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
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site traffic directly after the show. Quite a number of people took time out of their weekend to help in the booth.



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
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# Have You Met Martin Hellar & Thomas "Tuc" Goodwin?


His business card now clearly states "FINALLY RE-TIRED".

# Zero to Wireless

Mobility is the element that wins football games, soccer games and now computer driven ground wars. Going from zero to wireless is plugging a wireless access point onto your network.

Setup has come to the point that most basic installations work after a few minutes of "Can you see me now, Can you SEE ME NOW?"

Many applications have no noticeable performance loss over wireless but security is where you lose by most default setups. The same setup that makes it so easy for you to win the first "Can you see me now game" is also the same for a wandering hacker.

The problem begins when you plug in and don't bother or don't know to change the values set at the factory. The levels of security vary with equipment but all share channels and SSID's. The Service Set Identifier or SSID is a 32 character identifier used as a password for wireless LANs or WLAN's to use the acronym. Every WLAN and those with access must use the same SSID which in itself is a security hole. How many times does everyone use the same password? In WLAN's the SSID is actually broadcast every few seconds in plain text. Search for NetStumbler software if you want to see how easy it is to get on someone's network.

This common SSID issue applies to every vendor equally and is the downside of having a standard where equipment interoperates with other competing vendors. There are complete encyclopedias of the default SSID and administration

access information. See January Texas Technology article "War Driving."

Hopefully, the equipment you bought allows for turning off default broadcasting the SSID. This does help but the SSID can still be sniffed in the packets going from station to station.

Turning on WEP encryption is the next security precaution to implement and just slows down but does not prevent your network from being breached. If someone wants on your network and has the patience WEB encryption can be decoded. Generate your own WEP keys in any case. This will be explained in your equipment documentation.

Look for the ability to limit access by MAC address. The MAC address is a unique hardware identifier for every network card and does provide a much higher level of denial for you. It is worth the time to set this up especially if your environment is reasonably small and you aren't using consultants to get up and going.

Moving up the security ladder is EAP (Extensible Authentication Protocol) authentication but not all WLAN access points support this especially in the lowest price range. EAP helps administrators with the issue of WEP keys. Since the basic access points require manually assigning and changing the keys, security is improved as EAP dynamically changes WEP keys and uses an authentication database, eg RADIUS before permitting a user to utilize the WLAN for other services. EAP opens the door for more security using token cards, certificate exchange etc


This is more for large corporations with hefty budgets. If you haven't bought wireless yet ask about support for internal EAP authentication and be sure your access device has upgradeable antennas using BNC style connectors.

It is possible to secure your wireless network and does require a little planning. By combining the WLAN security features of a quality access point or wireless router you can make it difficult if not essentially impossible to breach your network. "Can you see me now?"

# Microsoft in Court Again? – New Suit May Reheat 'License v. Product' Fight If Class Action Status Allowed by Judge

Mary Levitas Hamilton may have fired the first shot that could smash millions of windows in late September.

It started in Los Angeles, CA, where Marcy Levitas Hamilton is plaintiff in a suit against Microsoft, *The Wall Street Journal* reported October 2, 2003, that "Alleges that a failure by Microsoft to provide adequate security in its software allowed unauthorized access and use of personal data such as bank account information."

Suit, styled as a class action suit, was filed on her behalf September 30, 2003 in the Los Angeles Superior Court by Attorney Dana B. Taschner. Ms. Taschner is a torts attorney, specializing in plaintiff law, according to a report on the suit at http://www.techextreme.com. Full text of the filing is available at: http://blog.seattlepi.nwsource.com/microsoft/ archives/hamiltonsuit.html

An alternative would be to do a Google search on "Marcy Levitas Hamilton" and look for the heading "DANA B."

According to the filing, plaintiff "Experienced unauthorized access, use and theft of her personal data and social security number, experiencing damage to financial and bank account data, information and financial holdings, which plaintiff alleges was due to the failure of Microsoft to provide adequate security" The filing also states that millions of possible other individuals may join the plaintiff in the suit.

