidbits you need to get a Linux system up and running.

An even better way (uh, if the best way is to look in device manager, can there be a better way?) is a program called **Belarc Advisor**. [http://www.belarc.com/free_download.html] This little jewel of a free program will tell you more information than you wanted to know, but won’t overburden you with information.

In addition to basic PC system information such as CPU type and bus frequency, drive parameters motherboard, BIOS memory and memory locations, there’s more, including printers, installed software, installed Hotfixes, local drive volumes, network drive volumes, Host logins, IDE Controllers, Video, Sound, and Network Cards, USB devices and Software Licenses. Everything you want is here in a nice easy-to-read format. You should have all of this stuff (with the exceptions of Software Licenses and Host logins) ready to go. Some, if not all, of it may be automatically detected, but then again, some may not be, so it is best to be prepared.

Since you’re not likely to know what will be compatible or be detected the first time ‘round, do web

searches on your hardware. Find archived message board discussions where people have installed Linux on similar hardware platforms. Don’t be afraid to ask for help, either. At one time or another most people were in your shoes. Many newbies are likely to help other newbies in the hope that you will someday return the favor. Just be sure that your question is On Topic to that discussion group, and that it hasn’t already been covered in a previous discussion, or in the Board’s F.A.Q. (Always read the F.A.Q. and peruse the Archives!!!)



Another good way to find out about your hardware is to check out your Distribution's Hardware Compatibility Lists. The hardware that will be automatically recognized and configured will be on this list. Most name brand hardware will be on this list, so sticking with name brands is another great way of making sure your system will run perfectly the first time round. Also, avoid built-in's. That is, if it is built into the motherboard, it is slightly less likely to work, than if you had a stand-alone card. This is especially true of video, sound, and network cards. This is not to say that you can't make it work, but it is likely to be harder to do.

Other things that you need to know before you install Linux include your monitor's screen resolution, refresh and sync rates; which can usually be found in the user manual included with it. You will also need your IP Address for your computer if it is on a network or always-on Internet connection, as well as having your DNS server addresses handy. If your broadband connection uses PPPoE you'll need to know your username and password. People on dial-ups should have access numbers, usernames and passwords nearby.

The Distro Wars.

Now that you've prepared for the installation, we can begin. Before you can dual boot, you have to have two operating systems. We'll say one is Windows, but it is possible to dual boot between two different versions of Linux, UNIX, or FreeBSD. If you're using a Mac then you can boot between Mac's OS and Linux Distributions that are designed for the Mac. If you are on a Mac and are using OS X or higher, you don't even need to install Linux because OS X is running on FreeBSD, so you already have a version of UNIX.

I've thrown the word Distribution around quite a bit but what exactly is a Distribution? A Distribution (or Distro) is a collection of programs put out by a person or group, such


as Red Hat. There are distributions for everyone, from beginners to sysadmins. For us the two best distributions are Red Hat 7x (7.3 is best, 7.1 slightly worse, and avoid 7.2) and Mandrake Linux 8x (8.1 is good, and while I have not tried 8.2, I've heard good things.) In the SIG meeting you will likely end up seeing both. I have installed both on a couple of different machines. Both are simple to install and come with a wide array of software, or Packages.

The distribution that you choose will depend eventually upon your own tastes. We hear about all these arguments over which Linux Distribution is the best because people have personal preferences as to what makes a good Operating System.

Most Linux distributions are freely available on the Internet for download. They are available under what is known as the GNU General Public License (GPL). This means that software is "freely" available:

'When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom, not price. Our General Public Licenses are designed to make sure that you have the freedom to distribute copies of free software (and charge for this service if you wish), that you receive source code or can get it if you want it, that you can change the software or use pieces of it in new free programs; and that you know you can do these things.' (*The GNU General Public License (GPL)*, <http://www.opensource.org/licenses/gpl-license.php>)

In most cases when a product is available under the GNU GPL that means that it is freely available. Any distribution that is released under the GPL is freely downloaded. To download a distribution you can go either to that distro's website, such as redhat.com, or any number of Linux FTP sites that will have it. I prefer to download my copies of Linux in .ISO format from An .ISO is quite literally an image of a CD-ROM. Usually, around 600 MB, an .ISO contains all the information found on a CD. It is a special format which can be read by CD recording software such as Roxio's Easy CD Creator. It can not be used to directly install Linux, however; it must first be burned to a CD-R/CD-RW. If you do not have a CD Recorder, there is not much point in wasting your time downloading an



.ISO file because you will be unable to use it. In that case you would be better off purchasing a copy of Linux or getting a copy from a friend. The Linux SIG also has copies of Linux you can borrow. If you'd like to borrow one of the SIG's copies just see one of the SIG leaders. The CDs are available on a first-come basis.

