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As a Dallas Icon fades ... "First Saturday" Attendance Slides - With One Major Exception

The "First Saturday" electronics and computer flea market at Ross Ave., on the edge of the Dallas Arts District, has been a monthly tradition for more than 20 years. Although originally devoted to amateur radio enthusiasts, it became more of a computer market and swap meet in the early 1980's and has been a rich historical source, revealing early computer developments as well as contemporary user trends.

In its glory days, First Saturday saw crowds of enthusiasts numbering in the 1,000's with one Dallas newspaper estimate of as many as 15,000 shoppers and browsers on one Saturday in the early 1990's. The show actually began on Friday night with intense shopping and bargaining around 10 p.m. Friday and lasting through Saturday morning.

Shopping by flashlight never really appealed to me so I only visited a couple of the late-night interactions.

"Caveat Emptor" was definitely in style shopping at this venue, but there were bargains to be found there that were not available elsewhere—especially if you were trying to maintain some "elderly" equipment long out of production.

First Saturday was also about the only source of less expensive PC components in the 1980's and provided an initial entry point for Asian components. I purchased my first "heavy duty" power supply to replace the anemic 62.5-watt supply that came with the original IBM PC in order to install a hard disk drive in the machine.

I bought the power supply out of the back of Pat Chang's car at the show. (Pat later founded Lucky Computers and extended his chain to California and Seattle, WA.)

My general rule at First Saturday was "if the object had moving parts and I didn't know the vendor, I wouldn't buy it no matter how attractive the price." If you did know and trust the vendor, First Saturday was a great place to buy memory at prices a fraction of what the mainline stores were charging.

It still can be.

First Saturday apparently fading rapidly.

The photographs on the cover and this page were taken at the August 7 First Saturday and display wide-open vistas where once were very crowded aisles lined with busy computer vendors.

Extent of the empty space was quite surprising, given the beautiful weather and pleasant temperature, coupled with the fact that it was also "Back to School" time, which has generated significant activity at the venue in the past. I think it may emphasize the trends we have seen at the NTPCUG over the past several years.



It may also signal a weather change in the general population. By that I mean the attitude has changed, and users expect a "TV" experience and are not terribly interested in what's in the box—or how it works. They view PC's as commodity appliances that are often easier and less expensive to replace than repair.

A pleasant contrast

One part of First Saturday was crowded and busy. It was the part that was managed by former NTPCUG PR Director Peyton Weaver. Peyton also runs the Third Saturday computer sale in the Dallas West End, which also has been successful.

Peyton did something this month I thought was significant. He offered free parking to First Saturday shoppers, in contrast to the signs on other lots offering parking for \$5.00. Although it may seem mundane, parking at First Saturday has always been problematic, and this was refreshing.

First thing I noticed was Peyton walking around the area, stopping to chat with the vendors and discussing how things might be improved. Saw this before at Infomart and BigTown and see the same thing at Third Saturday—an open relationship between the vendors and Peyton that displays a concern for both the vendors and the shoppers at this venue.

This may be First Saturday's best chance to survive.







Get Rid of Spyware and Popups Five Programs That Really Help

Next to spam mail and viruses, one of the most irritating facets of web surfing is the annoying popup ads that so many of us receive. What many may not be aware of is that about 80% of the popups that we get while online, and many that may also appear if we are offline, are generated by spyware that is unknowingly installed on our computers.

Spyware are software programs that typically install without our knowledge or informed consent, and may also be a part of a program that we purposely installed. Spyware, as its name connotes, is software that often gathers information on our surfing habits and may send that information to third parties.

At its worst, spyware may also be used to gather personal information from our computers, including passwords, user names, and other information, and send it to persons unknown who may illicitly use that information to empty our bank accounts, charge goods in our name, and commit other various forms of identity theft. Spyware can get on our computers by visiting some unethical websites, or by installing some downloaded or commercial software. Several forms of spyware can infect our computers via viruses and Trojans.

