Microsoft plans to integrate *rootkit* detection technology



into future versions of the Windows AntiSpyware application. Rootkit are techniques used by sophisticated spyware coders to gain administrative access to compromised machines to run stealthy updates to the software or reinstall spyware programs after a user deletes them.

Rootkits are cloaking technologies that hide files, Registry keys, and other system objects from diagnostic and security software. Rootkits are employed by malware attempting to keep their implementation secret.

A company producing recorded music labels has included a rootkit on a copy protected CDs. See

These Rootkits are not disclosed in the EULA (End User License Agreement) and an uninstall program is not included. If a user tries to delete the rootkit, then the user will no longer be able to access their CD.



NTPCUG Website Updates - Search Engine Data

In July 2005, Birl Smith discovered the DMOZ Open Directory Project, <http://www.dmoz.org>, which is a project for adding your Website to this directory, as well as, updating the keywords for your Website for 145 search engines.

The Open Directory Project is the largest, most comprehensive human-edited directory of the Web. It is constructed and maintained by a vast, global community of volunteer editors.

The web continues to grow at exponential rates. Automated search engines are increasingly unable to turn up useful results to search queries. The small paid editorial staffs at commercial directory sites can't possibly keep up with all of the submissions. As a result, the quality and comprehensiveness of their directories has suffered.

In some cases, the rootkit will crash a user's system or produce a blue screen of death. All of this occurs because a user wanted to listen to a music CD. These rootkits pose a threat to your computer because these backdoors provide unprotected system access which can produce system instability or worse.

Just as the Oxford English Dictionary became the definitive word on words through the efforts of volunteers, the Open Directory Project is following in its footsteps to become the definitive catalog of the Web.

Open Directory was founded in the spirit of the Open Source movement and is the only major directory, which is 100% FREE. According to the Open Directory Project, there is not, nor will there ever be, a cost to submit a site to the directory, and/or to use the directory's data.

The Open Directory powers the core directory services for the Web's largest and most popular search engines and portals, including AOL Search, DirectHit, Google, HotBot, Lycos, Netscape Search and hundreds of others.

Why does this matter? The NTPCUG website is our major marketing vehicle for distributing information about our user group and obtaining new members. There are several million people, who live in the DFW area but search engine wise, we have not been easy to find. Here's why. These are the keywords that were previously used in the Meta tags on our homepage and which also captured by the search engines.

As a result, the NTPCUG Google rank was 27 and NTPCUG appeared on the third Google WebPage. Yet there were other user groups, which were listed on the first Web page for the Google search.

Because the Open Directory Project is an all-volunteer project, DMOZ.org states that it may take from 3 weeks to 4 months for all of the search

engines to be updated. As of 10-31-05, not all of the 145 search engines have applied the updates, which Jeff Frauenheim submitted for NTPCUG. It may be another 30-60 days before all of the updates are completed

Starting on August 31, 2005, Jeff Frauenheim produces a Search Engine Report for the NTPCUG Board of Directors. This report is produced at the end of every month and Jeff does a search on these two terms:

From the Past Comdex Silliness

November always had importance for me because of Veterans Day, Thanksgiving and COMDEX/Fall. That last is gone, probably never to be resurrected, and replaced by CES (Consumer Electronics Show), but subject of this foray into the potential evils of technology.

Japan's Softbank had purchased COMDEX from its original owners, purchased the aging Sands Hotel and Casino, and constructed a new 500,000 square foot convention center to supplement the space available at the Las Vegas Convention Center and other venues in Las Vegas.

The event(s) described in the following took place at COMDEX in Las Vegas in the early 1990's before cell phones had become ubiquitous to the extent they are now. It was the time when available COMDEX information was rapidly becoming more marketing hype and less technical in nature and was also a year that Softbank claimed 175,000 – 200,000 attendees at the giant computer show.