## What the filing didn't state was:

[1.] When the damage occurred,

[2.] What version of Windows was involved,

[3.] How was she connected to the Internet, dial up or "always-on" broadband,

[4.] What security measures did the plaintiff take beforehand, i.e., did her PC have operational and up-to-date virus scanning software and a firewall program,

[5.] Why she had such sensitive data available on her computer,

[6.] Since it was there, Why wasn't it encrypted?

I make these points because, at some point in the hearing, she will have to disclose all the above

and actually prove the damage occurred. Just saying it happened won't be enough. She'll most probably have to submit her PC to Microsoft's (or court appointed) technical experts as well.

# 'Typical garden-variety user?'

A few words about the plaintiff are in order here. Marcy Levitas Hamilton is well known as a film and TV editor and producer in Los Angeles, has edited eight feature films, been awarded two Emmys and was a member of the original editorial and design team for MTV. She holds a BA degree with Honors in Media & Communications from Webster University (campus not specified.) The above was taken from a bio on Ms. Hamilton on her corporate Web site: http://www.tricoast.com/marcybio.html



This would tend to indicate that Ms. Hamilton must be, at very least, a fairly bright woman with both familiarity with English and technical equipment and processes used film and TV production editing. Also, in her role as editor and producer, she would have to be aware of the extreme security concerns and efforts of the movie and TV industry.

I make this point for a reason—she is described by her attorney in several news stories about the suit as a "Typical garden-variety user." (I wonder how I would be described by her attorney?)

# Just a first shot?

Is this just the first shot in a looming and probably protracted battle between Microsoft and drooling, ravening hoards of torts attorneys eager to get their piece of MS's riches, \$49 billion in cash, via what I think is a 'bogus' class action law suit?

I have images here of the initial stage of what may become sharks at a feeding-frenzy.

Sharp-eyed readers of the initial filing may recognize a lot of the assertions made in the document. It was described in a recent CNET News.com as mirroring a recent report that "Microsoft's dominance endangers national security," authored by seven well-known security professionals who





were described by other media as enemies of Microsoft.

# What makes this suit so interesting

While you and I know we don't purchase software, we just purchase a license to use software, this suit is apparently looking at software as a purchased product.

The filing alleges that the Microsoft license *isn't* binding since Microsoft is a monopoly and users have very limited choices in the matter.

I don't think the Linux or UNIX folks would agree that the users' choices are that limited. I also don't think that production software choices are that limited. Just for kicks, how many vendors of Linux and UNIX are there for the PC?

# New California laws

In addition to the "licensing is invalid because of monopoly" argument, the suit states that Microsoft is in violation of California Civil Code Section 1798.82 (California Security Act or "CSA.") among other California code violations (see pages 10 and 11 of the filing.) In short and without the legalese, companies doing business in California are required to immediately notify California resi-

dents of possible security breaches.

Maybe it doesn't work in California, but I've gotten several MS E-mails notifying me of possible holes in Windows, Internet Explorer and all and various components of the Microsoft Office suite over the past several months.

# One area I'll agree on

The suit does assert that Microsoft's security bulletins are too hard for the "average" user to understand and therefore, aren't effective or sufficient. Anyone who has attempted to un-



derstand Microsoft's technical jargon in the security bulletins (or on most of Microsoft's Knowledgebase) simply has to at least partially agree with this point.

I know some IT professionals who also have difficulty understanding Microsoft's language and syntax here. This is definitely an area that needs work and, hopefully, Microsoft will employ some non-technical writers to enhance clarification for the "average" user.

# Auto updating rears its ugly head

Is mandatory user updating just around the corner? Microsoft wants it. I'm dreading such a potentially dangerous operation as a result of past experiences with Microsoft patches (mostly in Windows NT 4.0) that created more problems than they solved.

