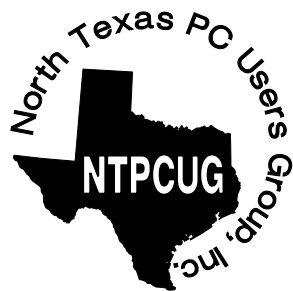

For prospective authors, there are a few, but very important, "Do's and Don'ts" involved in article submission to the newsletter, first of which is accuracy. Be sure of your facts (unless you report them as "rumors") and always remember to report the source(s) as well.

Please don't submit articles that are taken from another source without crediting the source in your article, i.e., if you excerpt something from the Microsoft (or other) Web site, please state that in the article.

Remember to "sign" your article/ story at the bottom. A simple "by Your Name" will be quite helpful, particularly if the editors have questions or suggestions about the story.

Please don't submit the article or story in HTM or .PDF format. It can make editing and formatting quite time consuming and difficult.

We can accept MS Word 97, most WordPerfect files and ASCII .TXT files. The absolutely latest version of any word processor may not convert gracefully to our format and may have to be rejected as a result.

Graphics should be submitted in one of the "standard" formats, i.e., .TIF, .EPS, .GIF, .PCX or .JPG files. While "native" CorelDraw (CDR) files are also OK, other graphics editor native formats may not be convertible.

Again, we want your articles and thank you in advance for your input and cooperation.

Our bylaws require a quorum for the annual membership meeting.

idea or suggestion that might improve the club, or if you just want to offer to help, talk to me or one of the officers. Two years ago **Linda Moore** offered to help and ultimately became Program Chairman, and now, as President Elect, she will be the next President. **Jeri Steele** offered to help and is now the Membership Director, and working on creating a members only section of the web site using Perl. **Billy Gilbreath** has become a system administrator of our web servers. **Chuck Stark** is now assisting **Reagan Andrews** in the Operating Systems SIG, and new SIGs have been started this year by **John Davis** (C#), **Bob Campbell** (Rhino 3D), **Tresa Tatyrek** (Family Tree Maker) and **Larry Martin** (Perl). There are also plenty of less demanding opportunities. Just offer and see what happens, or work to make **your** vision happen.

At the very least, **participate** in SIG meetings by asking questions, answering the questions of others, or offering to do a SIG presentation one month. The simple act of asking a question will energize the meeting and everyone will learn more. SIG leaders really appreciate having a guest speaker now and then, and the change of pace also enlivens the SIG.

When I was elected to the board four years ago, I figured it would take five years to get the club back to where I wanted to see it. We needed to leverage our volunteer resources with technology, improve our



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communication to members, and publicize the value of the user group more effectively.

Since then we have moved locations twice, automated SIG notes on the web site, used the internet much more extensively, actively maintain a visitors database and email system, and have begun to grow the membership again – now around 500. Also, our community outreach started with the ongoing refurbishing of computers for the physically handicapped.

With our current stability, my next goal is development of a greater spirit of community within the user group to help fuel continued membership growth. One technological component for creating a community is a member only area of the web site where members can easily share information about themselves. After years of wanting this, we may have something this year through the efforts of Jeri Steele. Also, there is another effort to look at new Microsoft technology for a members area.

Even without new technology, you can get to know more of the people in SIGs you attend. Personal re-

lationships are an important part of our meetings. Also, bring a friend to a meeting as a guest. There are guest passes at the membership desk that you can hand out to others. This card lists the types of SIGs we have, shows the web address for more information, and gives a \$5 discount for first time memberships.

Speaking of SIGs, two SIGs have different meeting times this month, which may just be temporary. The Alpha Five SIG will meet at 10:00 instead of 9:00, and the Perl SIG will meet at 11:00 instead of 2:30.

Hobbies include "just putting around with plants and trees", sailing and scuba diving.