In fact, the only larger men's room I had seen before was the men's room at the Resi Ball Haus in (then) West Berlin. Back to the COMDEX restroom

Marketing folks hate to be out of touch at any time. A Las Vegas group of entrepreneurs capitalized on this vulnerability and were renting cell phones to COMDEX attendees for a substantial fee.

A number of gentlemen in nifty, color-coordinated suits, ties and dress shoes were utilizing all the facilities when I walked into the room. Dress shoes were totally out of place to experienced COMDEX participants and marked these gentlemen as of a marketing persuasion who were COMDEX virgins.

Lessons Learned Too Late - Another Attack of the Killer Worms

You may have recently heard reports in the media about some strange computer worms that attacked thousands of computer networks, effectively shutting them down. In a society that likes to place blame for every negative event, blame has been placed on a variety of places, such as Microsoft for creating vulnerable software, to the users who had not properly and immediately patched their operating systems, or updated their antivirus protection. As it is often typical in these circumstances, very little blame has been placed on the miscreants who created and released these computer worms.

and refrain from hilarious outbursts of laughter at this poor fellow's obvious embarrassment. Blushing furiously, he departed the area as quickly as possible.

That was then, the early 1990's, and the situation now would probably be quite different.

Well, maybe not. Point of the memory is the rapid changes being brought to our society by technological advances – not all of them positive.

While the financial damage done by these worms, commonly called by the names Zotob, PnP-worm, Rbot, and several other monikers, was less than some of the more disastrous worm and virus attacks, it was still substantial. Media reports account for thousands of computer networks and systems shut down for various periods of time while IT staff attempted to identify and repair the damage. Typical of the damage reported, caused by these computer worms, was the 50,000 employees of 13 Daimler-Chrysler assembly plants in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Ohio, Delaware and Michigan, who were idled for nearly an hour while technicians restored the computers which control the plants. Up to fifty thousand lost man-hours of auto production can easily amount to significant production losses. Other victims of this same series of computer worm attacks, as reported by the national media were SBC Communications, Associated Press, ABC and CNN networks, the New York Times, Caterpillar, U. S. Customs, and many others. SBC reported that the computer utilized by its customer service employees kept rebooting as a result of the worm infections. U. S. Customs Service reported long delays in processing international passengers as its computer center in Virginia was effectively shut down for about five hours, resulting in major delays at locations as diverse as Miami and New York as Customs agents utilized printed lists or backup computer systems. The county wide 911 emergency phone system in Jefferson County, Washington, was disrupted for about 10 hours. These are but a few of the examples of the damage and inconvenience caused by a recent attack of computer worms.

What these worms all have in common is that they all rely on a recently disclosed vulnerabil-

ity in several Windows operating systems, and exploit a security hole in Windows' "PnP" or "Plug and Play" service, a feature intended to detect new hardware installed on Windows computers, and automate the configuration process. An August patch (MS05-039) intended to close the vulnerability, which Microsoft labeled as "critical", was released on August 9, shortly before the worm attacks, but the time between the release of the patch and the attacks was so short, that countless organizations had not yet installed the patch on their computer systems. The concept and crude code of a computer worm that could exploit the vulnerability was posted to a security website often read by hackers and crackers on a Wednesday evening, and by Saturday morning the first variant of the Zotob worm, named Zotob.A appeared in the wild and started its attack. Within a matter of a few days, several other variants of Zotob have appeared, along with a slew of similar worms, such as the Rbot, and began wreaking their havoc.

Some commercial computer networks using sophisticated antivirus software that depends heavily on "heuristics" or software behavioral patterns, rather than the digital signatures commonly utilized by most of the retail antivirus products intended for home use, escaped damage, because they work proactively before an attack can take place, rather than reactively, after attacks have been reported. One of the examples of such commercial software that protected companies from attack proactively was Esafe, from Aladdin Software (www.aladdin.com/esafe).

