

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The Perfect Backup Approach

Backing up your hard drive is the most important thing you should do to protect your computer system. Yet, I am constantly surprised to find that as few as 10% of my smart user group audiences have a good backup procedure in place. Hard drive crashes are quite common and it is very painful to rebuild a computer system after a hard drive crash. Anti-virus software may offer some protection, but fast moving viruses can get through this protection and crash your hard drive. It may take you days or weeks to recover from a hard drive failure and your important data files are gone forever. So, protect your computer by backing up your hard drive on a regular basis and

avoid the pain of a hard drive failure.

For the past few years I have recommended a sophisticated backup process that would adequately backup all aspects of your computer system. Using a file backup utility, I suggested you backup your important data files at the end of each day. Then, to protect your full system, I suggested you should backup your entire hard drive using a full system backup utility each month. I also suggested that you separate out your data files into a different partition on your hard drive to further protect these important files. This approach is outlined in an article that I wrote titled, "Backing Up your Hard Drive". You can read it on my web site at *www.ugr.com/nl0102.html*.

While many of you followed my suggestions on backing up your hard drive, many of you are still not doing anything to protect your hard drive from failure. Perhaps my backup approach was too complex to understand or to difficult to follow. Fortunately for you, technology has made some dramatic advances in the past couple of years and now there is a better and easier way of doing your backups. This article will show you the best way to backing up your hard drive and tell you what hardware and software products to use to follow this approach. It is so easy that everybody should start to backup their hard drive. All you have to know is the secret of how to do it, and your computer can be safe and secure.

Backup Hardware: The first step to having a successful backup procedure is choosing the right backup hardware to use to save your backups to. For years, users have been burning CDs for their backups. This approach was full of frustrations and problems. No wonder folks hated to do backups. First, it seems that creating a backup and then burning it to many CDs could overtax many computer systems. If anything went wrong, the entire backup process could cancel, leaving you with several burnt CDs, but not the complete backup you needed. Worse than that, the backup might appear to be complete, but the CDs were corrupt and would not restore properly. Thank goodness, CDs have been replaced with a much more reliable backup media.

A couple of years ago, external hard drives entered the computer marketplace in large numbers. Today, an external hard drive is the ideal backup media to

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use. Instead of sitting by your computer for hours to feed it another blank CD, all you need to do is to attach your external hard drive and forget about it. Your backup will be taken automatically without your being involved. No more drudgery of making backups to CDs.

Why are external hard drives the ideal backup media? First, they are large enough to backup your main hard drive on one device. You do not need to backup to multiple CDs, so the whole process can be done without your involvement. Second, backing up to an external hard drive is many times faster than burning CDs. An external hard drive is almost as fast as the internal hard drives on your computer. Third, external hard drives are much more reliable at saving your important files. CDs can easily become scratched or flawed and not protect your important backups. Finally, external hard drives are relatively inexpensive to buy and use. You may actually save money over the cost of burning a lot of CDs.

What should you look for when buying an external hard drive for backup purposes? External hard drives come in two basic flavors - USB2 and Firewire. One is just as fast as the other and both will do an excellent job of backing up your main hard drive. You will need to attach the external hard drive to your computer using either a USB2 port or a Firewire port on your computer. Most computers today come with a USB port on them, so these are the more popular type of external hard drives. Just be sure your computer doesn't have one of the older USB1 ports on it instead of the faster USB2 ports. If you have an older USB1 port, you can still attach and run your USB2 external hard drive, but it will run at the slower USB1 speed. In this situation, you can add a USB2 port to your computer for a small additional price.

The external hard drives come in a couple of sizes - miniature and standard drives. The miniature external hard drives have a 2.5 inch laptop computer hard drive inside a small case. These drives are small enough to fit in your pocket and are very light to carry. They do have a couple of disadvantages to them that you should be aware of. First, they only hold 20GB, 40GB, or 80GB of backup files. This

may not be big enough to backup your 300GB main hard drive. Second, you will pay quite a bit for the small size of these miniature drives. The 20GB drives cost about \$160, the 40GB drives are about \$200 and the 80GB drives are over \$300. So, you end up paying a lot for the small size.

If you don't mind having a slightly larger external hard drive, you can get one with much more capacity and for less money. These larger external hard drives contain standard 3.5 inch hard drives inside the case and are available in capacities starting at about 80GB and go up to 300GB and larger. An 80GB or 120GB external hard drive is an excellent size for most backup needs. If you watch for sales on these drives, you may find an 80GB hard drive for under \$100. I have seen them as low as \$69. The 120GB external hard drives will be more expensive, but can be found for as low as \$99. So, check the ads in your local paper and you may find a great deal on external USB2 hard drives.

