### Member Communication through WebBoard

WebBoard is a messaging system that the club began using in September 2000. The purpose is to let members ask questions and share information between monthly meetings. This article is to remind you of the value of WebBoard and request your participation, both in asking and answering questions in the 50 different forums.

WebBoard activity has steadily grown over the years. Recently the SIG related posts have represented about 25% of the total posts (the other posts being general news and information).

The top five forums for posts in 2005 are General News & Information, Internet, Operating Systems, Members, and MS Word.

This is good, but it would benefit all of us to have more activity on WebBoard. Benefits of more activity include

- 1 Questions would likely be answered faster since experts would know to expect activity.
- ♦ 2 "Lurkers" would have more content to read.
- ♦ 3 More activity breeds more activity. It should become routine for us to post to Web-Board.
- ♦ 4 It is a great way to gauge the interests of the membership.

There are many sources of information on the web, but our local WebBoard provides unique

benefits. When you ask a question, it is probably being answered by someone you know, and hopefully trust. It also may involve local resources, such as where to buy something. Or it may be that a member can point you to a resource on the web without your having to spend a lot of time "Googling".

One alternative is to just email a member directly. However, then there is no chance for multiple answers, and other members do not get to benefit from the answer.

Currently there are 471 WebBoard users. Of those, 158 are active members. (WebBoard is open to non-members as well.) That means that about half the membership has opened a WebBoard account. It also means we need to work so the other 50% realize what WebBoard can do for them.

So far this year 13 people have posted either a question or answer, and 38 people have logged in at least once. The top five posters in 2005 are **Mary Johnson, Glynn Brooks, Chuck Stark, Bill Parker,** and **Gil Brand.** We certainly need to have more people actively posting.

Mary Johnson scours various email newsletters daily and posts in the General News and Information forum links to articles she finds interesting. For those that want a sampling of industry news and commentary, this is the forum to read.

# Degunking Windows & Degunking Your PC

I've recently read two of the Paraglyph Press books devoted to "degunking": *Degunking Windows*, and *Degunking Your PC*. Both books are co-written by Joli Ballew and Jeff Duntemann.

Gunk is anything that affects your efficient use of a PC. Some gunk is on the PC when it

comes out of the box (*e.g.* AOL and antivirus offers, media player and photo management software). But most PC gunk accumulates over time, usually through neglect, inattention, or lack of planning. Gunk is the molasses that builds up and makes PCs run slower over time.


So what is "degunking"? Here's how it is described in *Degunking Your PC*:

[The degunking] mindset isn't about just technical issues. We

call it a mindset because it involves how you think about the technology you use, how you get organized, and how you maintain your equipment. The mindset isn't something you

adopt for a little while and then forget all about. It requires a little discipline but the results you'll get are well worth the effort. [Chapter 2]

Degunking is good housekeeping: removing what you don't need, organizing what you keep, and preventing future problems through planning and a disciplined approach. There are lots of PC books that tell you how to do things. What makes these books unique is that they also tell you why things are important, and when you should carry out the recommended procedures.

> Degunking Windows is about cleaning up a PC from the inside out – deleting unnecessary files, uninstalling extraneous programs, scrubbing the registry, organizing desktop items, cleaning up and organizing email and attachments, optimizing and tweaking software settings, and removing spyware. The emphasis is on regaining control of your PC and keeping Windows and your applications lean and smooth.

Degunking Your PC is about cleaning up a PC from the outside in – physically cleaning the PC and components, disposing of obsolete hardware, organizing and labeling cables, optimizing the performance of disk drives, setting up networks, and moving to high speed Internet service. There is also some good information about USB and Firewire compatibility that should help you avoid frustration if you upgrade your external hardware. It has lots of pictures to help you do things right.

Both books have a chapter on email management, but other than that they do not overlap.

