If you are not volunteering, now is the time. NTPCUG needs you.





Battle over 1st Windows Vista boot Screens-stirs PC vendor wrath

Microsoft must feel that it is embroiled in another round of "All pile on" given the furor being raised over the 1st Vista, the next iteration of Windows, boot up on a new PC. Seems lots of vendors want to be included in that processboth here in the US and in the EU as well.

Since I've never purchased a new PC with the operating system already installed, I wasn't aware of the vendors' concerns. I've installed a lot of Windows versions from 2.0 to XP, though, and am aware that the user makes a number of choices here.

Vendors claim that Microsoft makes a lot of choices for the user with "default" selections that may be difficult for the novice user to change as part of the "first boot" screens dis-

played on their PC. I'm using the word "novice" somewhat tonguein-cheek since even advanced users complain that changing the MSdictated "defaults" with release of Windows XP can be somewhat daunting.

According to several media blurbs, the Justice Department reports it has received a number of vendor complaints concerning this issue with the coming Vista OS (operating system.) And it's not just software houses complaining here. PC makers are equally if not more upset over this Vista matter.

Also, we need to remember that the Justice Department has been tasked with monitoring Microsoft's compliance with the antitrust agreements made to settle the matter.

Why the vendor complaints? Easy. Some PC makers "tailor"

these screens and often are paid to offer choices of antivirus programs, broadband Internet providers, anti spyware programs and other services and software. Sometimes these are the difference between earning vs. losing money given the very tight hardware margins involved in selling their PC's.

Two complaining vendors named in a recent story in The Wall Street Journal are Hewlett-Packard and Google, each of whom feel that Microsoft is encroaching on turf that should be theirs. Each claims that Vista preempts the user selection process and makes switching "defaults" more difficult for novice users than should be the case.

The WSJ article quoted a Microsoft spokesman saying MS has "worked closely with partners 'to make sure Windows Vista provides flexibilitywhile remaining faithful to the goal of putting us-



ers first'."

Meanwhile, some media hint that Windows Vista won't be released until December of this year.

The other shoe drops Microsoft Announces Web-based Antivirus, Firewall & Anti-Spyware Service

OneCare will be Microsoft's entry into antivirus, firewall and anti spyware arena. Described as a "Service" that will constantly run in the background, the new MS program/ service will feature antivirus components, a firewall, anti spyware/ malware and system maintenance capabilities.

A beta version of the new service. OneCare, can be downloaded from Microsoft and will be released in its final format in June of this vear. After its release it will be available as an Internet-based service for \$49.95 per year.

Microsoft announced that the annual price would allow up to three PC's to be protected which is somewhat less than the MSRP (manufacturer's suggested retail price) of competing antivirus software. Key word here is "MSRP" which usually doesn't reflect the deep discounts and rebates available to users from other vendors.

This does raise a question. Will Microsoft also release multiuser home versions of Windows Vista as well? Apple already does this with OS X and this would go a long way to solving one of my major complaints about the cost of running Windows on multiple home PC's.

Back to OneCare.

Included in the Service are:

- Antivirus and Firewall protection,
- Backup and Restore functions that allow backup to CDs, DVDs or to external storage devices,
- Tune-up which "takes care of routine maintenance and helps improve your computer's

performance including: Automatic virus scanning, Hard disk defragmenting, Removing unnecessary files, Makes sure that important security updates from Microsoft are installed efficiently and on time.

This all would appear to be quite useful—if the user wants to allow Microsoft permanent, unlimited access to their PC. A question for me is will the program also install system restore points *before* making upgrades/ security patches? If not, I learned the hard way with Win NT 4.0 that this might not be a really good idea.

Remember, OneCare is still in beta. Some media sources are already reporting "holes" in the OneCare firewall default bypass settings that allow applications using the Java Virtual Machine or have a digital signature to connect to the Internet according to CNET News.

It will be highly interesting to see how this plays out in the next several months.

Faces from the past Philippe Kahn, founder of Borland International

A recent WSJ article on Borland's intended acauisition of Segue Software briefly mentioned



Borland International founder **Philippe Kahn** and reminded me of the early history of the PC and the software that made it truly useful. French-borne Philippe Kahn played a significant role in the early days.

Many of our current members probably won't remember Philippe Kahn or his earliest commercial program, *Turbo Pascal*. In 1983, it was the first inexpensive language compiler that was available at a price that most users could afford

when other Pascal compilers were selling for hundreds of dollars.

As Borland grew under Kahn, it became a major player in computer languages followed by *Quattro Pro* in 1987, *Paradox* which was acquired from Ansa Software and was used by



the NTPCUG for our membership database for several years. (Each of our membership directors has had "favorite" database programs over our 24 years.)