Backup Software: The second part of having the perfect backup approach is using the right backup software product. There are two basic types of backup software available - file backup utilities and full system image backup utilities. Older file backup utilities would backup individual files. These utilities were slow since they had to use the operating system to find and retrieve each file separately. We have hundreds of thousands of files on our hard drive and so working on individual files, one at a time, is very slow. A better backup utility will backup your entire hard drive (a partition at a time) and does this at the hard drive sector level. These types of backup utilities create backup images of your hard drive that you can save to your external hard drive. To conserve

space, these images are compressed to about half their normal size which permits you to keep many backup images on your external hard drive. So, the first thing to look for in your backup software is the ability to create compressed images of your entire hard drive.

While an image backup utility is a major step in the right direction, it is not the ultimate solution. With full backup images, you still end up backing up your entire hard drive each time, even if only a small portion of

the drive has changed since the last backup. So, the images contain a lot of unchanged files that do not need to be backed up again. So, the secret is to find an image backup utility that can do incremental backup images. With the incremental backup image approach, only the changed sectors on a hard drive are backed up and not those parts of the hard drive that have not changed since the last backup. Incremental backup images are much smaller in size and complete much quicker than a full backup image.

A little calculation at this point may help you understand another reason why the incremental backup image feature is so important. Let's say you have a 120GB main hard drive that is a third full. That means it has about 40GB of files on it. A full condensed image of this hard drive would be about 20GB in size (with a compression of

about 50%). That means that you could store four separate full backup images on an 80GB external hard drive. Using the incremental backup image approach, you may be able to store 30 or 40 separate backups on the same 80GB external hard drive. Because you can keep more incremental images on your external hard drive, you can make your backups more frequently than if you were limited to only four full backups. Hence, your backups would be more current with the incremental image approach ver-

sus the full backup approach. This means less lost files since the last backup. This is of major importance when considering a backup approach.

So, the secret to choosing the best backup software is to look for a full system backup utility that can do incremental backup images. There have been a couple of expensive enterprise software products that offer the incremental backup image feature (for example, Symantec's V2i Protector Desktop Edition v2), but there is only one consumer backup utility that I am aware of that offers the incremental backup image feature and that is the Acronis True Image 8.0 product. This excellent backup utility was awarded PC Magazine's Editors Choice award as the best backup imaging utility on the market. PC World calls True Image the leader in the field of incremental backup images. Using this excellent backup utility with an external hard drive will provide you with the most perfect backup approach available today.


How to Backup your Hard Drive: To complete this article, let me suggest how you would do your backups using an external hard drive and an incremental backup image utility. I would suggest that you set up a regular schedule to make your backup images. For the average user, I would make a full backup of your hard drive at the beginning of the month and then an incremental backup image at the end of each week that follows. So, you would have one full backup image and 3-4 much smaller incremental backup images each month. At the beginning of the next month, make another full backup image and follow this again with weekly incremental images. Save all of these images on

> your external hard drive and don't delete any of the older images until you start to run out of space on the drive. If you have a very active computer system, you could make a full backup at the beginning of the week and incremental backup images at the end of each day. Most users will not need to do the backups this frequently, but some may want the extra protection of more frequent backups. Either way, the approach is the same, just the frequency is changed. With True Image 8.0 you can set up the software to make these backups automatically.

So, set it up and forget it. Your backups will occur as scheduled.

If at any time, you need to restore one or a few of your files, you can simply copy these files out of your compressed image files using a facility in True Image. If you need to restore your full hard drive, you can do this also, even if the main hard drive is empty and not bootable. True Image will boot from a special CD to permit you to quickly restore the entire hard drive from the image files. So, you can quickly restore a few files or your entire hard drive using Acronis True Image 8.0.

Finally, you may be wondering why I recommend keeping all of your full and incremental backup images on your external hard drive and not deleting



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them after you make a new image. You need to understand that the full image you make at the beginning of the month and the incremental images that follow it each week go together in a set. True Image needs all of them to restore your hard drive to the way it was when you made the last incremental image. During the restore, it will combine the beginning full image with each of the incremental images to recreate the hard drive. It does this very quickly whether you are retrieving a few individual files from the image set or recreating the entire hard drive. Now, let's suppose that a stealth virus got on your hard drive and was captured in the last incremental image you made. You certainly do not want to restore your hard drive with this virus on it. So, instead, you indicate to True Image to restore your hard drive from the incremental image you made just before the image containing the stealth virus. That restores your system to a point in the past when it was still clean of the virus.