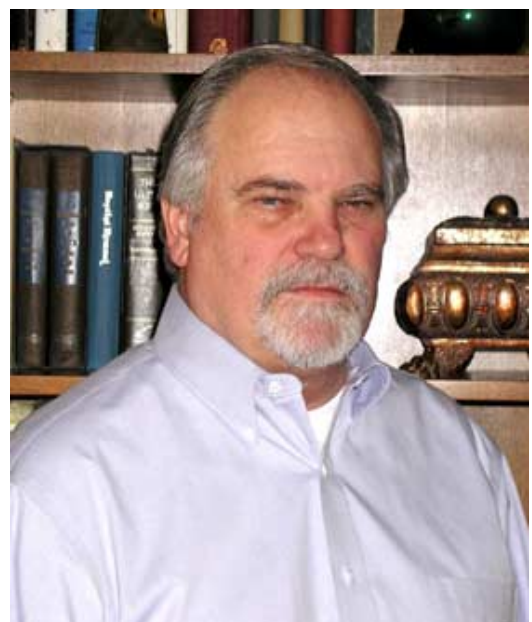
He is a self employed CPA specializing in non-profit organizations and provides audit, tax, and management consulting for non-profit organizations.

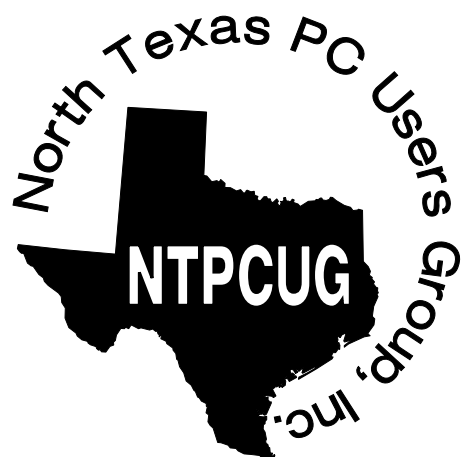

What's past, What's here, and What's future? 'SWAGs' While Microsoft returns to PowerPC, As Intel aims at Cell Phones and Entertainment

Seems like everybody's doing a January think-piece looking at (industry) events over the past year and making SWAGs for the coming year. I've done this several times over the past 13 years with mostly wrong guesses, sort of.

If "SWAG" caught you by surprise, I'll explain, briefly. SWAG is a military acronym for "Scientific, Wild-Assed Guess," and most probably came out of the intelligence community involved in Vietnam efforts during the conflict.

SWAG joined FUBAR and WARBI as the ultimate enlisted opinions of command decision making.

Interesting Events in 2003

A number of very interesting events did occur during 2003 that may have many meanings in terms of the industry's current functioning (and players) and possible/ probable moves in coming months. Most interesting (to me, at least) was a small blurb that appeared in *The Wall Street Journal* on November 4, 2003.

Written by William Bulkeley and Don Clark, *WSJ* staff writers, the brief story described a Microsoft decision to go with IBM technology for the next *Xbox* iteration. Makes a lot of sense, given Macintoshes' superior graphical performance using the CPU technology developed by IBM and Motorola for the *PowerPC* CPU lines. There was also mention that Microsoft switched from Nvidia-based graphics chips to ATI-based graphics chips.

First inclination might be to say "What—Microsoft writing to the PowerPC?" There are several "givens" here that users need to remember to really understand how this decision arrived. First is that the PowerPC CPU isn't a new and strange platform to Microsoft. Microsoft actually ported a version of Windows NT to the platform when it was rolled-out at Comdex/FALL 95 in Las Vegas amid great marketing hype and media hoopla at the "PowerPC Pavillion."

Second is that Microsoft has continued to write code for the platform via the MS Office products for the Macintosh.

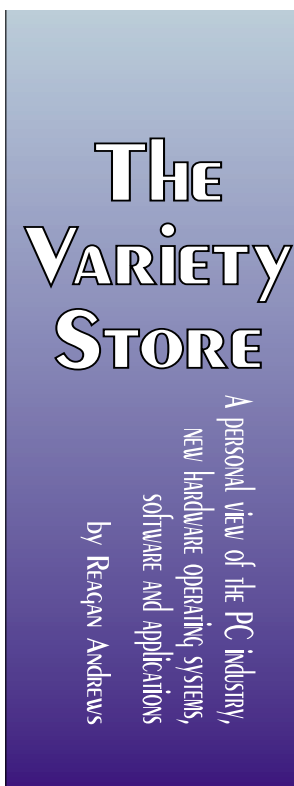
So where's Intel in all this?

