Congratulations to Larry Linson on his recent recognition by Microsoft as one of their MVPs (Most Valuable Professionals). "Most Valuable Professional" an annual award given by Microsoft to individuals not employed by Microsoft who consistently and frequently provide good answers to questions in the microsoft.public newsgroups (freely available from <http://www.news.microsoft.com>).

Larry is one of about a hundred MVPs for the Access product, and a few thousand in the program for all Microsoft software products.

In April, 2003, Larry completed 10 years as SIG Leader of the NTPCUG Access SIG, which he founded. Microsoft Access is a widely used relational database program for personal computers. The SIG currently meets

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PowerQuest V2i Protector

A new generation of image backup software

Most people have had unpleasant experiences with backups. Either data has been lost or backup software has not performed correctly. Backup software is often complicated, unreliable, and only one small part of a costly tape solution. Disaster recovery and the ability to backup open files require expensive additional software.

PowerQuest addresses many of these issues with their V2i Protector product.

Image Backups


Image Backups are an alternative to traditional file based backup software such as Veritas *Backup Exec* or CA *Arcserve*. Image backups operate below the file system. Image backup software is extremely fast and can backup open files. As a result of operating below the file system, the image backups usually have to back up entire disk volume.

I have used image backup solutions in the past and have found them to be a powerful solution. I found image backups were almost always successful and the products required almost no maintenance. I have used *Stac Replica* to backup Windows NT 4 and Netware 4 servers and *Ghost Enterprise Edition 7.5* to backup Windows 2000 servers. *Stac Replica* was never developed beyond Windows NT 4 and *Ghost* requires downtime as it only runs from DOS. *V2i Protector* goes far beyond both of these products.

The V2i Protector Image Backup Solution

V2i Protector uses PowerQuest's Virtual Volume Imaging (V2i) technology to create a snapshot of the server as it exists at the instant a backup begins. This image is a low level image of all data on the hard disk at the sector level. Only sectors containing data are backed up. The data is compressed and written to a backup file.

V2i Protector monitors the file system for any changes. Any changes are written to the hard disk as normal. *V2i Protector* saves the old, overwritten data to a temporary space. The old data is written to the backup image. This ensures that you have a snapshot of the server as it existed when the backup began.

V2i Protector has a built-in scheduler facility and provides email notifications upon the completion or failure of a backup.

Restoring files is done from within Windows. A backup image file can be mounted as a drive letter, and then files can simply be copied out of the image. Disaster Recovery is performed by booting the server from the V2i Protector CD. This will boot the server into the PowerQuest Recovery Environment from which you can browse the network and choose an image to restore.

V2i Protector does not eliminate tape backups or other off line backup methods. It is still critical to have offsite backup storage. Enterprise customers will use tape solutions while small businesses may use DVD burners.

V2i Protector can be used with Windows 2000 Server and Windows 2000 Advanced Server. The minimum requirements are a 133Mhz processor and 256M RAM.

Installing V2i Protector

Installing V2i Protector is simple and fast. You will be required to reboot your server. You select to install which tools you want to install: I chose to install both the backup agent and management tools on my test server.

Next you will be prompted to choose which options to install: I chose to install all options. The package does not take much disk space and

I prefer to have all the tools and documentation available on the server.

You then provide an account under which the backup agent will run: You will supply the owner and serial number and you will need to accept the license agreement when it is displayed.

The next stage is a very important message that should not be ignored:

The text of the message is:

It is highly recommended that you boot the server using the V2i Protector CD. Doing so will take you into the PowerQuest Recovery Environment (PQRE). From the PQRE, open either the Recovery wizard or the Image-Browser, and browse the program to ensure that the PQRE recognizes your server hardware and can see the network. This verification will also ensure that you can access backup images while running under PQRE.

If the verification is unsuccessful, please refer to the topic "Network Connectivity During a Restore" in the V2i Protector documentation. This topic will give you troubleshooting information.

IMPORTANT: The PQRE is based on Microsoft's Windows PE (Preinstallation Environ-

ment), which is a subset of Windows XP. When you run either Windows PE or Windows XP, the operating system automatically converts any NTFS 3.0 partitions on the hard disk to NTFS 3.1.0

In particular, if you happen to boot an NT4 system with this CD, you will be prompted to upgrade the hard disk to NTFS 3.1. If the NT4 system has Service Pack 4 or later, it can be upgraded safely. Before performing any such upgrade you should backup the system.

Next you will be prompted as follows be given the option to run the V2i Security Configuration Tool. This tool allows you to select which users can access the backup agent. You will then be prompted to reboot, which you should do. This completes the installation.