Notorious Sites

Among the most notorious sources of spyware are popular file sharing utilities such as Morpheus and KaZaA. Some of the "cookies" or small text files placed on our computers by some websites can also be used to create personal profiles on us, and distribute that information to third parties. It should be noted that some software titles will no longer function if their attached spyware is deleted, as the spyware is intended to provide a continuing revenue stream for the software publisher.

Fortunately, it is generally easy to detect and kill spyware, or otherwise render it inert. It should be understood at this point that as a general rule, even the best antivirus programs, while effective at detecting and preventing virus and Trojan infestations, are generally ineffective at dealing with spyware. Firewalls, if



properly installed and configured, can prevent many spyware types from sending information from the computer, but many spyware programs utilize known security weaknesses, and other vulnerabilities in our operating systems. Contemporary thought is that we all need a good anti-spyware program properly installed, configured, and updated, every bit as much as we need updated antivirus software and a firewall on our computers.

SpyBot Search & Destroy: One of the top rated anti-spyware programs is the recently updated "Spybot Search and Destroy", version 1.3, available for free (donations encouraged) at www.safernetworking.org and other major download sites. Spybot can detect and destroy over 13,000 spyware products, and immunize our computers from future infection by almost 1800 types of spyware. Spybot can also prevent some pesky websites from changing our "home" or browser startup pages, and make it difficult for spyware to write itself into our Windows registry. An integral utility makes it easy for Spybot to check for, and install the periodic updates necessary to detect and kill the latest types of spyware.



AdAware: Another popular anti-spy-ware utility is "Ad-Aware", available for download at www.lava-softusa.com. The free version of Ad-Aware, the "Standard Edition", is possibly the most widely used anti-spyware program, with over 42 million copies downloaded since July, 2003. Ad-Aware comes in several versions, ranging from the "free for personal use" Standard Edition, the \$27 "Plus" edition, and the \$40 "Pro" version. Ad-Aware fre-

quently releases updated "reference files" which contain lists of newly created or revised spyware information.

SpyHunter: A popular commercial program, which is a "Swiss army knife" type of program comprising many different utilities, including an excellent spyware (parasite) detector and killer, is the "SpyHunter" included with System Mechanic, version 4. System Mechanic is available locally at retail (about \$49), and for download at www.iolo.com. A fully functional 30-day free trial version is available for download. As does its free standing competitors, System Mechanic's SpyHunter also checks for updated spyware listings, and installs them seamlessly. SpyHunter has been proven to be an effective spyware detector and killer, and the other utilities included in System Mechanic make this a most useful program.

STOPzilla: While not directly marketed as an antispyware product, "STOPzilla" is a very effective spyware remover that specializes in those spyware products that produce about 80% of the annoying popup



PestPatrol: One of the most comprehensive spyware detecting and killing programs on the market is Pest-

Patrol (\$40), available at *www.pestpatrol.com*. This is an excellent program that can both detect spyware and block many types of infection. PestPatrol has an integrated utility that enables all parts of PestPatrol to be updated on a regular basis in order to maximize the detection and removal functions. PestPatrol offers a free online scan that will detect, but not eliminate, almost all known forms of spyware.

While there are several other decent anti-spyware programs available, one caveat is appropriate here. There are some unethical purveyors of some anti-spyware programs that use spam emails, popup ads, and deceptive sales practices, including telling you that your computer is infested with spyware, and charging a fee to remove it.

Any of the titles referenced above will do a reasonable job of reducing popups, and securing your computer from spyware, provided they are frequently updated and run.

If you, your employer, or a friend, has older computers (Pentium II-200Mhz or better) and/or compo-





nents (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We have received several corporate donations in the last few months; PLEASE keep checking with your company about donations.

We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.

In addition, we need a volunteer (or two) who have experience in re-inking printer toner cartridges. We have several printers that work but need expensive toner, if purchased retail. OR, you can come by and help inventory the needed cartridges and assist in discount purchases. As the expert, you can tell us what works best.