Over time, you will build up a collection of backup images on your external hard drive that will let you see what files were on the drive at any point of time in the past few months. If you deleted a file some months ago and now want to get it back, you can indicate to True Image to look in a backup image before you deleted the file and you can copy it back to your hard drive from the image files. Having a history of all of the files that have been on your hard drive is a very powerful and useful function. Only with an incremental backup image software product could you afford to keep all of this history on a modest external hard drive. Acronis True Image 8.0 with an external hard drive is the perfect way to backup your main hard drive.

[Ed. Note: Walter S. Mossberg, technical columnist for *The Wall Street Journal*, recently addressed similar backup issues in his column. He suggested a similar program, called *SmartSync Pro* which is described by the vendor as an "auto synchronization" system for PC backups. It costs about the same as Achronis True Image purchased through *http://www.ugr.com*, but does not appear to do image backups.]

If you, your employer, or a friend, have older computers (Pentium II-200Mhz or better) and/or components (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.



Minutes of DSDA Meeting Saturday August 21, 2004 Northlake College

Present

Bob Webber, Martin Hellar, Glen Ford, Art Yasui, Raymond Pronk, Tom Perkins and Jeff Frauenheim.

Presentation

Art Yasui presented the group with ASP.NET Tricks and Traps using SQL. Art uses ADO.NET, a specific access method to get to the SQL database. The connection object establishes the SQL connection class object.

Connected and Disconnected Modes - Once connected, there are two modes

that may be used. There is a datareader, read-only facility to browse the database, or transfer the data to the client. Another data access, is through a data adapter and data set objects, which are server-side controls. In the data adapter, you can read, update and delete. It disconnects from the database server after access. This uses more resources, as one would expect.

Art presented a demo with controls to show how this works. One control displays the columns and one control is a text box for inserting new records. The properties box in the Microsoft Development Environment includes the connection object. The string includes critical and essential parts, such as the integrated security mode, recommended as more secure than Window's authentication. Connection strings can be dragged and dropped from the Server Explorer, saving manual work.

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Display Box Control-The dataset object can be generated and a choice of tables is presented. An untyped dataset is a generic class whereas a typed dataset is a subtype specific to a particular table for type checking (column and syntax differences). They are wired up to the controls through a page load event. Code tells the data adapter to set the datagrid datasource and bind it. If any errors are detected, they appear as login error in a pop up display, with a description, details, source files and stack traces. There are .NET versions of a GUI debugger available. Art then added Windows security settings and permissions from stored procedures using the command prompt.

Insert New Records Control-To insert new records through the data adapter, the dataset variable-type data row is first updated at the server. Then the data adapter update is coded in.

Refresh Data Control:-Art repeated the code in the display control to refresh it.

In September, **Alan Lummus** will review a really interesting product for developing websites from the ground up: WebCEO. This software/service combination brings together in one software package capabilities only available elsewhere by acquiring and operating a considerable number of software packages and web services.

This product begins by facilitating your key word/key phrase research with capabilities rivaling WordTracker, automates the comparison of your web pages with pages of other already highly ranked websites (or the websites of your choice), helps you determine both on-page and off-page characteristics that will affect or are affecting the ranking of your pages on the various search engines (including page rank, page popularity, keyword density, meta tag characteristics, word count, appropriate use of alt tags, just to name a few), advises you every step of the way in your development of your web pages so that they will have the best chance of ranking highly in the search engines of your choice, provides an FTP service to upload your pages to your server, automates the submission of your sites to a wide range of search engines, makes easy the submission of your sites to those search engines and directories that require human submission, monitors your site's ranking in the search engines, and can even monitor your site's uptime, and determine exactly how visitors navigate through your website. For a single product, WebCEO just might replace a large number of other tools you've been using or were considering purchasing.

The September presentation of WebCEO will actually require two full hours, running from 8:00 am until 10:00 am, fully occupying the two hours normally broken into the e-commerce and FrontPage SIGs.

FOUNDATION - 9-10 am SEPTEMBER — Print Preview Window

Print Preview is more than simply looking at a document before it is printed. Do you know you can edit the document while previewing it, without having to close it, make changes, and then preview it again? You can also shrink a document, change margins and work with only **one** toolbar on your screen?

OCTOBER — Print Dialog Box

I would guess that you have never taken the Print dialog box seriously; that is, used more than the basic features. We will look at all the options, including the many, many things that are preset to be printed, printing ranges, setting options and printer properties.