Performing backups with V2i Protector


Backups are performed with the V2i Protector management console and the management console allows you to backup volumes as well as restore non-system volumes.

To perform a backup, you select a volume and click the Create Image icon. You are prompted for a description of the image and then to schedule the image:

The scheduling options are quite simple. Keep in mind that image backups always perform a full backup. There are no complicated tape rotations of full and incremental or differential tape backups. The only option that I would like to see here is a weekday backup to create backups on the 5 weekdays when businesses are typically open.

Next you will select the destination of the backup:

V2i protector must store its backups on a hard drive, whether it is local or a share on another computer. The images cannot be written directly to a removable media. In the above image I have selected to store the images in a share on another server. Since this is a scheduled backup, it will automatically generate recurring names.



If this was a manual backup you would only be prompted for a destination and file name.

You are now prompted for advanced options:

In my testing I found the standard compression to provide a good balance of performance and compression. By default the verify option is selected – as it should be! Since this is a recurring backup I can select how many images I want to keep. This prevents the backup repository from running out of space. This option will delete old images to make room for new images.

There is also an option to divide image files into sections. This makes it easy to copy backups to CD or DVD media for off-site storage.

Next is the command files menu: You can specify scripts or programs to execute at different points of the backup. A common use would be to prepare a SQL server for backup and then set it back to normal operation when the backup is complete.

In the V2i Protector Management Console there is also an Agent Properties icon. The Agent Properties allow you to set a default backup destination as well as email notifications:

When you enter the email information a test message is automatically sent.

Restoring Files

With traditional file backups restoring files requires dealing with cataloging systems that can be complicated and are prone to failure. Restoring files with V2i Protector is simply elegant.

Restores are performed with the PowerQuest Image Browser. You then browse to and select the backup image you want to restore from. At this point you can fully access the files with the image browser.


The real elegance of the solution is when, in the left pane you click to select the image file, then on the file menu you choose mount volume.

This will mount the image as a drive letter on the computer. You can even share the image so it is accessible from other computers!

PowerQuest Recovery Environment

The Power Quest Recovery Environment (PQRE) is accessed by booting the server with the V2i protector CD. The CD will boot the server into the PQRE, which is based on Windows PE. You will see a screen that looks familiar to Windows 2000 and Windows XP users:

Note: Make your life easy and use a good brand name NIC in your server. I prefer Intel NICs. These NIC are very high quality and have excellent driver support. In choosing Intel or 3COM you will most likely avoid any driver issues when it is time to restore!



After several minutes the PQRE menu will appear: Within the PQRE environment you have full access to your network as well as the server hard drives. The Image Browser can be used to restore files and directories, just as the Image Browser in Windows.

There are a number of utilities provided:

The utilities are:

- PARTINNT.EXE View partition tables
- PQBOOT32.EXE Mark a primary partition as bootable
- PTEDIT32.EXE Edit the partition table. Experts only - it operates at very low level.
- RESTOREMBR.EXE Save or restore the hard disks MBR
- SMEDUMP.EXE Provides information for tech support
- IPCONFIG.EXE View, release or renew IP address
- PING.EXE Test IP connectivity

Note: after making partition changes with PTE-DIT32.EXE – such as deleting existing partitions, you need to reboot before attempting a restore. The OS is unaware of the changes until a reboot occurs.

Disaster Recovery

PowerQuest has gone to great lengths to make disaster recovery nearly effortless. V2i Protector fully supports bare metal restores: restoring to a blank unformatted, un-partitioned drive. No preparation is needed.

Click on the Recovery Wizard to perform a disaster recovery. After an introduction screen you are prompted to browse to find an image. Then I select the image I want to restore:

Then you are prompted for restore options: The options are common sense. During the recovery no new bad sectors can be encountered. If bad sectors are encountered, you should partition and format (not quick format!) the partition before

hand. The format process will mark the sectors as bad, which will allow the recovery to succeed.

Performance and Testing Results

The test environment consisted of a test server named Mahoro and a server named Belldandy which stored the backup images. The network is a switched 100Mbps Fast Ethernet network.

During testing I performed 10 image backups, both manual and scheduled.

In the last timed test I chose to create a segmented backup in 650Meg segments, suitable for archiving to a CD Burner. This test failed. I attempted 2 more times to create a backup image with 650 Meg segments, and 3 times to create a backup image with 700 Meg segments. Every time the backup failed when it tried to complete the first 650 Meg segment and start creating the second 650M segment. The problem is being investigated with PowerQuest.