And last, but not least, we need a volunteer to: determine the proper driver for various donated sound/video/modem cards; download and test the drivers; and save the drivers to floppy disks.

The results showed a reading of 0.0. The puzzled officer demanded to know how that could be.


The driver replied, "Tonight I'm the designated decoy.".

Access

The *Microsoft Access SIG* meets with other developer SIGs on the *Second Saturday* of the month, at Microsoft's facility in Irving on the President George Bush Parkway (State Hwy. 161), just North of State Highway 114. If you exit Highway 114 going North, stay on the access road and you'll find the Microsoft entrance before you reach the first tollbooth entrance onto the President George Bush Parkway. The Access SIG website at http://members.tripod.com/ntaccess/ has directions, a link to a map, and meeting times.

On August 14, 2004: Guest Speaker David Stark, will present Accessing Data in Smart Devices (PDAs and Mobile Phones) in the .NET World. He will present a simple program which runs on an iPAQ 3835 Pocket PC and accesses data from Pocket Access. Since only SOLCE is natively supported in .NET, David will demonstrate connecting to Pocket Access utilizing an ADOCE Wrapper available from InTheHand (www.inthehand.com --\$42). This wrapper adds *Pocket Access* functionality to the .NET Compact Framework. David says, 'If time allows (which I doubt), I will also show how to access the data using SQLCE.'

David Stark is a member of NTPCUG and is Program Director of the *Microsoft Application Developers of Dallas (MAD)*. He began programming 'spaghetti BASIC' for fun when he was in High School. He has developed *Access* applications since 1996, and has also programmed in *classic VB* and in *VB.NET*.

On July 10, 2004: Co-Leader of the NTPCUG Access SIG Larry Linson

showed some slides and recapped the recent *Global Microsoft MVP Summit*, held in Seattle and Redmond from April 4 - 7. Larry shared one *peek into the future* of Access that was received with glee - the *Jet database engine* will continue to be supported in the next version of Access.

We have always said that *value*, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder. Expect, as usual, to have a drawing for one or more *valuable* prizes at the August meeting.

Alpha Five Database

Alpha Five version 6 has just been released, and one of the major new features is a built-in web server. That means when you buy A5 version 6 you can immediately start building web apps on your local machine that take advantage of the power of Alpha Five genies and xbasic language. These web pages can then be published to your web server. Alpha handles the entire process!

You can use any database you want, e.g. dbf, Access, SQL Server, MySQL, etc., but you will not need FrontPage, ASP, Cold Fusion, etc. Alpha handles both the data access and the display pages. In addition to Alpha's xbasic language, any scripting language can be used in Alpha web pages if you desire.

To demonstrate the power that Alpha has packed into the web functionality of version 6, this month **Kevin Tucker** will demonstrate a web database that he built with A5v6 for a local travel agency.

Excel

The topic for August is **LOGIC FUNCTIONS AND INFORMA- TION FUNCTIONS** that are mostly discussed individually in the help file.

Logic functions evaluate whether a value or expression is TRUE or FALSE. **Information functions** evaluate the condition of a worksheet cell or the condition of the current operating environment and returns a value.

These functions are some of the tools used to put basic thinking (decide on a action based on some condition) into the worksheet. The LOGIC FUNC-TIONS are TRUE, FALSE, AND, OR, NOT, and IF. The INFORMA-TION FUNCTIONS are CELL, ERROR.TYPE, INFO, N, NA, TYPE, and 11 variations of IS. For discussion the topics are grouped as LOGIC (True/False), AND, OR, NOT, IF, Information IS functions, and all other Information functions.

The *LOGIC* we seek is whether a condition on a worksheet meets our requirements or does not meet our requirements. The **TRUE** or **TRUE**() function and the **FALSE** or **FALSE**()

function **DO NOT EVALUATE**. The functions only return a value (True returns 1 and False returns 0) and are used mostly as place holders.