The Install.

After all this time, I have yet to talk about the actual installation. All that has come before has been preparatory, and now the moment is at hand. It is at this moment that I will say, 'If you want, you may now format C:\.' This is not necessary, however. Formatting the C:\ drive will erase any data on it, and the beauty of this installation process is that it is not necessary. If you can, though, I would recommend blowing out Windows and starting with a fresh installation. This would allow you to design, from the beginning, a system with dual booting in mind. Whatever you do, you MUST install Windows first.

Windows, every time it is installed, rewrites the Master Boot Record (MBR). The MBR is typically the first sector on your hard drive, into which a small program is loaded that starts your operating system. If you install Linux the MBR is used to boot into Linux using whatever you means you choose. Under Linux, it will even allow you to choose whether you want to boot into Windows, hence the term Dual (or Multi) Boot. When you install Windows, the MBR is replaced with Windows boot system, which does not recognize Linux.

If you are doing a fresh install of Windows I would go ahead and use a Windows boot disk. If you don't have one, make one before blowing away Windows. You can use it to do all of your partitioning. Using the program fdisk included on most boot disks you can create the same sort of partitions that I have described below. Believe me, the fdisk included in the Windows boot disk is nowhere near as arcane seeming as the one available during the Linux installation, just follow the onscreen instructions. If you want more help with fdisk check out <http://fdisk.radified.com/> When using fdisk, create partitions

based upon their size in Megabytes. (1024 MB equals 1GB.) Don't worry about the labels or the formatting until you install each system. For right now set the second partition as active. Here is a format I once used for installing Red Hat 7.1 and Windows XP: (See Figure 1.)

As you can see, this plan gives me at least 24 Gigs of space for each OS. Windows gets more drive space because I tend to use it more. The partition HDB2 (The second partition on the second drive on the first IDE controller) is available to both Operating Systems and so can be used to move data back and forth between the two. Install Windows first onto the 2nd partition. If you are using NT/2000/XP go ahead and format it as NTFS. If you are using DOS/Win3.1/9x/ME use FAT or FAT32. Once you can boot into Windows format the first partition of the second hard drive (HDB1) as either NTFS or FAT/FAT32, again depending on your OS. Once you have verified that everything in Windows is fine you can begin installing Linux.

When you come to the part of the Linux install where it asks you to partition your hard drive use Disk Druid. It is not as confusing as fdisk and is more widely covered in the online documentation. Once Disk Druid starts you will be given the choice to add, edit, and delete partitions. Select each partition and choose edit. This will bring up a dialog that will allow you to set the label, format, etc. For more on Disk Druid check out

Another way to set up is to keep the two systems on separate hard drives. This would be especially good if, as in the case above you have one small hard drive

and one large hard drive and are going to need to use Windows applications more frequently, or just want to play with Linux. You can use the smaller of the two drives for Linux and the larger for Windows.

Now, lets say you don't want to get rid of your current Installation of Windows – Good. This is where software like PartitionMagic comes in. Your drive is full of Windows, so what you do is you resize the partition. This frees up space on which you can install Linux. You'll want at least 4 GB to play around with. (As I said before, 4 GB is a good size for an installation of Linux, but you can have more or less space. Naturally Linux runs well, even when it's on something as small as a floppy!) In this case using the chart above, if you only have one drive (the first drive or HDA), remember that you won't get all 4 Gigs for programs.

After you have resized the Windows partition, you will want to move it so that you will have at least 16MB for the /boot partition. You'll also need to create a partition approximately 3.9 Gigs in size for the / partition. This should leave you with a partition near 32MB in size, that can be formatted as swap space, and, since you are using PartitionMagic, you can do it all in a nice graphical environment (i.e. Windows.)