It's no secret that the Intel x86 CPU's have always been essentially business applications oriented (as has the PC) in spite of significant advances in graphics handling, mostly thanks to third parties such as Nvidia and ATI. It's just that Apple (IBM & Motorola) has done it better, much better over time. That's why they have kept the edge, even at somewhat "slower" CPU clock rates.

I think Intel loses here, but may get it back with another joint effort with Microsoft aimed at the home entertainment arena.

Back to Microsoft and IBM/Apple questions.

Although lots of penguin worshippers may take joy in fact that Microsoft hasn't seen the benefit(s) of porting applications software to the (?free?) Linux OS, it doesn't mean Microsoft couldn't do so if they wished. The new Mac OS X iterations are really based on a UNIX



kernel (BSD) and a port to Linux shouldn't look like any problem at all, but only to the casual observer.

The new Mac OS is stable. It can be crashed, but the user has to really work at bringing the machine and OS to their knees to do so. Microsoft knows why OS X is stable and it's one of the reasons why MS is reluctant to become involved with the Linux platform at this time

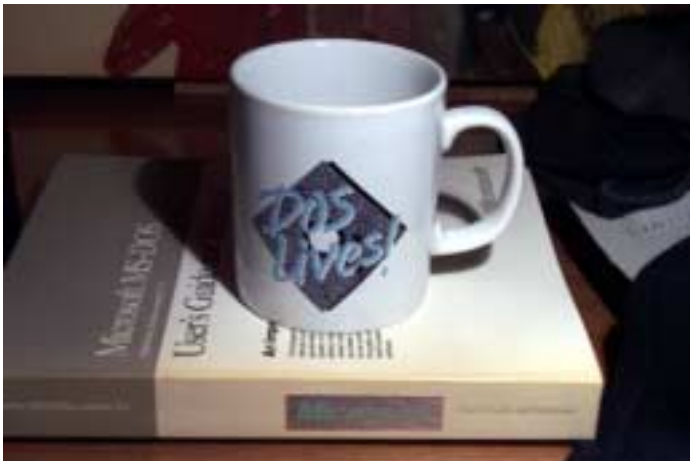
Why? Apple has an absolute "lock" on the hardware

Although a lot of us felt that Steve Jobs not only screwed several independent makers who began building PowerPC machines (at a somewhat lower cost than Apple's machines) when he withdrew the Macintosh OS licenses from them, but may have set Apple back in the process. (I still think so, but Jobs has a lot more money than I)

A very good reason for this behavior lay in the fact that Apple would lose control over the hardware platform—and OS stability would invariably suffer as a result. Apple simply didn't want either the offshore hardware competition, or the bad reputation for producing an unstable OS that would result. I really think this last was a major factor in the Apple decision to withdraw the licensing.

What Microsoft sees

I think Microsoft sees Linux in the same light that Jobs saw "alien" hardware for the same reasons.



MS sees all the permutations and combinations inherent to the PC platform along with vendors who believe only they have truth and light and will insist on doing PC things their way (one of the major problems in making Windows even remotely stable).

Add to this that there isn't "A Linux," but instead there are several versions of Linux (I know that's a clumsy usage, but I don't know the common plural for 'Linux.')

available to users which will further compound the stability problems at the applications software level. This is a holdover factor from the UNIX world and a major reason that applications software for UNIX has historically been so expensive.

Another factor— people

Please don't inundate me with "true success stories" about the power of the people and Open Source software. Truth of the matter is that a large majority of Linux users are technically savvy folks who are willing to learn much more about their systems than the average PC user, willing to invest the time needed to install and configure both the Linux OS and their applications software, and enjoy (pretty much) the challenges facing them in the process.

Picture the early PC, Apple, Commodore, etc., users in 1981-2 and you have the idea.

But, this 2004 and those aren't the "average" PC user these days. It's no accident that Microsoft's Windows XP calls back memories of Melinda Gates' efforts working with "Bob" (object of a lot of ridicule from the PC techie groups) and the easy to use PC. Users now are expecting a "TV Experience" with their PC's and really don't want to know what's in the box and how it works.

What's happening with NTPCUG E-Mail?

I'm glad you asked.

