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Yes, Fifteen Years for a SIG is, indeed, a Big Deal!

On Saturday, April 17, 1993 at the *InfoMart* on Stemmons Freeway, **Larry Linson** held the organizational meeting of the NTPCUG Microsoft Access Special Interest Group. Requirements for a SIG at that time were “a SIG Leader and eight people who will attend on a more-or-less regular basis”. The organizational meeting was attended by over 60 interested members and we walked away with three enthusiastic volunteer Assistant SIG Leaders, **Jack Atkinson**, **Dianna DiCicco**, and **Frank McCoy**.

We have been in continuous operation ever since, sometimes augmented by a Beginning Access SIG, sometimes merged into a single entity. On a few occasions, we have had over 100 attendees, and on a (fortunately few) others, “too few to mention”. In the last few years, attendance has averaged from ten to twenty on a regular basis.

Over the years, we have been fortunate to have some outstanding guest speakers and very interested attendees, our own hard-copy newsletter at times, a sign-up list for people who wanted their names released to recruiters at times, and, at almost every meeting, a drawing for valuable prizes.

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There is much that our group has to offer, and always has. This month, I would like to classify the “groups” of SIGs we have, in an attempt to simplify the amazing array of offerings into a few categories and to give some focus on these learning “tracks”.

As I see it, there are five types of SIGs we offer.

Windows

Some of our most popular offerings are about the Windows OS. This covers a wide range of topics that deal with the basics of using our PCs. Things like dealing with the various versions of Windows, how to do backups, installation and configuration problems and options, utilities, hardware options, buying a PC, servicing computers, etc. are all fair game in the two SIGs dealing with Windows.

From 8 am to 10 am, we have *Windows Tips & Tricks* led by Gil Brand and Chuck Stark. At 12:30 pm, Glynn Brooks leads the *Windows Inside Out* SIG. Both of these SIGs are in the large meeting room LL25.

Office Applications

Next in line is a group of SIGs dealing with word processing and spreadsheet applications. Diane Bentley has ably helped many members get more out of Word and WordPerfect for a number of years. Diane has carefully preserved a valuable collection of her presentations going back over these years for all to enjoy and learn from. Her masterful presentations (not to mention those great donuts) have been a major attraction in our group.

The *Excel* SIG is led by Frank Tubbs. Frank has a 4-point agenda to get more out of Excel: Becoming proficient with the common tools of Excel, becoming faster by learning the shortcuts and special keys, delving into sophisticated tools like filtering and sorting, and employing VBA for power and interactivity with Word. Speaking of VBA, we have a newish SIG dealing just with this feature of the Microsoft Office products, led by Dave MacKenzie.

Developers

Not everyone who uses computers learns to program them. But we have always had a core group of programmers in our midst who are always on the lookout for learning more about the Microsoft programming languages. Currently, we have Tuc Goodwin leading the *.NET* SIG and overseeing the 2nd Saturday offerings at the Microsoft campus in Irving. Tuc is a long-time member and SIG leader in the area of programming. In addition to the *.NET* programming SIG, Tuc has just recruited a co-worker to lead an interesting series of presentations having

to do with *Design Patterns* in Object Oriented Programming (OOP). 14 common OOP design patterns will be presented using C# and Java.

Tom Perkins is another energetic leader of developers, ably shepherding a group of us along the path to certification with Microsoft .NET programming. These twice-a-month meetings are on 2nd and 3rd Saturdays at my favorite bookstore in Richardson – Nerdbooks.

Web Site Creation

This past year saw the startup of three new SIGs dealing with creating web sites. On 3rd Saturdays, Alan Lummus starts out with *Building Web Sites*. Alan is currently going through a methodical process of building a web site. In his next hour, Alan shares tips and techniques about *Making Money on the Internet*. He currently sells a line of products from his web site and has successfully negotiated the world of online entrepreneurship.

Following Alan's two SIGs, I lead the *Expression Web* SIG. This software product, which replaced MS Front Page, was introduced just over a year ago and is Microsoft's new program for web site creation.

Digital Photography

Lastly is the series of SIGs having to do with digital photography. Spike Smith leads the *Digital Photography* SIG at 10 am and the *Digital Photo Editing* SIG at 11 am. There are lots of things to know about digital photography, from buying a camera to learning all the new terminology involved with this fascinating world.

In his second hour, Spike focuses on editing pictures using a variety of programs, many of which are free or very inexpensive. Then, at 12:30 pm we have the *Adobe Photoshop* SIG. This SIG deals with just this one product, the most commonly used photo editor among photographers today. While it is not an inexpensive product, for those who want to delve more deeply into the fine art of photo editing, Photoshop may be what you are looking for.