NOVEMBER — Spell, Grammar & Thesaurus

I *LOVE* those red and green squiggly lines, even though the green ones annoyingly repeatedly return in certain circumstances. They give me an opportunity to quickly correct my spelling mistakes and grammar disagreements. Using Spell and Grammar from their dialog boxes provides a thorough check ... while I'm paying attention. The Thesaurus is extremely helpful when I'm having trouble coming up with the exact word I need.

ADVANCED - 10-11 am SEPTEMBER — Format a Document

It's time to format a document using some of the features we've covered over the last year. *Joyce Barnett* has provided a document to which we will change the font, create a header, use the List Number style, create a table and save it for reuse, and set up two tabular columns. All in an hour? I hope so....

OCTOBER — Outline

This is a feature where Word shines! For long documents, the Outline feature is invaluable. It shows how the different parts of your document fit together. You can view only main headings, several levels or all levels of your outline. You can easily move groups of text from one place to another.

NOVEMBER — Footnotes & Endnotes

Many of us have worked with documents that required footnotes. Do you know you can change the way their appearance and location? Do you have problems with footnotes that are too long to fit on one page? Has someone sent you a document with endnotes, and you need to convert them to footnotes, or vice versa? Do you know how to reference the same footnote several times? Do you need to convert a Word-Perfect footnote to Word?

Prevent Macros When Opening Documents

Here's a quick way to prevent macros from running when opening a document:

Hold down the Shift key while you open the document

This will be especially helpful when opening a document that has been corrupted by a macro.

XP Service Pack 2 & 2003 Service Pack 1

TO SP2 OR NOT?

With all the talk about the Windows XP update there's almost no talk about the other large update from Microsoft - for Office 2003. The last issue of WOW was devoted to the Office 2003 update but with the release of the Windows XP Service Pack 2 it makes updating even more worrying than usual.

Our advice for Office 2003 SP1 still stands - wait for a few weeks to see how it shakes out. There are already reports of SP2 problems. The usual crop of installation hassles that even the massive 70 plus MB download won't fix. Despite what Microsoft is saying it seems some people still need their Office 2003 install CD handy even when using the full size update.

In stark contrast to the secretive Office updates, the Windows SP2 update is well documented with problems being acknowledged fairly promptly and there's a long list of Windows programs that will have trouble with the new Service Pack.

What to do? That's a hard one for anyone who is cautious about Microsoft products and their updates. There's no doubt that both updates are worth applying, especially the Windows XP update. The real question is when?

We're inclined to update Windows XP first and make sure the operating system is stable before later applying the Office 2003 update.

Personal Digital Assistants (PDA)

This Month - Emergency Notification This month Birl is going to shows us all about services provided for emergency notification. Such services can tell you when a weather emergency is in progress all the way to when a nuclear war is happening. Why should we be interested in these items in North Texas? Simply that you can use them to enhance your sense of well-being, improve your knowledge of what is happening around the area and most importantly improve your and your family's safety. We hope to see you at the next meeting. Bring your questions and devices and we'll see you there.

Last Month - Handheld Movies

Last month we heard all about making movies to watch on your PDA. The presentation featured a look at two packages for making PDA movies for DVDs. A set of freeware tools that require a degree of technical ability to use and a commercial tool (*http://www.pqdvd.com/*) which automates the entire process. Whichever of the tools sets you choose you will still need a movie viewer on your PDA so we looked at a couple of those as well.

From a legal point of view in the USA ripping a DVD onto your computer is a non-legal activity. But at the time of writing (September 2004) there is a gray area in the law into which formatting a copy of a DVD that you own for viewing on your PDA may fit. Since this gray area exists the NTPCUG cannot recommend whether the activity is or is not legal but since currently no case law exists covering this activity let's continue.

When converting DVDs for use on your PDA using a PC here are some items to consider:

1. CPU speed

2. Memory

3. Screen size.

For a typical PDA, 240 x 160 pixels is a good screen conversion size. If you consider that broadcast TV is equivalent to 320x275 at 30 frames per second, the main difference you will see is the frame rate where 12 frames per second is normal and 15 fps a good conversion for PDA usage.

The next issue to consider is the movie player on the PDA we found 2 players that support AVI movies directly and many players that support their own unique proprietary standards. The main trade-off at the player level is CPU



speed vs. memory used. If you have a very fast CPU, you can use a high level of compression (you could use MPEG 4 compression) and use less storage space for the movie. If you have a slower CPU then you must use less compression and more storage space.

So far, we have seen that PocketPC devices generally are better for playing movies, but that you can use Palm devices for movies as well.

Mobile Information Services

Yahoo Mobile and MSN Mobile are the major players with mobile Internet portals. Both services are free, require a sign-up, and provide some useful services for a person in a location with no personal Internet access.