In the next few weeks, we will be converting to a new mail server product called IMail, from Ipswitch. The old product, SLmail, has done us a pretty good job, but no longer seems to be doing everything we need. There are several advantages to the new IMail software:

- ❖ Spam recognition and blocking in IMail are better than what is available in SLmail. Specifically, IMail supports "HTML Parsing", which looks at e-mail the way you and I see it on screen. Spammers have found that they can imbed useless characters in a message to circumvent many spam prevention techniques. IMail catches them anyway.
- ❖ IMail will again allow us to send and receive NTPCUG e-mail from any Internet-connected PC, via Internet Explorer, Netscape, Opera, or other browser. This is especially useful if you are away from home.
- ❖ Using the web interface, users can now change their own passwords. SLmail required that the administrator change passwords when a change was required.
- ❖ Support is better for IMail. In addition to support from Ipswitch, there are very active user forums for asking questions.
- ❖ IMail has greater security to prevent spam from being relayed through the NTPCUG mail server.

There are other features, but probably are not worth mentioning here.

What NTPCUG Users need to know

NTPCUG members with one of our e-mail accounts will re-

tain their existing e-mail address, and should not lose any e-mail in the transition. But due to the greater security within IMail, a minor change will be needed in the account definition within Outlook, Outlook Express, or other e-mail client software. A separate message will be sent to all NTPCUG e-mail account holders explaining the change, and the date it will be required.

The transition will not be totally "transparent to the user", but it will be (or should be) close.

When will all this happen?

The change will probably occur toward the end of January. Some testing is still underway, and we want to confirm that things work properly before we start. Again, there will be messages to NTPCUG e-mail users advising of the schedule.

What can I do to get ready?

The main thing our members can do to make the transition easier is to ensure that you are not leaving e-mail on the server after you download to Outlook, etc. While you won't lose any e-mail, any of it we find tied to SLmail will be transferred to IMail, and you could see old messages repeated again if you normally leave copies on the server.

This same issue may also apply to users of MailWasher. Since MailWasher manages your e-mail for you, it is possible that old messages may show up a second time. Just be aware.

If you have any questions, please send to Postmaster@ntpcug.org. Otherwise, just be looking for messages later in the month advising of what happens next.

Lutheran Church, 6411 LBJ Freeway (West bound service road from the Hillcrest exit). Our workroom is in the basement.

If you, your employer, or a friend, have older computers (Pentium II-200Mhz or better) and/or components (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We have received several corporate do-



nations in the last few months; PLEASE keep checking with your company about donations.

We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.

In addition, we need a volunteer (or two) who have experience in re-inking printer toner cartridges. We have several printers that work but need expensive toner, if purchased retail. OR, you can come by and help inventory the needed cartridges and assist in discount purchases. As the expert, you can tell us what works best.

And last, but not least, we need a volunteer to: determine the proper driver for various donated sound/video/modem cards; download and test the drivers; and save the drivers to floppy disks.

So you can see that we need volunteers with different skills, and have a continuing need for additional computer refurbishing help. Let me know if you can assist.

I am also looking for utility programs that can do batch conversions of stored images to thumbnails or other resolu-

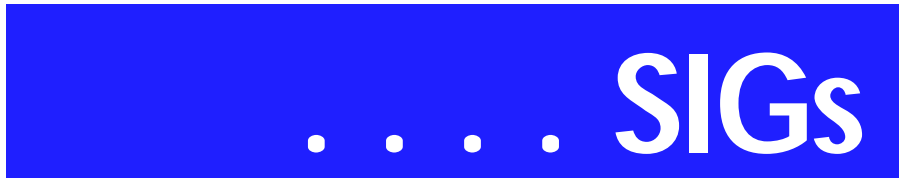

Communications

Zigbee: In January we will discuss the 802.15.4 Zigbee standard. Zigbee will replace X/10 home automation devices that have been in service for 25 years.

X/10 devices were initiated as light and appliance controllers. The product line has expanded to remote control, surveillance and home security systems. For instance, there is a product to monitor your home over the Internet. The first computer controlled home automation was designed for the Radio Shack TRS-80 PC.

Home automation allows the programming of weekly events and wireless remote control. The X/10 home automat-

ion devices have been manufactured by RCA, GE, Radio Shack and at least ten other companies. Zigbee will have a range 245 feet and replace many wired and wireless devices.