If you have been reluctant to work on a computer yourself, these books should give you the confidence you have been lacking. And even if you have someone else handle upgrades and re-

### Keeping Defaults is Stupid If You are Working Wireless

Reagan's Paranoia gets a touch out of hand these days with concerns over "wireless" LAN's, email and Internet hackers. This is added to existing emotional, but irrational, feelings that the phones are tapped, the house may be bugged and somebody may be reading his mail.

My Paranoia came from several years in USAF Security Service—and, no, I wasn't a policeman. Everything we worked on was very highly classified and we were "assured" that our telephones were tapped, our conversations monitored and mail probably read by either East German or Russian intelligence groups.

#### Wireless LANs Brought it all back.

Is everybody going wireless for home/ small business networking? Granted, wireless equipment prices are dropping rapidly and going wireless is a lot easier than stringing Cat 5 cables if the PC's are in different rooms. But, I still worry about the security issues even though I know there are some quite powerful firewalls and encryption tools available.

#### Why?

It's the same issue as the "typical" VCR blinking "12:00" in a lot of homes because setting or resetting the VCR clock can be a major pain. Most wireless home users and probably a lot of small business users just won't go to the trouble of configuring the units' encryption capabilities for that reason. Some of the blame does belong to wireless vendors who have made security re-configupairs, you'll understand what they are doing and know that the work is done right. Both books are highly recommended!

ration both unintuitive and often quite difficult for the "typical" home user to understand.

This security problem, by the way, doesn't belong solely to home and small business systems. IT-oriented media continue to report major network systems with significant vulnerabilities as a result of unprotected wireless nodes.

Same thing applies to configuration of the Cable/DSL routers' firewalls or installing a good firewall on a single PC endowed with broadband Internet access. Many users are either to lazy to bother, or don't know how important making their systems secure is.

Not making security important in a home or business system can easily lead to data and identity theft.

There are receivers available that allow detection of unprotected wireless LANs while driving past businesses or down neighborhood streets.



Acquiring such knowledge and skills can be accomplished in other, usually expensive venues, but the process won't be nearly as much fun or personally rewarding.

#### Status of the computer refurbishing project?

NTPCUG Volunteers have assembled, tested and shipped their **1,500th** PC since the project began. Currently, the volunteers are averaging 500 refurbished PC's for impaired users per year.

For new members, NTPCUG sponsors a volunteer program to refurbish "old" PC's using NTPCUG volunteers with the finished computers going to visually impaired individuals via the Texas Center for the Physically Impaired (TCPI), *http://www.handicapability.org*. All of the equipment goes to blind or visually-impaired persons in America and in several foreign countries.

If you have basic hardware skills, or just want to learn, contact me at *gb1@ntpcug.org* We only have 12 work stations, so please request a place. Don't just arrive expecting to find a station available.

We have regular sessions every Tuesday and Thursday, 1-4PM, at King of Glory Lutheran Church, 6411 LBJ Freeway (West bound serv-





ice road from the Hillcrest exit). Our workroom is in the basement level of the church. Ring the outside bell for entry into the building.

If you, your employer, or a friend, have older computers (Pentium II-300Mhz or better) and/or components (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We have received several corporate donations in the last few months; PLEASE keep checking with your company about donations.

We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.

And last, but not least, we need a volunteer to: determine the proper driver for various donated sound/video/modem cards; download and test the drivers; and save the drivers to floppy disks.

So you can see that we need volunteers with different skills, and have a continuing need for additional computer refurbishing help. Let me know if you can assist.

munication is routed through Hong Kong. Or you dial the operator and the operator doesn't understand your request. With VOIP, you need to have the phone numbers for local emergency services readily available for use.

For the homeowner, an item to consider should be emergency power. The telephone company provides the electricity for your phone service. With VOIP, you are responsible for powering your equipment. The 2003 power blackout in the Northeast is a reminder that one hour of power backup is not sufficient.

The cell phone companies plan for an electrical outage lasting for two to four hours, but again, the 2003 Northeast electric service outage lasted for one to three weeks. Local thunderstorms have interrupted electrical service for one to three days. The capacity to operate for three days should be considered if VOIP will be your only service.