Acknowledging that there are still Windows computers that are infected with the major forms of malware, Microsoft released a free utility that can remove Zotob along with its variants, and several other major viruses and worms. This util-

ity can be downloaded for free at www.microsoft.com/malwareremove. It should be noted that this Microsoft utility will only remove a few dozen of the most common worms and viruses and their variants, such as Bagel, Sober, and Netsky, but is not a substitute for a properly updated antivirus program. The antivirus software publisher McAfee also had a similar free downloadable utility at vil.nai.com/vil/stinger. The free online antivirus scans, referenced in a previous column here, such as those from Trend Micro (housecall.antivirus.com), BitDefender (www.bitdefender.com), Panda (www.pandasoftware.com), and others, can detect and remove much more malware than the limited downloadable utilities.

Sadly, pain is an excellent teacher, and hopefully we have learned our lesson. It is now more imperative than ever that security patches be promptly and properly installed both on our home computers as well as distributed throughout our vast commercial computer networks. It is also imperative that appropriate protective software, such as antivirus, firewall, and anti-spyware software be installed and updated constantly.

With proper and timely protection, we can do much to protect our systems from more devastating computer virus and worm future attacks which are sure to come.

NTPCUG Volunteers have assembled, tested and shipped their **1,800th** PC since the project began. Currently, the volunteers are averaging 500 refurbished PC's for impaired users per year.

For new members, NTPCUG sponsors a volunteer program to refurbish "old" PC's using NTPCUG volunteers with the finished computers going to visually impaired individuals via the Texas Center for the Physically Impaired (TCPI), <http://www.handicapability.org>. All of the equipment goes to blind or visually-impaired persons in America and in several foreign countries.

If you have basic hardware skills, or just want to learn, contact me at gb1@ntpcug.org. We only have 12 work stations, so please request a place. Don't just arrive expecting to find a station available.

We have regular sessions every Tuesday and Thursday, 1-4PM, at King of Glory Lutheran Church, 6411 LBJ Freeway (West bound serv-



ice road from the Hillcrest exit). Our workroom is in the basement level of the church. Ring the outside bell for entry into the building.

If you, your employer, or a friend, have older computers (Pentium III -500Mhz or better) and/or components (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We have received several corporate donations in the last few months; PLEASE keep checking with your company about donations.

We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.

And last, but not least, we need a volunteer to: determine the proper driver for various donated sound/video/modem cards; download and test the drivers; and save the drivers to floppy disks.

So you can see that we need volunteers with different skills, and have a continuing need for additional computer refurbishing help. Let me know if you can assist.

If you have a friend or relative who constantly "borrows" your copy of the latest *North Texas PC News*, a gift membership might be especially welcome.



An out-of-towner drove his car into a ditch in a very rural area. Luckily, Farmer Jones came to help with his big strong horse named Hobo . . .



Office Programs May Stop Responding When You Save a New File to a Floppy Disk Drive
“On a Microsoft Windows 2000-based computer that has Update Rollup 1 for Windows 2000 Service Pack 4 (SP4) installed, Microsoft Office programs may stop responding when you save a new file to a floppy disk drive. For example, when you save a new Microsoft Word document to a floppy disk drive, Word may stop responding.”

If you are having this problem in Word 2002 or 2003, your fix has not yet been issued.

Linda Moore, NTPCUG Past President, asked me if I could help her with a “debugger” problem she was having in Word 2003. I could not, but posted it at Woody’s Lounge. Linda registered at the Lounge and continued the post dialog. You can read the entire post (*without having to register*) at: <http://www.wopr.com>.

Linda kept me informed of her progress, as follows:

Sunday ...

“...I wanted to email you what I found out. This is a Word 2003 problem, if you are running W2K SP 2 (which I installed on July 13, 2005) and Office 2003 SP2. What triggers the problem is trying to save a Word file onto the floppy disk. The workaround is to save it to the hard drive and then go to Windows Explorer and do drag and drop.