The AND(logical1,logical2,) function and the *OR*(*logical1*, *logical2*,) function evaluate from 1 to 30 arguments that calculate to TRUE or FALSE. If the argument is an array or a reference to any cells with text or empty cells they will be ignored. If the argument contains no logical values the function returns the #VALUE! error. If these functions have only one argument they return the results of that argument. The **AND** with multiple arguments returns a TRUE value only if ALL the arguments evaluate to TRUE. In all other conditions AND returns FALSE. The **OR** with multiple arguments returns a FALSE value only if ALL the arguments evaluate to FALSE. In all other conditions **OR** returns TRUE.

The *NOT*(*logical*) function reverses the value of its argument. If the argument evaluates to TRUE then the **NOT** function returns FALSE. If the argument evaluates to FALSE then the **NOT** function returns TRUE. This function is often used to insure a certain condition is not returned.

The AND, OR, and NOT functions are also used in combination to return other conditions. The NOT and the AND functions are used to return TRUE if **any** argument is FALSE. The NOT and the OR functions are used to return TRUE if **all** arguments are FALSE. The OR and the NOT AND can be AND together to return TRUE if either one of the arguments is TRUE but **not both**. The AND and the NOT OR can be OR together to return TRUE if **both** arguments are TRUE or **both** arguments are TRUE or **both** arguments are FALSE.

The IF(logical_test,value_if_true,value_if_false) function returns one of two values based on a logical test value. The function evaluates the value (first argument) to TRUE or FALSE then returns the results of the second argument if evaluation is TRUE or the results of the third argument if evaluation is FALSE. By entering another **IF** function in the second or third argument logical test can cover many conditions (called nesting) with many return values [example:

if(test,true,if(test,true,false))]. Nesting in the **IF** function is limited to seven levels. If the selected (TRUE or FALSE) return argument is blank the return value is 0.

While logic functions provide us with TRUE and FALSE to make decisions the **INFORMATION FUNCTIONS** provide details of the environment to make decisions. The

CELL(info_type,reference) returns requested information about a cell as a text value. The info_type can provide a cells formatting, number formatting, data type, column width, and more (see help for complete list). Note that if NO REFERENCE is provided this function uses the LAST CELL CHANGED.

The *ERROR.TYPE*(*error_val*) returns a number or #N/A representing error conditions in a cell or the numeric equivalent of an error value if entered in *error_val* (error value <u>#REF!</u> Returns 4). If the argument is not one of the numbered error conditions (#NULL!, #DIV/0!, #VALUE!, #REF!, #NAME?, #NUM!, or #N/A) the function returns #N/A.

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The *INFO(type_text)* returns information about the current operating environment. The INFO function can tell us if the operating system is Macintosh ("mac") or Windows ("pcdos"), the version of the operating system, the current recalculation mode ("Automatic" or "Manual"), and more (see help for complete list).

The *N*(*value*) return a number for a given value or cell reference. If the *value* is text a 0 (zero) is returned. If the value is a date this function returns the serial number that represent the date in Excel. If the value is logical this function returns 0 (zero) for FALSE and 1 (one) for TRUE. If the value is an error value the error value (text) is returned.

The *N/A()* returns the #N/A error. Like the TRUE() and FALSE() functions, N/A() **DOES NOT EVALUATE** it just returns the #N/A error ("NO VALUE IS AVAILABLE") and is mostly used as a place holder to avoid using a cell in a calculation. Unlike the TRUE and FALSE the empty parentheses **IS REQUIRED**.

The *TYPE*(*value*) returns a number representing the resulting or displayed value of the argument. If the value refers to a cell with a formula with the a number, logical value, or other result then TYPE returns that number, logical value, or other result. TYPE does not determine if a formula is present.