Out of ten successful backups I encountered a problem with one. The backup succeeded, and it verified successfully. I was able to restore files using the image browser and verify the image files integrity. I was able to successfully perform a disaster recovery. Unfortunately when I rebooted the server after the restore, the server would generate a BSOD during startup.

I reproduced the problem 3 times. All other image backups and restores were successful.

Although only one image was “bad” it is a point of concern. No errors were given, and I was able to restore files and validate the backup using the Image Browser. I only discovered the backup was bad when I attempted to perform a disaster recovery.

Summary


PowerQuest V2i Protector is a very promising product that is easy to recommend. It has built-in open file management and bare metal disaster recovery. These features are very costly options for traditional backup solutions. The ease of restoring files is fantastic compared to more complicated restore processes involving tape.

It is important to understand that most businesses will still need an additional backup process. Enterprise customers will want to store the images on tape for offsite storage. Still, there are significant benefits gained with V2i protector in conjunction with tape solutions.

V2i protector is especially appealing for small businesses. Traditional tape backup solutions require a budget that is difficult for many small businesses. V2i protector can be part of a comprehensive backup solution at a greatly reduced cost. Many small businesses could a very cost effective solution by having a workstation with a large hard drive to hold 10 or 15 days backups and a DVD burner for offsite backups.

My only concern is that its \$695.00 price tag will hinder its acceptance in the small business market. I would like to see a small business edition with restrictions at a lower price.

Justice at Last— Spammer Caught By EarthLink, Sued and Enjoined From Future Spamming Efforts

Justice prevails—at least for a little while. Thought the following would be a poignant and joyous entry to this column. It's a distillation of two stories that ran in *The Wall Street Journal* in early May.

The big news here is that a spammer, the 'Buffalo Spammer,' lost big time in a suit brought to court by EarthLink Inc. Subject of EarthLink's suit was Buffalo N.Y. resident Howard Carmak who evidently went a little too far in his spamming efforts. EarthLink was awarded \$16.4 million and gained an injunction against the 'Buffalo Spammer.'

What brought EarthLink down on Carmak? Seems he was quite industrious during the past year, according to EarthLink, to the tune of sending more than "825 million spam e-mails on EarthLink's network" according to *WSJ's* Julia Angwin who authored the two-piece series.

Information revealed in the two pieces raised some significant questions. Object of spam is to get folks to send you money or use their credit cards to pay for whatever you are advertising. He effectively hid, for awhile, using a series of other people's names for telephone lines and PO boxes which made him very difficult to trace according to the articles. In addition to the above, he used 343 EarthLink accounts—created by the spammer using "false identities and stolen credit-card or bank-account information," Ms. Angwin reported in describing the EarthLink lawsuit.

I'm not sure about New York law, but there have to be actions involved at a felonious level in all this subterfuge. I'm pretty sure renting a PO box under a false or "stolen" name

for the purpose of criminal activity would be covered by some federal statutes that could lead to prosecution.

The *WSJ* articles, unfortunately, didn't mention whether criminal action would be considered in the Howard Carmak case. After screening and deleting 100+ spam messages yesterday, a little Carmak time in some "corrective" institution might be beneficial. It would make me feel better

Mr. Carmak's suit wasn't the largest award EarthLink has won. They were victorious in a similar suit against a Tennessee spammer to the tune of \$20 million last year. EarthLink really doesn't expect to collect—spammers are largely shoestring operators with very little in the way of cash or other assets according to Ms. Angwin.

The Net Giveth & The Net Taketh Away Microsoft Discovers in April

Ahhhhh The Internet. Microsoft finds the Net is indeed a two-edged sword. Much of Windows' immense popularity—and \$\$\$ sales—is a direct result of Windows customers' desire to be active on the Web.

Microsoft felt the sword's second edge when it was discovered that a "leaked" key code for installing *Windows Server 2003* made its way onto the Internet in early April. Those of us who have installed/upgraded to *Office XP* or *Windows XP* since their introduction have had the pleasant experience of Microsoft's "activation" policy requiring going to Internet to activate the new installation. It can be a much less than trivial matter.

For one thing, the code "locks" on much of the user's hardware in that significant changes performed in upgrading their PC may result in subsequent need to "chat" with Microsoft in order to get permission to continue using their machine. Making telephone calls to MS to accom-

plish this can be quite frustrating on occasion.

Big-time users, folks who install on 100's or 1,000's of PC's are spared this inconvenience. They receive a key code that bypasses the need for over-the-Internet activation. While I don't disagree that Microsoft should take care of their bread-and-butter customers (above), I do disagree with the concept that Microsoft believes most of its "small" customers—You and me—are either potentially or actively dishonest.