“This is also why I just started having the problem because I updated W2K to SP 2 on 7-13-05, which is why everything worked just fine for the 2+ years prior to that W2K SP2 patch.

“I always save it to the hard drive first but if I need to put it on a floppy, then



I use the “save as” command and select the “a” floppy drive.

“This problem is probably also true for XP as well.

“I went to the Adobe Acrobat site to see if I could glean any information. Couldn’t find anything on my specific problems but discovered that there are lots of problems between Acrobat and Office 2003. Some thought that it was the Office 2003 SP2 that created the problem (formatting & printing) but my problem started occurring a month prior to my installing Office 2003 SP2 on 10-11-05. I did a search in their knowledge base for every possible combination and I got a dozen on Word 2003 but when I search on Word 2003 debugger, I got zero hits.”

“[Linda’s response to the person from the Lounge who responded to the post] Alan, I read all of the links. The second link applies to older versions of Acrobat and Word 2003. I am now going to do a Google search and see what turns up.”

“[Alan’s response] I don’t have a solution but the problem has been identified. See http://groups.google.com/group/microsoft.public.office.misc/browse_thread/thread/fb19c6a6f776a72a/20554696c6531655%2320554696c6531655?sa=X&oi=groupsr&start=2&num=3.”

“I installed SP 4 for W2K on July 13, 2005. It seems that with that update and Office 2003, the debugger error occurs when you try to save a file to your floppy disk drive. The way to avoid the problem is to save to hard drive first, which I do but instead of then saving to the floppy drive to go to Windows Explorer and drag and drop. Microsoft is working on a fix but it is not available yet.”

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I told Linda I wanted to include this in the newsletter. Following is her additional information:

Monday ...

“I also figured out something else that your users might like to be aware of. If they get an error message, which involves the debugger, then IMO it probably means that there is a coding error. Unfortunately, there is currently no way to close or cancel the debugger. The only thing to do is to do a soft reboot. Users should always report this type of error to Microsoft including the same type of information that I have included such as OS, patches, Office and patches, etc.

“I got all of my dates for when I had done what by using the new version of Windows Update 3.1. Your users need to check this out, because this offers a lot of information.

“In the case of Office 2003 SP 2, this obviously did not provide for the user to save a file directly to the floppy disk. Microsoft is in the process of fixing this but I have no idea when this patch will be available.”

Wednesday ...

“I tested the fix and it works.

“Another tip. After saving a file to the floppy, save another file to your hard drive. This will prevent the problem of the save command going to the floppy drive first.”

Later Wednesday ...

“Microsoft has just released the fix for

W2K, which I am in the process of downloading right now. Here is the info.

“Install this update to resolve an issue in which Microsoft Office programs may stop responding when you try to save new files to a floppy disk drive after installing Update Rollup 1 for Windows 2000 Service Pack 4. After you install this update, you may have to restart your computer.

Is it time to reinstall or upgrade Windows?

[Yes, this a repeat from October—since we didn’t get around to it after other discussions/business, etc. I still believe the subject is important and deserves presentation.]

With Win 9.x, I experienced gradual corruption over time that made reinstallation a semiannual event. Win 2000 and XP don’t appear to have as significant tendencies toward gradual corruption as earlier versions, but reinstallation may become necessary over time, or as a result of poorly-written applications software—Yep, it’s still out there and waiting bash the unlucky user’s system.

I tend to favor “clean installation” over reinstalling over the existing operating system for a number of reasons. So do most of the media experts.

Actually, given my druthers (if I had a technician to do the work), I’d opt for a really, really “clean” installation beginning with FDISK and reformatting the drive. But, with the current flock of huge capacity drives, most of us would probably settle for installation in a new folder rather than wipe the whole disk.

Major drawback to a “clean installation” is necessity of reinstalling and reconfiguring all my applications software as well as Windows itself. That’s a lot of hard work with XP.