Kahn was a featured speaker at several NTPCUG presentations and made regular appearances at Fall Comdexes. These Comdex appear-



ances were often puncuated by Kahn doing aerobatic displays over Las Vegas, NV, during the giant computer shows. Kahn was also known for his jazz saxophone performance at Borland presentations.

Actually, Kahn's stunt flying over Comdex in his aerobatic airplane was more interesting to me than his jazz saxophone. I still wonder how he was able to get permission for such flying over the city ...

What the *WSJ* story also failed to include is that Philippe Kahn is credited with being the inventor of the Camera-Phone in 1997 and founding of LightSurf Technologies which is now owned by Verisign. He is currently CEO of Fullpower technologies and he and his wife, Sonia Lee, run an environmental charity, the Lee-Kahn Foundation.

Philippe Kahn was truly one of the most interesting players in the PC's history.

NTPCUG Volunteers have assembled, tested and shipped their **1,800th** PC since the project began. Currently, the volunteers are averaging 500 refurbished PC's for impaired users per year.

For new members, NTPCUG sponsors a volunteer program to refurbish "old" PC's using NTPCUG volunteers with the finished computers going to visually impaired individuals via the Texas Center for the Physically Impaired (TCPI), *http://www.handicapability.org*. All of the equipment goes to blind or visually-impaired persons in America and in several foreign countries.

If you have basic hardware skills, or just want to learn, contact me at *gb1@ntpcug.org* We only have 12 work stations, so please request a place. Don't just arrive expecting to find a station available.

We have regular sessions every Tuesday and Thursday, 1-4PM, at King of Glory Lutheran Church, 6411 LBJ Freeway (West bound serv-





ice road from the Hillcrest exit). Our workroom is in the basement level of the church. Ring the outside bell for entry into the building.

If you, your employer, or a friend, have older computers (Pentium III -500Mhz or better) and/or components (56k-modems, hard drives, sound/video cards, 72 & 168-pin memory, monitors, keyboards, mice) that are just gathering dust, please contact me about donating them to this tax-deductible effort. We have received several corporate donations in the last few months; PLEASE keep checking with your company about donations.

We are also in need of a couple of volunteers to assemble some donated shelving, if you can't or don't want to work on computer hardware.

And last, but not least, we need a volunteer to: determine the proper driver for various donated sound/video/modem cards; download and test the drivers; and save the drivers to floppy disks.

So you can see that we need volunteers with different skills, and have a continuing need for additional computer refurbishing help. Let me know if you can assist.

Dear Tech Support,

Last year I upgraded from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0 and noticed that the new program began unexpected child processing that took up a lot of space and valuable resources. No mention of this phenomenon was included in the product brochure.

In addition, Wife 1.0 installs itself into all other programs and launches during system initialization, where it monitors all other system activity.

Applications such as Poker night 10.3, Drunken Boys Night 2.5 and Saturday Football 5.0 no longer run, crashing the system whenever selected.

I can not seem to keep Wife 1.0 in the background while attempting to run some of my other favorite applications. I am thinking about going back to Girlfriend 7.0, but the un-install does not work on this program.

Can you help me, please!!!

Dear Joe:

This is a very common problem men complain about but is mostly due to a primary misconception.

Many people upgrade from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0 with the idea that Wife 1.0 is merely a UTILITIES & ENTERTAINMENT program. Wife 1.0 is an OPERATING SYSTEM and designed by its creator to run everything.

It is unlikely you would be able to purge Wife 1.0 and still convert back to Girlfriend 7.0. Hidden operating files within your system would cause Girlfriend 7.0 to emulate Wife 1.0 so nothing is gained.

It is impossible to un-install, delete, or purge the program files from the system once installed.

You can not go back to Girlfriend 7.0 because Wife 1.0 is not designed to do this.

Some have tried to install Girlfriend 8.0 or Wife 2.0 but end up with more problems than the original system. Look in your manual under "Warnings-Alimony/Child Support". I recommend you keep Wife 1.0 and just deal with the situation.

Having Wife 1.0 installed myself, I might also suggest you read the entire section regarding General Partnership Faults (GPFs). You must assume all responsibility for faults and problems that might occur, regardless of their cause. The best course of action will be to enter the command C:\APOLOGIZE.

In any case, avoid excessive use of the Esc key because ultimately you will have to give the APOLOGIZE command before the operating system will return to normal. The system will run smoothly as long as you take the blame for all the GPFs.

Wife 1.0 is a great program, but VERY high maintenance. Consider buying additional software to improve the performance of Wife 1.0. I recommend Flowers 2.1 and Chocolates 5.0.

FEBRUARY — The Mystery of Section Breaks


We'll take a few minutes to complete the previous session by preparing a let-

ter using features we've covered so far. Then, we will look into Section Breaks — one of the most important features to understand. They are a foundation feature Microsoft expects you to understand and use. If you change page formatting in your documents, or use features such as columns, headers and footers, page numbering, as well as others, you will encounter section breaks. Take this opportunity to solve the mystery.