Are Microsoft's feelings/suspicious groundless? Paranoia is never without a seed of truth hidden beneath the delusional overlay. 25% of the software used in the United States is pirated according to Business Software Alliance. (They may be just a bit biased, however.) That's a pretty big "seed." And, the situation is much worse overseas with estimates of 40% pirated software worldwide, with some areas with rates as high as 78% or more.

I don't know if they included universities and colleges in their estimates.

More Microsoft- 'Longhorn' Pre-Alpha's Leaked to Web

Microsoft's follow-up to Windows XP, code-named *Longhorn*, is due to arrive in 2005, but the new OS hasn't even gone to Alpha yet. Nonetheless, proposed candidates for alpha testing have been "leaked" and have undergone unofficial testing and review in at least one C/NET forum.

There will supposedly be some very good things coming with 'Longhorn' and some that are seen by others as ominous indications of Microsoft's desire to rule the world and stamp out software piracy as well. One thing we do know is that MS intends to change the file system again. According to a C/NET article by Michael Kanellos, the new file system will be called WinFS and is intended to replace NTFS and FAT32.

Something that caught my attention was improved visual quality aimed at Longhorn's release. MS



demonstrated a version at WinHEC capable of running on screens with a resolution of 120 dpi or higher.

This would be a significant improvement if it really works. Jumping the screen resolution, now, really means obtaining a smaller screen view. I have a 17" monitor capable of very high resolutions, but use it at 800 X 600 since print at higher resolutions, 1024 X 768, 1280 X 1024, etc., becomes largely unreadable and worthless.

So, How did 'Unofficial' Alpha Testers Respond?

Pretty poorly. A lot of the messages received were from Linux disciples who were less concerned with the fact that 'Longhorn' was pre-alpha and highly focused on the 'Evil Empire' and this new OS as an assault toward some sort of Windows hegemony. There were many more negative responses, almost all from Linux folk, than positive and most of these displayed some amusing bits of similarity.

Conclusions drawn from the Linux-crazed critics probably said a great deal more about that sub-segment of the Linux community than about 'Longhorn.' By and large, spelling was a great mystery to these folks, as was English grammar and syntax. This is something that they tend to share with the Macintosh community, unfortunately.

PC users tend to use their spelling checkers, or know how to spell, and display pretty good use of grammar and syntax. Historically, Macintosh users tend to be much more graphically oriented (seems appropriate given the superior graphical capabilities of the Macintosh) and less concerned with such inanities as spelling and grammar.



Bosses of a publishing firm are trying to work out why no one noticed that one of their employees had been sitting dead at his desk for FIVE DAYS before anyone asked if he was feeling okay.

George Turklebaum, 51, who had been employed as a proof-reader at a New York firm for 30 years, had a heart attack in the open-plan office he shared with 23 other workers. The parrot came up from the water and looking confused said; "NOW WHERE DID HE HIDE THE SHIP."



names, addresses and phone numbers for travel agents, airlines, hotels and your destination. If your taxi driver doesn't speak good English, there are multiple hotels with the same name or you can't pronounce the street you will still be able to arrive at you intended destination.

Weather is another consideration for travel. The Accu-Weather web site http://www.accuweather.com/ad-cbin/public/local_index.asp?zip-code=75201 provides 15 day forecast. It's good to know the weather for the day you are leaving, the weather for the days you are away at your destination and the forecast for the day you will return. Weatherbase.com <http://www.weatherbase.com> is a good site for average temperatures and weather records. Other useful web sites for vacation travel are <http://about.com>, the <http://www.about.com/travel> destination newspapers, local chambers of commerce and state tourism bureaus.

Nonspecific travel tips are carry a travel tote, day pack, back pack or large purse to carry essential items. Airline travel has not been perfect or predictable since 9-11. Carry required medicines, a poncho, jacket and a snack with you at all times.

You need required medicines because there are travel delays, security breaches, lost and delayed luggage, especially when you didn't make the plane. A snack is good thing to carry because flight times can be rescheduled earlier or later. Airport restaurants and snack bars are not always open 24 hours a day and your culinary choices may be limited. A poncho or jacket is a good item to always carry with you because they both provide comfort when the

weather suddenly changes.

There are some general packing tips to make your traveling more pleasant. Supermarkets and drug stores have miniature sample or travel size toiletries which can save weight and packing space. Pack toiletries, tooth brushes and spill able items in freezer bags. There are mesh bags for items you would not want revealed in public.