The Yahoo mobile site provides mail, calendar, address book, messenger and auctions. Yahoo has a list of phone friendly Internet sites and you can add your own bookmarks.

Yahoo has the largest selection of software for a cell phone or PDA. Software for a PDA includes Symbian/EPOC, Pocket PC, Windows CE, and Palm. The software available includes free, trial, and for purchase selections. There are WAP sites for Palm included in the free software.

Palm WAP sites offer a direct connection to sites that are often used. WAP are easier to use on a phone because the graphics and text were designed to be accessed on a cellophane or PDA.

Yahoo Mobile allows a user to shop by store, category and price. Mobile Driving Directions, People Search and Yellow Pages are also available for mobile access.

Yahoo has mobile games, ring tones, and photos. The Yahoo Alerts allow you to create custom reports of security quotes, weather, news, breaking news, and flight deals.

MSN has mobile Alerts, MSN Messenger, Hotmail and Mobile Web. MSN mobile web has news, sports from ESPN, movie times, restaurant listings and yellow pages. The alerts include weather and changes in weather conditions, news, sports scores and horoscopes. Sports alerts have notifications for sports events, sport scores by quarter and end of game. News alerts provide programmed, breaking headline news, science, technology, health, and business.

Another site that is useful for emergencies is *http://www.emergencyemail.org*. This site provides alerts from The National Weather Service, Homeland Security, and City of Dallas Emergency Preparedness. The service is free and is available nationwide.

Wireless News

The wireless world is full of changes and new developments. WiFi products get a new security certificate named WPA2. The current WEP security is not adequate. The 802.11i standard has not been approved . WPA2 includes AES, a heavy duty encryption standard specified by the US government. WPA2 is backward compatible with WEP hardware. The WPA2 is implemented when the firmware is updated on the wireless router and software is updated on the mobile device.

WiMax is an implementation of the 802.16 standard which promises to deliver high speed Internet (70 megabits per second) at distances up to 30 miles. WiMax is significant because you don't need line of sight or direct view of a satellite for communication. Intel has joined with Alcatel, Alvarion, AT&T, Covad Communications, Proxim, and Siemens in promoting this wireless technology. The first deployment of this technology will be delivery to homes and businesses.

The mobile products still has years of development before they are commercially available. Mobile products need to have low battery drain, be compact and have an affordable price. A Wi-Max product today will have a large form factor, cost about five hundred dollars and you need a service provider. WiMax is actually used now to provide Internet to last mile business complexes and apartments.

Another obstacle for mobile deployment is roaming. With WiFi you need to purchase service from the available provider. WiMax will work if roaming is affordable and carriers do not brand their products.

A new worm that targets Bluetooth in Symbian cell phones is in circulation. This worm targets the Nokia Series 60 phones.

The EPOC.Cabir worm transmits itself to other phones via open Bluetooth connections. One person in a airport who has the virus on their cell phone may cause it to spread to other Symbian phones.

The virus is activated anytime the phone is turned on, although there is no harmful payload at present. The only indication of the virus' presence is a the inscription 'Caribe' on the screen.

There will be security fixes for the phones, but Bluetooth may have limited life span for PDA devices. Bluetooth still has uses in wireless headphones, computer keyboards, and mice.

Nokia is working on encryption for its phones. The encryption is to protect a user's personal data. This appears to be the next evolution in cell phones.

On the Property is the QuickFonts button that remembers the last ten fonts you've used. And that's just the basics. It also remembers the size of each of the fonts, as well as any formatting, including color, that was applied to it.

I have used this option since WordPerfect 8. The button enables me to select any of these specific formatted fonts at any point in the document. Even better ... I can also use it in other documents, as long as it is one of the last ten.

WHAT'S YOUR PROBLEM?

A member asked about adding a new font to a computer. I found a freeware site with the specific font available for download.

Here is one way to add a font to your computer:

1. From the site, I downloaded the font to my Desktop, opened the file checked its two files for viruses and found none

2. From the Windows Taskbar, choose: Start | Settings | Control Panel | Fonts

3. If the Fonts folder is covering up the font(s), drag the Fonts folder out of the way by its blue Title Bar



4. Either drag the fonts into the Fonts folder and drop them anywhere with the other fonts, where they will move themselves into their correct alphabetical order *-or-* select one or both fonts | Ctrl+C | Click anywhere within the Fonts folder | Ctrl+V

5. Use the font in WordPerfect

6. Once the fonts are working in Word-Perfect, you can delete them from your Desktop.