The third consideration is promptness of repair services. Telephone companies have always been responsive to service disruptions that affect public safety. If someone needs phone service because of medical problems, they get priority. An Internet provider may not be prepared to respond to a request for priority repair service for medical reasons, yet a severed backbone Internet connection will get priority repair.

If your VOIP or Internet service is interrupted, how fast will the response be? We will discuss the practically of VOIP in our May SIG.

MAY — Character Formatting, Part II Continuing with Character formatting, here are some of the features we will look at: What's This?, Three Ways to Remove Character Formatting, Change Case, Format Painter, Symbols and Drop Caps.

JUNE — Paragraph Formatting, Part I Do you know the secret that the paragraph symbol at the end of each paragraph holds? Is indenting text a trial-orerror event? Want to know a shortcut for changing line spacing to double space or space-and-a-half? Understanding Word's logic about paragraph formatting is one of the most important aspects of Word.

#### sTOP tHIS mESS

Way back in Word 97, a most helpful feature was added. You may not even be aware that it exists because is has been turned on by default by Microsoft. I'm referring to the cAPS IOCK problem ... where the letters you capitalize show up as lowercase and the letters you type in lowercase show up as capitals.

#### WHAT'S NEW @ MICROSOFT?

'Microsoft Plans New Browser Version' "Microsoft Corp. will release a new version of Internet Explorer, the world's most widely used Internet browsing software, with new, built-in security features," Chairman Bill Gates said Tuesday. "We have decided to do a new version of Internet Explorer, this is IE 7," Gates said at the RSA Security Conference being held in San Francisco.

The world's largest software maker had not previously indicated whether it planned to release a new version of IE.

Recently, however, Microsoft's browser has been facing competition for the first time in years from the Firefox browser, a free Web browser developed by a network of software programmers.

#### **Operating Systems**

Occasionally, when members describe system problems in the Operating Systems SIG, either Chuck Stark or myself will suggest possibility that these problems may originate in the PC's BIOS setup settings. That may not be such great advice unless the user with the problem(s) is fairly knowledgeable about their system.

Reason is that most PC users now pur-

chase their systems with the operating system installed and configured and have never seen the BIOS setup routines. If the BIOS routines were mostly "hard-wired" this really wouldn't be a problem, but that's not the



case anymore. These programs are contained on an EPROM (electronicallyprogrammable, read-only memory) chip on the motherboard and (now) contain hundreds of lines of code.

In the past, BIOS setup routines could only be reached before the operating system loaded or via special programs on a bootable floppy disk. Many of the new BIOS set routines can now be reached from Windows, and that may, or may not, be a good thing.

Although we may think of the BIOS setup as being just hardware oriented, its settings can greatly affect how the OS and software programs perform. And, the settings can change over time without user input. A "bad" (dead) backup battery on the motherboard can cause the BIOS setup to revert to "default" settings that may not reflect how the system was originally configured.

An example of BIOS defaults that can kill operation is found in some ASUS motherboards that had the hard disk in a default read-only configuration. Just try and install Win XP on this system before changing that default!

#### Spring Cleaning Time

Tips on Software Installation

To get the most out of your Operating System and other applications, one must find and select a number of options that may be beneficial. We will look into identifying these features and options that are available but seldom get turned on.

When you install the operating system and applications yourself, then you can ensure that desirable features are available. What if your system came with these already installed? Also, when you select the 'Recommended' installation from an install wizard, you seldom get even those features that are highly touted as desirable by the manufacturer.

We will demonstrate how to eliminate these problems whether you are installing new or you need to correct and update your existing software.

# Personal Digital Assistants (PDA)

In May, we will be discussing Bluetooth headsets. . Prices for Bluetooth headsets have decreased in cost and more phones include Bluetooth capability. Bluetooth headsets provide a way to enter, leave and answer your phone without the restraint of a cord. Corded headsets do get tangled with the seat belts.