The remaining Information Function types are collectively called IS Functions and they return TRUE or FALSE. These Is Something checks if a value exists as a certain condition and returns TRUE if it does and FALSE if it does not. The ISBLANK(value) checks for an empty cell. The ISERR(value) checks for any error value except #N/A. The ISERROR(value) checks for any error value (including #N/A). The ISEVEN(value) checks for even integers. If ISEVEN value is not an integer the value is truncated and tested (2.5 equals 2 and returns TRUE). If ISEVEN value does not refer to a number #VALUE! is returned. The IS-LOGICAL(value) checks for a logical value. The ISNA(value) checks if the value returned the #N/A error value

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only. The *ISNONTEXT(value)* checks if the value is **NOT** text (not a string value). The *ISNUMBER(value)* checks if the value is a number. The *ISODD(value)* checks if the value is an odd number and has the same condition as ISEVEN(value). The *IS-REF(value)* checks if the value has an invalid reference like referring to an array but pointing to a cell outside the array. The *ISTEXT(value)* checks if the value **IS** text (a string value).

Outlook 2003 Review

At the July meeting, we looked at the main features of Microsoft Outlook 2003, focusing on new features.

As an email client, Outlook 2003 provides junk mail filtering and lots of security options. There are lots of new ways for you to handle, view and sort incoming email. These functions make it possible for you to quickly zero in on important new items, flag messages for follow up, and maintain a history of messages. There are also many new ways to view (and hide from view) what is in a folder, and to quickly find and index messages as the need arises.

In the <u>calendar</u> department, Outlook 2003 supports multiple calendars for the same person, and allows side-by-side viewing of any number of calendars. Additional new calendar sharing

and scheduling features (group collaboration) are available when users in a computer domain use Outlook 2003.

As a contact manager, Outlook 2003 adds some great new ways to view and sort address book information, especially when you have carefully assigned categories to the contacts. You can have multiple address books open simultaneously and can aggregate the information for global views of all contacts.

As a task manager, Outlook 2003 adds many new views and ways to remind yourself and others about task assignments and due dates. It is also possible to send tasks, calendar items and appointments as attachments to other Outlook 2003 users. In situations where a team of people uses Microsoft Project for project management, there are even more group collaboration features that use Outlook 2003 to provide schedule visibility, status tracking and task completion information.

Our discussion generated lots of interest, and may lead to the creation of a new SIG just for Outlook.

Is it time for you to consider Internet Telephone Service?

In August, our topic will be *Internet Telephone Service*: how it uses the Internet and telephone switching equipment to make the connection, how well it works, who the major providers are, what services are available, what are the costs and tradeoffs, and other things you should consider if you are interested in switching.

In September, the topic will be *How to Remove Spyware, Malware and PopUps from Your PC*. There is a new version of Ad-Aware scheduled for release in mid-August, so we'll do a demo and discussion of it, as well as some other software tools that come in

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real handy when you want to regain the control of your PC.

The topic in October will be *How to Provide Remote Assistance via the Internet.* Since members of NTPCUG are frequently called on to help others with PC problems, we will discuss and demonstrate how you can connect to other computers, see what is on the remote computer screen, and remotely control the computer. All of this can be done with free software, and it does not rely on the Windows XP Remote Assistance feature.

Many of us today are working in both WordPerfect and Word. In the August 2004 newsletter, page 6, (which will in a few days be included in our newsletter listing at the bottom of this page) are keystrokes for about 35 shortcuts. Here are my three favorites:

WordPerfect Command: Indent, current paragraph one tab stop Word Shortcut: Ctrl+M WordPerfect Shortcut: F7

WordPerfect Command: Hanging indent (margin release)
Word Shortcut: Ctrl+T
WordPerfect Shortcut: Ctrl+F7

WordPerfect Command: Move one page at a time

Word Shortcut: Ctrl+PgUp and Ctrl+PgDn

WordPerfect Shortcut: Alt+PgUp

and Alt+PgDn


