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A couple of years ago, Tom Perkins started an NTPCUG Microsoft Certification Study group to help people prepare for exams on Visual Studio .NET. At that time, the version of Visual Studio (VS) was 2003. The underlying technology was the .NET framework version 1.1 (the .NET framework was first introduced by Microsoft in 2002). Since then, a number of us have taken and passed some of the exams, and one of us, Leroy Levin, actually passed all four exams and became a MCSD – Microsoft Certified Solution Developer.



It used to be that people would embark on a career in life, studying first in some school, then work as an apprentice somewhere, and eventually become a master of their trade. Those at the top of their trade/ profession were the older and more experienced among the group. What a satisfying experience it was to amass a lifetime of learning and experience to reach the pinnacle and enjoy the fruits of one's long journey.

Fast forward to the modern age; in particular, the computer age. I started out with PCs when they first came out in the early 80s. (Okay, there was the Apple II and various CPM machines before that. But, I'll consider the IBM PC as the beginning of the PC age.) I look back at what I learned about PCs then and what you need to know today, and am overwhelmed with the fact that what I learned then has too little to do with what I need to know today. The experts in the field are often the youngest now, not the oldest!

So, what does this have to do with the certification study group, you ask. The original idea was to cover the four basic exams for VS2003 and become MCSD certified. Now, that exam is being phased out. Actually, it was superseded in 2005 with the introduction of Visual Studio 2005 (.NET framework 2.0) and a whole new set of exams. But wait, it is 2008

and we now have yet another whole shift in the certification exam process for Visual Studio 2008 and the .NET framework version 3.5.

What was one exam path in 2003 became three paths in 2005 (windows desktop programming, web site programming, and enterprise programming). And now, Microsoft has divided the .NET universe into six separate areas! Yep. You can now choose one of six areas to specialize in and become a MCTS – Microsoft Certified Technology Specialist. It requires passing a base exam, plus an exam in one of the six areas. (Google "MCTS" for more details.)

The lifecycle for what you need to know in this area is short and new areas just pop up all the time. But I have this naïve hope that Microsoft has settled on what they want to do, finally, so it is safe to jump in and learn this new stuff.

What Tom plans on doing at this point is to just skip the whole VS2005 path and move into the justreleased VS2008 material. Since there is one base exam you have to pass no matter which of the six specialization areas you want to go with, that is where we will begin. The book is already out and we are ready to begin.

The group will meet at Nerdbooks in Richardson on 2nd and 3rd Saturdays in the afternoon, usually from about 2pm to 5pm. In this SIG we explore all the elements of website creation beginning with why you want to create a website in the first place and ending with a fully realized web project. We wander through the process of deciding upon your MWR (most wanted response), the research needed to find out exactly how to attract visitors who are most likely to give you your MWR, and how to ensure you provide an experience for each of your visitors that is most likely to result in the highest conversion rate possible of visitors into those who provide your MWR. Each website's MWR may be a bit different: some MWRs are simply to get visitors to pick up the telephone and call an elected official, others may be simply to inform the general public, while others may be to buy a particular product. While every website may have a different MWR, there are basic principles that apply and we'll explore them all. All questions and levels of experience welcome.

In May, we'll continue pulling page design elements together as we further refine our design and implementation of a site-wide page template and menu that will be easy to maintain as the site grows.We'll also explore the use of various tools available for helping to create just the look and feel you want for your site.

In April I covered basic filtering of a list and some on Advanced Filtering showing multiple OR conditions. For May we will do a quick review of those basics and then expand to Advanced Filtering using Multiple AND conditions. If time permits I'll show how we can set criteria using formulas. It can get deep but we are flexible and can break it off at any point to cover details at a pace that is useful to the audience. Our goal is to provide meaningful information you can use as soon as we present it. Excel questions off the monthly topic are always welcome. If a burning Excel issue has gotten the best of your situation, bring it to us and we can side-track just for you.

Our Priorities

First, to learn the common tools within Excel to become broadly skillful in the use of the application. It seems like imagination always provides more opportunity to employ the basics, and so foundation building is always underway. Second, to become more efficient at using the product. We are at work learning to accomplish more work with fewer keystrokes, or to design our spread-sheets to get the job done faster.