This may be the only way Microsoft can do the patches without alerting hackers of the discovered vulnerabilities. One of the assertions made in the suit is that Microsoft's patching process actually

helps hackers exploit new vulnerabilities before users can install them. The "Blaster" debacle is an example of this aspect as well as another—user indifference to the need to update and install security patches after notification. (This includes a lot of IT professionals in addition to the "average" users.)

# Along the lines of Safety Inspections?

As much as we don't want the process, think of auto safety inspection requirements along the same lines. States make this mandatory to protect others on the road as well as the affected individuals. But, even Texas has a loophole in this area, autos over 25 years-old or are driven less than 5,000 miles/year are exempted from recent emissions testing requirements.

# Final (for now) thoughts

There are several assumptions here that are very tempting. First is that the plaintiff, Ms. Hamilton, never reads a newspaper, never watches TV news, never talks with anyone even vaguely familiar with the appropriate maintenance and operation of PC's and probably restricts any outside information she finds unpleasant from entering her domain.

Second, Microsoft is going to fight this with all the weapons at their disposal. There's just too much at stake not to.

Third, if this matter were filed anywhere besides California (or Massachusetts) I'd think it had very little chance of success for the plaintiff. That said, however, it was filed in California in the heart of Los Angeles and, as a result, all bets are off given recent events in that state.

# What We Have Here is a Failure to Communicate – Kodak 'Support' Leaves an Awful lot to be desired



This is a tale of non-support and, perhaps, why Kodak (formerly Eastman Kodak) is losing market share to Fuji and others. It all began with a retirement gift, a Kodak DC4800 digital camera, given to me when I retired from the Dallas VA Medical Center April1, 2001. *Windows XP* was already on the streets then.

At the time, that was a pretty expensive gift, around \$800, so it definitely wasn't a "throwaway."

The DC4800 was an OK camera: 3-megapixel resolution,

some nice features and it preferred to make all the picture-taking decisions itself. Actually, the user did have some control over camera settings, but finer tuning was available only through a software package supplied with the camera.

Software worked fairly well, if not intuitively, running under Windows 98SE.

When we moved all our machines to Win 2000 and Win XP, software reinstalled without a hitch. Only problem was it could no longer "see" the DC4800 connected to the USB port, and couldn't get to the camera settings. Win XP could "see" the camera and could download photos from the DC4800.

I took the software through all three levels of XP's Compatibility settings to no avail.

# Here's where the fun begins

I went to the Kodak (they have dropped the 'Eastman' moniker) Web site Support area and searched for a newer, Win XP friendly, version of the software package that came with the camera. It was an interesting experience taking the user back-and-forth between FAQ's and product descriptions, including radio buttons that weren't live, etc.

Kodak did have E-mail support help, after you could find it, so I sent in a description of my problem. I received a confirmation message within minutes.

Somewhat later in the day I received a suggestion that I download the latest version of Kodak *Easy-Share* to solve my problem. I did so and installed the program.

Again, EasyShare did not have the capability to alter the DC4800 settings. From all appearances,



EasyShare is primarily a Kodak subscription photo printing service.

Another round of E-mails and confirmations followed with essentially the same results—suggestion that I download EasyShare to solve the problem.

A little miffed, I sent a somewhat more aggressively worded E-mail requesting contact with someone with knowledge of operating systems and photography. This time the reply was a little later in coming.

Gist of the reply was "you just can't get there from here," i.e., the software won't run under Windows XP and a newer version for the DC4800 camera wasn't available.

# Choices, choices, choices

I was left with two choices, either get a new camera (definitely not with a 'Kodak' label) or retrofit Win 98 SE on one of our PC's which can't be easily done after Win 2000 or Win XP is installed.

I may do both. I want a higher-resolution and more user-controlled camera, and have the parts to construct yet another PC. I have been thinking of making it a print server and can easily do a dualboot machine with Win 98SE (installed first to run the Kodak software) and Win 2000.

Connie can have the DC4800—if she'll take it after all this.