Reinstallation over the existing operating system has some major drawbacks as well. If the Registry itself is corrupted reinstallation won’t solve the problem(s). Also, reinstallation over the existing system doesn’t guaranty that corrupted system files and drivers will be replaced with appropriate, uncorrupted files.

Before doing either installation, consider other possible sources of the operating system difficulties. Places to look are semi-loose or worn cables, inexpensive and marginal memory chips, and a system power supply that’s in the process of failing. This latter can be extremely subtle and hard to detect since modern “switching” power supplies are quite different than old-fashioned linear power supplies that tend to fail rapidly and completely.

The above assumes that the user has scanned the PC for viruses, spyware, Trojans and other malware that may actually be source of the operating system problems rather than the operating system.

Windows XP Inside Out

You already know your way around a desktop – so now dig into Windows XP and really put your PC to work! How? Start coming to the Windows XP Inside Out SIG.

Home Security Cameras

In November, we will discuss home security cameras. The cost of home security cameras is decreasing. Whether the security camera is for home protection, watching the nanny or a child's outdoor activities these cameras can be very useful devices.

Security cameras vary in size, shape and versatility. There are wireless cameras operating on 2.4 MHz. The wired cameras can be wired direct for audio/video or Ethernet (IP). The security cameras can be black and white or color. The newer models may be

equipped with night vision. There is inexpensive software and hardware to monitor your cameras over the Internet

We will discuss installing a security camera. There are some considerations on where to place the camera. Outdoor cameras should be placed where they have protection from sun and weather conditions. The wired cameras usually have power connections at the video/audio output. Wireless cameras can be battery powered but a camera that is permanently mounted will require a power source.

Changing the Decimal Character

When typing tabular columns, you may need to use hard hyphens, colons, or other characters.

Here's where to change the period to another character, a hard hyphen in this example:

1. Set the decimal tabs in your tabular columns
2. Set the tabular columns
3. Format | Line | Tab Set
4. At Tab Type, choose: Decimal
5. At Character to Align On., select the period | then type a hyphen to replace it | OK

Now, when typing your text in your tabular columns, press Ctrl+Hyphen to insert hard hyphens.

WHAT'S YOUR PROBLEM?

Jim Menefee was working with a table in which one of the cells contained a formula. He wanted to remove the formula and type an asterisk (*as text, not as a multiplier*) in the cell. Here are the steps he took to achieve that.

Remove the Formula

1. Position the insertion point in the cell containing the formula
2. From the Menu Bar: Table | Formula Bar ... to display the two-row formula bar
3. Delete the formula in the formula bar | Enter (*or click the blue checkmark*)

This worked. However, when he typed the asterisk, the blue formula triangle appeared in the corner of the cell, indicating the asterisk was being treated as a multiplier.

Change the Numeric Formatting

1. Position the insertion point in the cell to contain the asterisk (*as text*)
2. From the Menu Bar: Table | Numeric Format | Cell
3. At Format for Numbers in Cell, mark: Text | OK

Then, he was able to type the asterisk as text. Thanks, Jim!

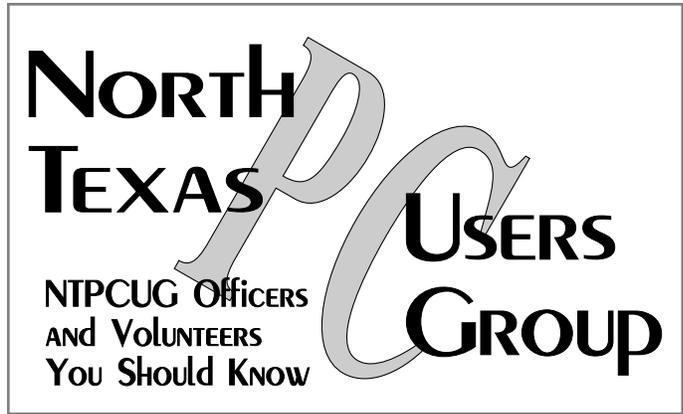