In April, we played around with **online virus testing**. For instance, Panda Software (the Main Presentation in March) provides both PC based protection and online virus testing. A full system, hard drive and e-mail scan by Panda can be initiated by going to <http://www.pandasoftware.com> and selecting the large 'Panda ActiveScan' icon down the left column. That will initiate a download of their online scanner. It works great, catching and correcting some things that Norton AntiVirus had missed on my PC. But allow at least an hour for it to run—it is pretty comprehensive.

The downside to online scanning is that it works only for the period of the scan—it does not provide any ongoing detection of new viruses as you surf the Internet or receive new we-mail. So while online scans are good for making sure your system is clean, they are not an **ongoing** solution.

Symantec has an online Security Checker, both for viruses and for general security. Go to <http://security.symantec.com/ssc/home.asp> to begin virus checking and/or security checking. There are some other good links on this page as well.

McAfee's free online virus scanner is at <http://www.mcafee.com/myapps/mfs/default.asp>. It downloads an ActiveX control that does the scan.

Section Breaks are part of the basic foundation of Word. They control the result of many other features, such as page orientation, headers and footers, and page numbering. Even if you have never heard of Section Breaks, let alone used them, there have probably been times when they would have resolved a problem you were having with a document. Sometimes, your document contained them anyway, whether you knew it or not!

J U N E

Headers and Footers are another Word challenge if you want anything more than the same header or footer one throughout an entire document. Even if you have figured out that you need to use Section Breaks to make the changes you need, if you attempted to make changes to them, you may have had additional surprises! If you hate

Headers and Footers, (*or Hooders and Fetters, for those who attended the February meeting*), you must be here. Word incorporates Page Numbering into Headers and Footers, so you get three-for-one.

JULY

We've now made it past the toughest features of Word, and I'm following it up with the best feature — AutoCorrect! AutoCorrect and AutoText enable you to store frequently used text, tables and graphics that can be popped into any document by typing the short nickname you have given them. AutoCorrect has increased my productivity and accuracy more than any other feature. I Love it!

Operating Systems SIG

Good News! **Chuck Stark**, computer consultant and Windows maven, has agreed to accept the position as Co-Leader of the Operating Systems SIG.

Chuck has contributed significantly to past SIG discussions and will provide a level of expertise in the working of Windows in both small and large sys-

tems that has been lacking. While recognizing Chuck, I would be highly remiss if I didn't also acknowledge similar contributions from **John McNeil** of LINUX fame who spends a lot of time working with Windows as well as with Linux.

Tips & Tricks

It's no secret that I love hardware. In the course of upgrading, I frequently wind up with enough components to create another (though less capable) PC. The really obsolete stuff I either give to **Gil Brand's** NTPCUG PC Recycling project (if it fits their needs) or donate elsewhere.

However, I try to have a fairly "recent" 3rd PC available at all times—as a "test bed" for new software I'm considering. I don't want to try this on one of my production PC's simply because of the hassles involved in removing candidates I decide aren't worth the effort. The absolute best "Uninstall" modules I've used have all left fragments or Registry entries behind that can be major pains in the posterior to remove.

Answer is to **not** install them in the first place on a production machine.

Backing Up

Running three systems with 100+ Gigabytes of storage presents some significant backup challenges. My high-speed SCSI tape drive only holds 8G of data (compressed) and the tapes are pretty expensive at that. Backing up to CD/RW's is slow and insufficient while DVD/R's with more storage capacity are equally slow, and media is much more expensive.

USB 2.0 may provide a much better solution as prices of large ATA disk drives continue to fall rapidly. External converters for USB2.0 to ATA are relatively inexpensive (\$50 - \$100) and fast

enough to be useful. Nice thing is that users have a choice of backup types and formats, including image backups.

We'll discuss members' experiences with this option at the May SIG meeting.

We resolved that one of these days, WIN 98 SE Operating System is going to be considered a has been. We will either need to leap into Windows XP operating system with a new computer, or, if our hardware is not too iffy and antiquated, we will perform an upgrade. Microsoft has this program *Upgrade Advisor* that will help a lot. We now know that the "Advisor" will help analyze the problems of legacy software/hardware and also will advise that certain favorite programs of yours will not work with "XP" until you perform upgrades provided from your product's supplier.

Let it be known that after you run *Upgrade Advisor* on your system, you will have been forewarned and therefore should not witness several of those pesky last minute surprises.

We also looked more closely at the hidden Microsoft product – *Microsoft Photo Editor*. We demonstrated that the ability of the editor to perform the

basic tasks of digital image editing quite well. All of you who have a copy of Microsoft *Office 97* through *Office XP* have the editor although you may not have found it to have installed it. The editor is a good starting tool and all that may be needed for some PC users.

For additional help, I have started a Wednesday night class on Rhino3D at Wylie High School.