Zigbee is expected to become an important standard for home business and vehicular environments. Zigbee will be controlling lighting, air-conditioning, ventilation, home entertainment, remote monitoring and security systems in the home.

In the business and industrial environment Zigbee will operate energy management, proactive maintenance, vibration measurement and robotics. Zigbee will allow the embedding of sensors in automotive products, appliances and security systems.

We have never discussed home automation so if you use any X/10 products join us in the Communications SIG in January.

"In December we discussed creating calendars in Corel with a VB plug-in included in version 11, (also available for use with CD10 as a shareware download from <http://www.oberon-place.com/products/calendarwizard/index.htm> and as a script for versions 7-9 at <http://www.oberon-place.com/draw/drawscripts/index.htm>) We discussed the basic steps involved and Viola! just ten seconds till you have a custom-made calendar which can be further designed and decorated in Corel's limitless fashion-traditional calendars, magnetic calendars, weekly planners, scrolling calendars, 3D calendars and in sizes ranging from the whole year on business cards to poster size wall hangings.

A calendar is yet another irresistible opportunity to combine basic utilitarian function with creative expression limited only by the scope of your imagination. Don't settle for the generic insert-your-photo-here calendar when you have a tool like Corel waiting to serve your self-expression. It's kind of like taking the bull by the horns--make it your goal for 2004 to master the tool and make it serve you instead of frustrating you because of its vastness. Have a prosperous New Year!"

November In Review

For the November meeting, **Martin Hellar** showed the CorelDraw Essentials2 package. It contained the Essen-

tials2 program as well as Corel Photo-book and Corel PhotoAlbum. Essentials2 is a poor man's Corel Draw 11. It has most of the CorelDraw tools and a lot of the features. They are arranged a little differently than CorelDraw and in some respects are easier to use. The PhotoAlbum is very nice and easy to use. It is closely coupled to the Photo-book and lets you make a lot of quick easy correction to your Photos.

Martin showed some these features and some of the shortcomings. The Photo Album contains many nice Photo editing features which make it easy to make substantial improvements in the photos. The session was recorded and can be viewed by going to <http://mail.ntpcug.org/sigs/corel/New/CorelDrawEssentials.exe>. Be warned that the file download is 13 megabytes and will take several minutes time to load with a fast internet connection.

October In Review

For October, **Martin Hellar** showed how Corel Draw can be used to make Web Pages in the sub set SVG (Scalable Vector Graphics) of XML. Since the push in Internet Page design seems to be more and more towards XML format, most graphics products are making the SVG format as one of the Save TO options. The more that you can put the graphics in SVG, the faster the pages will load in the browser.

XML in itself allows the designer to have more flexibility and control in their web page designs. SVG is a text based program. This allows you to quickly modify your web page.

CorelDraw will convert your Vector based page to



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SVG file. Adobe Illustrator and Jasc's Web Draw 1 will also do this. Web Draw 1 makes a fairly clean code conversion. Corel's is quite verbose. Code made from scratch is about one-tenth the size of the Corel code for a relatively simple drawing.

While SVG is not the perfect answer yet, progress is continuing in standards and new features.

Samples of what can be done with simple text code can be viewed on the web at <http://test.dsda.org/svg.html>. If you don't already have a patch to IE or Netscape you will be asked if you want to install it. Better say yes or you can't see the examples. The next generation of Browsers will have the patch in place. Happy viewing. To see the code right click on the sample and select "view svg source".



PC Concepts SIG welcomes all of you to the new year 2004.





Our last meeting of the Year 2003 was typical in that we discussed several aspects of personal computers and other digital devices. Computer memory and digital camera memory was one of these major concerns. Questions that repeatedly come up concern speed, capacity, and compatibility. These are excellent questions and deserved answers are in order as the public is often oversold on the idea that more is always better.

To make proper use of memory, one must never forget that what size one uses must be conveniently controllable. For instance, a small digital camera will store 150 to 1,000 compressed images on a 128 MB flash memory card. For 640 x 480 pixel images typically placed in your e-mail, the 16 MB card that comes with many cameras will store over 150 photos and for a larger display of 1280 x 960 pixels, you may store 32 photos. [See: <http://smith.spike.home.comcast.net/> for more details.]