## Internet

At the September meeting, we focused on safely and securely connecting your PC to the Internet. In case you missed it, here are a few notes from the discussion:

#### 1. Use a firewall.

We discussed the difference between hardware and software firewalls, what they do, how they work, and which is appropriate for dial-up and cable/DSL connections. We also looked at how TCP/IP ports work.

#### 2. Use anti virus software and update it frequently.

We discussed the pros and cons of using Norton, McAfee, Panda and Trend anti virus programs. There were strong opinions expressed (both pro and con) for Norton and McAfee. Panda is gaining popularity since there is a "free" version.

#### 3. Back up your data.

This is good advice not only because of the harm viruses can do, but also because PC hardware is not perfect. It's not a question of whether you will loose data on your PC (you will), but when it happens, how much effort it will take to get it back? If you routinely backup data every time you finish working with a PC application, your exposure to this type of problem will be minimized.

# 4. Keep system software patched and up-to-date.

Use the Microsoft Windows Update feature at *http://windowsupdate.microsoft.com* to check for security patches, and don't forget the Microsoft Office updates at *http://office.microsoft.com*.

#### 5. Be suspicious.

Think about all the "free" stuff you download from the Internet. It takes a lot of money to run a popular web site,

# **Operating Systems SIG**

The October Operating Systems SIG session promises to be a lot of fun following on the heels of the most recent (as of this writing) attempt in California to shake Microsoft down for their "buggy" Windows software. (See this month's *Variety Store* for more details.)

Dual-booting possibly Software solution What happens when you need to regress to an earlier version of the operating system—and why would you need to do this in the first place? For an example and explanation of such a need (temporary, I hope) see my struggles with Kodak over Windows XP in this month's *Variety Store*. Short version is that the camera software supplied with my Kodak DC4800 in 2001 simply won't work with Windows later than Win 98SE.

I discovered this marvel of modern technology support after converting all our production machines to Win XP. Unfortunately most of the control function options with the DC4800 are only available via the camera software that doesn't work with the newer Win versions.

Since I've been interested in a newer digital camera with higher than the DC4800's 3.1-megapixel resolution, a new camera might be the easiest solution. One issue that makes this less than attractive is fact that the camera was a retirement gift and cost approx. \$800 two years ago when I retired from the Dallas VA.

#### Adding a single-purpose PC?

Most obvious solution would be a retrograde Win 98SE installation on a standalone PC. That's one more PC taking up space, however, for the sole task of adjusting camera controls. There just isn't that much spare room space conveniently available at this time.

There's lots of disk space available for a dual boot Win 98SE installation on at least two PC's. Here's the problematic rub.

You can't install Win 98SE on top of Win 2000 or Win XP since Win 98SE insists on writing a new Master Boot Record (MBR) over the later version's



MBR's, thus making it impossible to access 2000 or XP. Wind 98 simply has to come first and 2000 or XP afterward without resorting to exotic multiple OS boot managers that may or may not work well.

Also, 98SE doesn't work in NTFS partitions (volumes). So, at least one partition where 98SE and the application software reside will have to be FAT32. If you've converted to NTFS, you'll have to re-convert to FAT32 on the selected partition. (Both Win 2000 and Win XP can work with both NTFS and FAT32, but Win 98SE can only "see" FAT32.)

I'm really looking forward to uninstalling XP, installing 98SE, and then re-installing XP. What makes this even less appealing is fact that I'll lose most of my "tweaked" settings in the process, which will require hours to restore—if I can remember what I did to tweak them in the first place.

#### A more graceful solution?

There may be a more graceful, efficient solution available. A number of manufacturers offer plug-in disk modules that allow switching drives easily and quickly. I do have a couple of "spare" 20G+ drives, one of which could be devoted to this purpose as a bootable Win 98SE disk in place of the bootable 2000 or XP disk. It could save a lot of work in the process.

I'll be interested to hear SIG members' experiences with this possibility as well as what I am sure will be a somewhat

> heated discussion of the ins and outs of the Microsoft Windows security suit issues.