Once the disk is partitioned and formatted (again using PartitionMagic) you can begin the Installation. Use Disk Druid to set the labels for each partition. From that point on you should have everything you need in order to complete the install. Just follow the on-screen directions, use the help feature and when it asks you to choose an installation type, the first time 'round choose Workstation. When it asks you what boot loader you wish to use, I'd recommend using LILO. Choose a text-based startup. You'll have to use a command line in Linux sooner or later, might as well be sooner. Don't let the command line intimidate you. When you come to the X11 configuration, be sure to test each setting you choose. Have your video card and monitor manual and the notes you made while checking your hardware using the Belarc Advisor handy. In most cases it should detect the proper monitor settings, or it can find a default that will work just fine. Also be sure to have a floppy disk handy to make a Linux boot

disk. Believe me this disk can save your life!

When you are asked to enter a root password, make it a strong password using uppercase and lowercase letters, numbers, and even special characters like the exclamation point (!) and tilde (~). Write it down verbatim since passwords are case sensitive, and most importantly **KEEP IT IN A SAFE PLACE!** Don't have it on a sticky note attached to your monitor. Instead, make it something you can remember that won't be too obvious to other people.


Also, create a standard user to login as. Don't use Root on a daily basis. Only use Root for administrative tasks, and then do it offline, to avoid prying eyes. If, for some tasks as a normal user, you must have root access use the command `su` and then enter the root password. Be sure to quit `su` as soon as you are finished with that task. This is a good way to avoid accidentally damaging your system. It also is good protection against viruses. If you, as an average user, do not have permission to install software onto your system then you can't accidentally install a Trojan or Virus.

Remember don't be afraid to play around. You've backed up all your important data right? So what harm can come if you experiment? Don't be afraid to play with your system. Startx (note it's all one word) will get you into the GUI. To get help with a command type the command followed by `--help`.

While you're playing, be sure to check out . It's funny, but read the cartoon archives, otherwise things like the dust ball with eyes and feet will throw you...





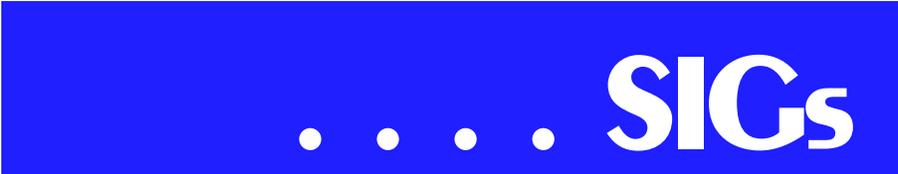

The July meeting of the Corel SIG was hosted by **Marsha Drebelbis**. Our two hours was also the feature presentation of the month. Marsha introduced our guest speaker **Dave Stuffenbeam** of the Corel Corporation. In addition to knowing Corel products Dave had extensive experience with Dream Weaver, Flash and Photoshop. The first hour was devoted to showing off some of the new features included in the upcoming release of Corel Draw Graphics Suite Version 11.0. The first improvement shown was the new stitching capability. It truly is an improved option. Next we were shown the new light effects as well as the new drop shadow effects. For the final part of the first hour, Dave demoed the 3 point rectangle tool, the 3 point eclipse tool and the interactive fill tool.

The second hour was only about 30 minutes long since the first hour ran over into the second hour. Dave showed how you could work in Corel Draw and use Knockout to do selection of a component in draw. He also talked a little about possible new products coming down the line. 



Unlike most dialog boxes that may only beep if you click outside them before closing them, the Find and Replace dialog box is an independent window of its own, able to float and wait, so you can re-use it with the current or other documents without having to close and re-open it.



You might ask why is it repeated here, then. Easy answer is that if you crank up the PC and the mouse dies (doesn't load) navigation anywhere can be a significant problem. Knowing the keyboard shortcuts will allow some Windows working or, at least, an orderly Windows shut down.

To change this distance:

1. Click in a Header or Footer so its Property Bar appears
2. Click the Header/Footer Distance button on the Property Bar
3. Adjust the spacing to suit you
4. OK

The new distance will apply to all pages.

If you have both Headers and Footers on the same page(s), you'll need to adjust both, as WordPerfect allows documents to have two Headers and two Footers, and each can have different spacing.