When the dollars per mega-byte ratio is the same, would you rather have two 64 MB cards rather than one 128 MB card? When going on a trip, would you prefer two 128 Mb cards over one 256 MB card? I prefer not to place all my eggs in only one basket, and for security, I carry three cards with me to ensure against a total loss if one should fail.

The PC Concept SIG, our NTPCUG, and others could benefit by having the information as outlined in the above referenced URL along with many of the SIG's other presentations made readily available. To accomplish this, it will be a fine project for our group to learn more about creating files for the Web Pages while participating with varied subject exploration and learning.

We will build our page using basic techniques to learn the principles of Hypertext Markup Language (HTML) thus enabling us to better understand the Internet and how text and images are placed on the Web. We will occasionally use the word processors and web page application programs where simple efforts are required.

During our opening segment at 9:00, we will begin using some HTML and how it will be used to help build a fine library of *getting started* information. Handouts will be provided to ensure we are talking on the same level without having to purchase any text manuals.

No! We are not going to turn into a *Web Page SIG*. We will begin our operation segment at 10:00 and will include more on removable memory. Discussion will include where higher speed may benefit, reliability, USB 1.1 vs. 2.0, cost trade-offs, availability, and where to buy.

What about small batteries and cells? There are problems. there are work around procedures, and some good bargains. Does your camera, lap top, flashlight, radio need replacements? What is cost-effective between: lead-antimony, lead-calcium, nickel-cadmium, lithium ion, nickel-metal hydride, alkaline, and zinc-manganese,

Make the PC Concept SIG you getting-started SIG. Send or bring your friends whether they are beginners or advanced, all are welcome. There are openings for SIG leaders and assistant leaders too.

Personal Digital Assistants (PDA)

Using a PDA and GPS

In January, we plan on the main topic being 'Using a GPS with your PDA'. In recent years the size and power of PDAs and GPS receivers has reduced to the point that you can now conveniently carry both even for a hiking trip. In fact, Garmin have released a product, the Garmin iQue, which combines both GPS and Palm PDA functionality into the same unit. At this month's meeting we will show another unit which is an external GPS which can connect to any Palm or PocketPC PDA via a serial interface.

At last month's meeting, **David Martin** showed us all how to process and load TV programs onto a PocketPC de-

vice. Some of the key recommendations that were made include reducing the number of pixels used, reducing the frame rate and reducing the number of colors. With this compression, a typical two-hour movie can be loaded onto a 128 MByte memory card (memory stick, MMC, or SD).

One point made was that for action movies, the number of frames per second that can be used must be increased, but for an average TV show the 128M card was really handy for flights and other travel needs. Additionally, people who came to the meeting were able to audition the latest Palm Handheld (the Tungsten T3) and to see how the new wide view mode made the device very useful for seeing documents and spreadsheets.

We hope to see you at this month's meeting and as always will be happy to answer your questions either at the meeting or via WebBoard.

When you have multiple documents open, Ctrl+F6 will allow you to toggle among them. If you have lots of documents open, you might also want to toggle backwards using Shift+Ctrl+F6. This works in all applications.

Just then the blonde flips the alligator on its back, and frustrated, shouts out, "Damn it, this one isn't wearing any shoes either!"

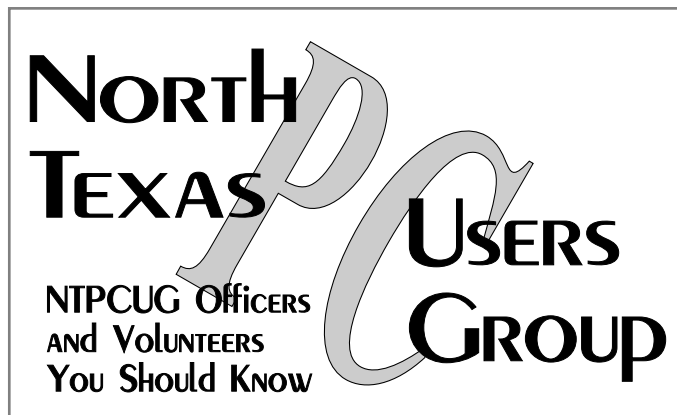