Third, to employ significant tools provided by Excel to do more sophisticated analysis. These tools require little or no development by the user. Filtering, sorting, validation, all come to mind.

Fourth, to employ Visual Basic for Applications (VBA). This powerful subset of MSVisualBasic can be used to further the power built into Excel, as well as allow the spreadsheet to integrate with the rest of the MS Office suite for even further functionality.



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Ending of Programming SIG

I believe it's time to end the Programming SIG. [Most recently this was known as the Visual Basic for Applications (VBA) SIG which met from 9:00 to 10:00 on the third Saturday.]

I've learned a lot during the time I led the SIG. I realized this SIG is much like a lot of scientific endeavors. After Newton, there was a model of the universe. While studying the model, some anomalies were found. The model was used to predict the distant planets. Other anomalies were found that could not be explained with the model. Einstein modified the model to match the environment.

In the early days of programming, a certain business environment existed and programs were written to support this business model. As programming grew and large integrated systems were developed, a new business model developed, dictated by the application programs. The way companies ran their businesses had to change to match the new model. The old way of programming was allocated to the large program development companies — businesses no longer needed the old programmers; they needed people that knew the new business model and used it to support the business.

This Month in Our History

Yup, it's time to review the happenings reported in the May 1988 and 1993 issues of *PC News*, 15 and 20 years ago.

In 1988, the late **Reagan Andrews** was president. His *Prez Sez* column was titled "Icon Wars." It seems Apple had brought suit against Microsoft for using "those funny little figures on PC screens..." Apple wanted us all to believe that they had invented icons and that they were an integral part of the "look and feel" of the Lisa/Macintosh.

Reagan takes us back to the May, 1986 Computer Council of Dallas meeting at which Xerox Palo Alto Research Center showed film clips of mice and **icons** being used by PCs, long before the development of the Lisa/Macintosh.

In the category of "did you know", Reagan stated: "So who wrote most of the early Apple Macintosh software that put the Mac in the game? Microsoft. Microsoft Works and Excel (both originally written for the Mac before the PC versions came out last year) made the Mac a success in circles much wider than those narrow arcs inhabited by devout Mac hackers."

He went on to comment on the importance of software standards which Microsoft established. He commented on the importance of standards to programmers, making wide-scale distribution possible only where standards exist. He concluded by saying: "I remember paying roughly \$7,000 for our first PC, a little software and a printer in 1983 dollars... The standards established by the IBM-PC bus and MS/PC-DOS make an equivalent system available for \$1,000 now."

It is easy to shoot at Microsoft for their "monopoly" over PC systems but, were it not for the standards established and maintained by Microsoft, we would certainly not have the inexpensive hardware and software we have today.

According to **Alan Lintel**'s column, there was much legal activity in 1988 between Apple and Microsoft. Apple paid, Microsoft paid and the lawyers made LOTS of money. Apple got a patent covering drop-down menus and a mouse design. Seems they failed to mention the fact that another firm had developed the mouse and subsequently buggered up the patent process. All of this got quite complex and somehow today we all see drop-down menus and use mice to maneuver around the screen.

Member **Jim Hoisington** had another in his series of columns titled *On Complexity*. Speaking of complexity, he said, "Have you ever tried to install a bus mouse in your computer? The documentation for the jumper setting reads like a bizarre PROLOG program written in reverse logic." I recall all those mouse options and the problems found in installing them. Today we plug in the USB mouse or other device and *Voila*, it works!

Jim went on to note the voluminous documentation that came with software and peripherals in 1988 concluding that, "... the price of PC hardware and software will have to rise to provide the kind of support required by the increase in complexity of the products." Well, the manufacturers couldn't raise prices so what did they do – put the documentation as part of the help file. For phone assistance, speak to Mujibar.

Under the heading *A Floppy Tale*, **Dave McKeen** said, "I recently bought a Toshiba 3½ inch, 720k floppy drive for \$119 from a warehouse that sells software and other stuff." He went on to recount the "joys" of mounting this drive in his PC-AT. Seems the drive was threaded for metric and what he had received were English #4-40 screws. Getting a physical install was the relatively easy part of the process. Next came device drivers, changes to CONFIG.SYS, etc., etc. Boy, weren't those the "good old days"?