# **PC Concepts**

Our September program was planned to cover possible solutions and cures for system crashes and loss of programs and valuable data. We had succeeded in setting the stage for several problem instances and also cures for those malfunctions. Our largest problem of the day was due to our program being centered around prepared material using a digital projector and displaying details upon a large screen.

Whoops! No digital projector was available. I resorted to the time-honored procedures available with slate chalk boards and white chalk. This worked well except for instances where genuine live examples of complexities needed to be displayed for all to see.

We did not finish all of the planned material and noticeably missing were those itemized preventive measures which either preclude the crisis or make recovery and restoration much less painful.

In October, the Concept SIG will briefly recapitulate drastic failures and show how preliminary preparations will ease corrections. Emphasis will be placed on content of our stored information planning using the following:

- What should we have done to make recovery easier?
- Maintain a database of what is installed.
- Which updates have been performed?
- Copies of configuration setups
- Possible self-discipline to avoid high risk areas.

What do we do besides panic when we get the following symptoms?

✤ An abundance of error messages





- Lose control of your cursor
- Ctrl/Alt/Del no longer works
- You must attempt to re-boot several times before successful.

We will discuss these and other symptoms. I will also try to get those September draft copies we had used tidied up and placed into final reports as handouts.

We will review portions of September's program, as necessary, to include projected screen examples.

If you are a new computer user please come on in. We help users get started with new systems and also for introducing concepts on technologies from basic PC computers through advanced word processing, data management, and digital photography. Our goal is to GET STARTED with techniques one hasn't used before and for performing exciting things with PC principles we've already started.

bility In the computer industry, accessibility refers to

For software to be fully accessible, users with special needs must be able to identify where they are in the application, determine what operations can be performed at that point and access all the major features of the application.



- keyboard focus location—providing assistive software, such as screen readers, with the keyboard focus location
- high contrast—supporting operating system accessibility features for high-contrast display
- ✤ system settings for size—supporting operating system accessibility features for display size settings
- ✤ alternatives for sounds—providing visual cues as an alternative to sound events
- system settings for timings—supporting operating system accessibility features for timings and animation, and allowing the user to control the parameters of timed responses
- system settings for mouse-providing compatibility with specified mouse input settings

compatible with voice dictation software—supporting Dragon NaturallySpeaking®, a powerful voice dictation application that lets users create and format text or data in WordPerfect Office 11 by speaking to their computer

WordPerfect Office is also enhancing its products to meet government and industry standards through benchmarking its products, implementing modifications to ensure its products meet accessibility guidelines (as defined by Section 508 of the United States Rehabilitation Act) and more frequent testing of products, including performing a beta test focused on accessibility issues. In addition, they are working with other software and hardware vendors to ensure that their accessibility aids, such as screen readers, work with WordPerfect Office 11 components.

Accessible Installation: WordPerfect Office 11 features an installation program that can be completely controlled using a keyboard and that can interact with assistive software such as screen readers, allowing individuals with special needs to access the options and commands presented during the installation process.

Creating custom interfaces: WordPerfect Office 11 has customization features that let you create your own unique workspace with the display options and settings you prefer. You can create and modify toolbars, the prop-

erty bar, the application bar, menus and keyboard shortcuts.

For example, you can add or remove commands from the menu or toolbars and control the placement and content of toolbars, including the property bar and application bar. You can also rename or rearrange commands and toolbar buttons, and you can assign your own unique keyboard shortcuts for commands.

Using the scripting languages included with WordPerfect Office 11, you can also create custom dialog boxes to simplify complex tasks or add extra functionality to the applications.

Simplifying Complex or Repetitive Tasks: WordPerfect Office 11 includes three powerful scripting languages: PerfectScript, Microsoft Visual Basic for Applications and ObjectPAL.

You can automate repetitive tasks or simplify complex tasks by creating macros in one of those languages. You can also create macros that work between applications. 