MARCH — Headers, Footers & Page Numbering

Headers and Footers are another Word challenge if you want anything more than the same one throughout the entire document. Even if you have figured out that you need to use section breaks to make the changes you need, if you attempted to make changes to them, you may have had additional surprises! If you hate Headers and Footers, you must attend this meeting. Word incorporates Page Numbering into Headers and Footers, so you will get three-forone at this meeting!

APRIL — Footnotes & Endnotes Many of us have worked with documents that required footnotes. Do you know you can change their appearance and location? Do you have problems with footnotes that are too long to fit on one page? Has someone sent you a document with endnotes, and you need





to convert them to footnotes, or vice versa? Footnotes are one of the easiest features to use!

ADVANCED - 10-11 am

FEBRUARY — The Best of Word-According to You! (*cont.*)

Yes, we are continuing, once again, with *The Best of Word...*. Given the option to 'move on,' or continue this topic, our group decided to continue. Your favorite features I plan to present this month include: Tables, Tab Settings, Memo Template, Automatic Features, Auto-Numbering, Work Menu, Table of Contents, Index, Comments, Text Boxes, Watermark, and Review. Several of these features will be covered in the next topic, *Reviewing Documents*. If there is not enough time to present them, rest assured they will be covered in the next two meetings.

MARCH — Reviewing Documents, Part I

This meeting was originally named Compare Documents, then Track Changes, but the current name will stick. Although the name has changed, Compare Documents and Track Changes are included, as well as several other features used when reviewing your documents. At this meeting, we will look at the benefits of using the Highlighter in editing your documents. Compare Documents enables you to compare one document to the other, identifying the differences between them. Track Changes enable you send your document revisions to others. After reviewing your revisions, they can accept or reject your revisions, proceed to make their own, and send theirs back to you.

APRIL — Reviewing Documents, Part II

At this meeting, we'll look at ways to Protect your documents from being edited, Compare two documents to identify their differences, and creating multiple Versions of the same document. These features work side-by-side with Track Changes.

W O W! I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!

Preventing Parts of a Document from Being Edited by Others You can protect portions of a document from being edited. Unfortunately, that protection can easily be overcome — even with a password assigned to it. Depending on your purpose for protecting the document, as well as other circumstances surrounding it, this feature still may be worthwhile to use.

Use it to prevent accidental editing and deleting, and it will work just fine. Use it to prevent intentional misuse, and you're wasting your time.

Here's how to protect a document:

1. Add Continuous Section Breaks around the text to be protected (if section breaks are not used, the entire document will be protected)

2. Tools | Protect Document | Forms | Sections

3. At Protected Sections, mark the Section(s) to be protected | OK

4. Optional: Set a password | retype it | OK



Show/Hide (on the Standard toolbar) will indicate that the text has been protected. To remove protection from the document — you must remove it from all sections:

1. Tools | Unprotect Document

2. If prompted, enter the password (it is case-sensitive) | OK

Even if the entire document is password protected or saved as a PDF file, the document can still be printed (or copied from screen shots), scanned, and have OCR convert it to editable text. Software is also available to crack passwords Word 2002 and 2003 have additional, more-secure methods for password protecting your document: *Prevent Accidental Changes* and *Prevent Intentional or Malicious Changes*.

Operating Systems

Vista is coming—real soon now.

Arrival of the latest iteration of Windows will raise a lot of questions for us in terms of suitability for our present hardware and possibility that much will have to be replaced or upgraded. It's highly likely that a new PC will be

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needed if our current machine is more than a year or so old.

System capability vs. resource demands posed by Vista may be the determining factor here. Again, much depends on the user's typical use patterns.

Glynn Brooks, Internet and Windows XP Inside Out SIG leader, has participated in the Vista beta development program and has hinted that Vista users will be best served by copious amounts of memory. Glynn, who is also under Microsoft's typical non-disclosure agreement restrictions, couldn't be pinned down further than "more is better" on this issue. He did mention that he is using a video card with 256 MB of DRAM, though.

My best guesses would be that "comfortable" minimums would be 1 GB of system DRAM and 128 MB of video DRAM coupled with 120 GB – 200 GB of disk capacity. My minimums would be 2G GB – 4 GB of system DRAM, 128 MB of video DRAM (I'm not focused on games) and 250 GB -300 GB of disk space.

Vista shouldn't have any problem handling all the new hardware options available in the newer motherboards such as SLI, PCI – E, etc., since these are handled by the system BIOS and vendor-supplied drivers before Vista will "see" them. Hopefully

A major concern for me is Microsoft's determined thrust toward making the PC "easier" for the novice user to enjoy. All that has done for me is to make PC life much more difficult than I would like after Windows XP was released.

Reconfiguration away from MS's "easier" defaults has turned into a major pain.

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