There were nearly four pages from the DOM Squad highlighting new shareware disks one of which, **Magic Menus™**, was a "DOS shell and extremely well written and easy to use menu system." "Power users will enjoy the 'Boot Options', which let you effectively maintain ten different sets of AUTOEXEC and CONFIG files." Yup, I sure wanna have **those** options.


In 1993, the president was a guy named **Doug Gorrie**. In his *Prez Sez* column, he wrote that 441 new members were added in March, thanks mainly to Microsoft subsidizing User Group memberships that month. He later stated some words applicable today as well: "All our... members are encouraged to get involved... Membership is more enjoyable if you participate..." Have YOU decided to get involved?

BBS Sysop **Fred Williams** wrote in *NTPCUG On-Line* about the chore of upgrading beyond our then-current 2400 baud modems. He said, "The more sophisticated modems require a level of knowledge at least an order of magnitude above that required to fully utilize the older 'plain vanilla' modems." Gee, Fred, why don't we just go to the 'Net and get... Oh yeah, the 'Net sorta didn't exist in 1993.

Speaking of all that, I have frequent reason to test 56K dial-up modems on the machines we currently ship to the blind under the TCPI project (Texas Center for the Physically Impaired), of which NTPCUG is a sponsor. BTW, yes, they also have internal network ports, but we include modems for those for whom that level of service might not be available. In case you have forgotten, dial-up, even at 56K *HURTS*! And I started out on a machine with a 300 baud modem.

Again, **Reagan Andrews** had his *The Variety Store* column. He stated that, "If you want to add a CD/ROM player, a sound board, on-line faxing capability, a scanner, etc., etc., etc., you plunge headfirst into Microsoft's device-driver swamp." Ah, yes, the good old days!

Reagan spoke of the subject of disk price reductions noting, "If you haven't noticed... we're back in

the middle of another round of bitter fighting and price reductions in the hard disk industry. The impact looks to be about 5% - 10% per week on 200M+ drives. At this rate, vendors may pay users to take drives below 100M off their hands." So what did I recently see but a 1 TB drive for (I can't believe it, I had to go check) \$199! We all paid a LOT more than that for much smaller drives in the past. And, whereas it was predicted that we would pay the price in getting much more failure-prone drives, that doesn't see to have been the case. Hardware quality today is generally outstanding.

The DOM Squad had 3½ pages of new disk listings including Disk 813, PKZIP 2.04g, a long-standing standard in dealing with compressed files. Shareware fee was noted as \$47. Where noted, the programs wanted to have at least Windows 3.1, no longer any reference to operating in DOS.

The 1993 issue contained a quarter-page ad worthy of repeating today. It read, "You are invited to submit your articles for next month's newsletter... Please help out."

Vista / XP Downgrade Plan

Microsoft recently announced that WinXP will not be sold after June 30th 2008. This move was originally slated to occur on January 31st, but caused such consternation by users that it was postponed.

But even now, users are expressing continued concern. Infoworld magazine has even initiated a petition so users can express their desire for Microsoft to continue XP sales, and reports over 192,000 "signatures" received as of May 5th.

Despite Microsoft's recent decision, there is still a way to acquire XP after June 30th, by purchasing certain versions of Vista and then exercising your rights to "downgrade" to WinXP Professional. Microsoft grants downgrade rights with any purchase of OEM Windows Vista **Business** or OEM Vista **Ultimate** Editions. (Purchasers of Vista Home Basic or Vista Home Premium Editions do not have these "downgrade rights".)

Dell, Lenovo and reportedly HP are among those offering to assist with the downgrade when new PCs are ordered. Lenovo's site notes that the downgrade program will last until January 31, 2009. Dell makes their downgrade offer available beginning June 18th, but does not specify an end date for the program.

So if you are looking to acquire a PC in the near term, you may not be **required** to migrate to Vista, and can in fact have licensed access to **both** Vista and to XP. But check with your vendor to determine whether they are participating in this program.