Bluetooth devices can be powered by replaceable AAA battery or internal non-replaceable battery. Manufacturers claims for talk and standby time for Bluetooth headsets does not come close to the product specifications. The AAA batteries can be alkaline or rechargeable. Neither of these are an inexpensive way to power a headset. Alkaline batteries usually last one week. The internal batteries usually charge fast but you need to recharge in a few days.

Bluetooth headsets communicate via a flashing LED's and audible tones. Most functions are standard for all Bluetooth headsets. There are functions that are unique to each headset and smartphone. To enable functions, there is a sequence of pressing and holding buttons to enable features and pairing (establishing communication with your smartphone). . When you look at the instruction books the directions are clear, but manipulating functions while driving or in a meeting is difficult.

When a smartphone rings, the Bluetooth headset will also have its own ring tone to indicate something needs attention. A Bluetooth headset can operate two phones simultaneously.

The audio quality of Bluetooth headsets is good when used in an enclosed area such as an auto or a room. Audio quality decreases when used outside, in a large area or when there a strong wind. The degradation in audio quality is not due to the electronics in the headset --Bluetooth headsets generally have shorter microphones. The headset microphones extend to the side of the jaw and are not placed in front of the mouth as with corded headsets.

One other consideration is how the microphone cancels noise. An extended



microphone helps. The quality noise canceling electronics varies depending on model and manufacturer. Bluetooth headsets are generally short and there is no noise canceling foam surrounding the microphone.

Another consideration of purchasing a Bluetooth headset is the fit of the headset. The Bluetooth headsets generally hang on top of the ear. These headsets may fall off if you reach down to pick up something or reach for something above your head. The corded headsets have a better fit on the ear and are more stable. The body of the device hangs on the side of the ear or behind the ear. When the body of the device is behind the ear the headset is more physically stable.

There are other considerations for a Bluetooth headset. On a smartphone, you can turn off Bluetooth. If you are traveling or in proximity to a large group of people, disabling Bluetooth may be good security. Disabling Bluetooth will not affect the operation of the phone. When Bluetooth is disabled there is no concern about viruses or eavesdropping on your personal conversation.

Bluetooth has 8 channels for communication, so there may some places Bluetooth may not function properly. Blue-

tooth is another 2.4 MHz device which may interfere or receive interference from microwave ovens, cordless phones, and X10 cameras. WiFi is also on the 2.4 MHz with Bluetooth but there are no interference problems.

Pairing is the process of establishing communication between the Bluetooth headset and a phone. Some headsets automatically power off if there is no phone activity. If your headset is off but the phone rings and Bluetooth is connected, you won't be able to talk using the phone until you disable Bluetooth.

Also, Bluetooth headsets go into paring mode when you insert a battery or remove the headset from a charger. You will receive messages on the display that your phone has lost communication with your headset. And, there are phone display messages asking if you would like to reestablish communication with your headset.

There are more advantages and disadvantages of wireless headsets. We will discuss these Bluetooth headsets in our May SIG.

#### <u>M A Y</u>

Keeping text from separating at the end of lines and pages is often a concern. There are several excellent choices for controlling where your document text separates. There are also ways to ensure that words will always be hyphenated at certain places within the word. Be prepared to take control of these issues after this meeting.

#### <u>J U N E</u>

Font, Line, Paragraph, Page, Justification ... you have probably used all these types of formatting in your documents. As usual, there are many more options that you may not have tried, and may not even realize are available.

#### <u>JULY</u>

You can have up to two Headers and two Footers in a document simultaneously. In my 20-some years of using WordPerfect, I have never needed more than this. Yet, you can replace any of them with a different one as many times as your document requires. And, discontinuing them is only three clicks away.

Add the Current Date to Your Document

On the Application Bar, click the date button. It may appear spelled out or as an icon with the number 10 on it.