Well, that's my list of “groups” of SIGs. Of course, there are some other SIGs that are great too. Not to leave anybody out, there is *MS Access*, *Mobile Computing*, *Wireless Communications*, *Family History*, *Internet*, *Sharepoint*, and the *IT Professional* SIGs. Each has it's own unique offering of interesting topic to learn about. The big dilemma is: can you decide what you are going to miss by having to choose which SIGs you *will* attend?

In April, we will go from formula basics to the most common data analysis tool – the filtering feature. You can select data by key elements and pull unique lists to help you apply formulas for additional analysis elements.

Our Priorities

First, to learn the common tools within Excel to become broadly skillful in the use of the application. It seems like imagination always provides more opportunity to employ the basics, and so foundation building is always underway.

Second, to become more efficient at using the product. We are at work learning to accomplish more work with fewer keystrokes, or to design our spreadsheets to get the job done faster.

Third, to employ significant tools provided by Excel to do more sophisticated analysis. These tools require little or no development by the user. Filtering, sorting, validation, all come to mind.

Fourth, to employ Visual Basic for Applications (VBA). This powerful subset of MSVisualBasic can be used to further the power built into Excel, as well as allow the spreadsheet to integrate with the rest of the MS Office suite for even further functionality.

This Month in Our History

Once again it's time to review the happenings reported in the April 1988 and 1993 issues of *PC News*, 15 and 20 years ago (oh yeah, and some breaking news.)

I previously mentioned a need to copy and scan the archives – paper copies of *PCNews* have been found from April, 1987 through February, 2000 when it all went online in March. The online issues are already available on our website but there is much valuable history yet to be made available.

Fortunately, a member has come forward to copy and scan the paper archives. Now, I don't want to mention her name since I haven't asked if it's OK to do so but it's Word and WordPerfect SIG leader (and provider of monthly donuts), Diane Bentley. So far she has completed April, 1987 (the earliest available — but more about that later) through December, 1990. During April she will work on the 1991 and 1992 volumes.

Also, not to mention a name, but newly-elected Board member, Elva Roy has come forward to volunteer for this project and will be working on the 1993 volume during April.

[Ascend soapbox] All of this raises a very important matter: NTPCUG is an ALL VOLUNTEER organization. You, as a member can come and “Share what you know, learn what you don't” only because others give a little to a lot of their time for the benefit of the members. There are still (always) needs for additional volunteers. Some of those needs require 1-2 hours a month – some much more, but YOU

control what you want to agree to and the amount of time it takes out of your schedule.

It has been my personal observation that those with the busiest schedules are the first to come forward and volunteer.

So, think about the Group's needs and consider how YOU might contribute to our continued existence. [Dismount soapbox]

In April '88 the big news was that Microsoft's **Bill Gates** had appeared in March before over 1,100 people at the Informart, sponsored by NTPCUG. Many NTPCUG members worked various aspects of the event, assuring that everything went smoothly.

Reportedly, Gates spoke for nearly two hours to NTPCUG members and invited guests. In Gates' view, the future of computing “revolves around graphical interfaces, multitasking operating systems such as OS/2, Microsoft's joint effort with IBM, and dramatically improved data storage and acquisition.” Of course, all of this has proven to be quite true. Few of us in 1988 could imagine the degree to which improvements in hardware would make available the kind of computing power we now take for granted.

Member **Jim Hoisington** had another in his series of articles titled “*On Complexity*” in which he described the difference between expanded memory and extended memory. If I understand the article properly, this distinction was necessary due to the limitations of then-current 16-bit processors and went away with the development of the 80386 32-bit pro-



cessor. Jim closed his article with the comment, "Are you thoroughly confused? I know I am!" So am I.

The DOM (Disk of the Month) Squad consumed a significant portion of the April issue, spanning 7½ pages including 4½ pages detailing the total library of available disks. As last month, there were two additional tax filing programs. The shareware fee was not stated in the reviews of these two programs.

In April '93, there were three vendor presentations at our monthly meeting at the Infomart. At 9:00, David Wainwright, regional manager for Central Point Software demonstrated *PC Tools for Windows*. At 10:00, David Hayden, director of public relations for Lucid Corporation demonstrated a number of Lucid's software offerings. Finally, at 1:00, Dewayne Gimpel, systems engineer for Borland demonstrated *Paradox 1.0 for Windows*. In each case there were drawings for free products for members.

The Variety Store by member **Reagan Andrews** covered 3½ pages of fascinating information. First highlighted was the rapid fall in PC prices reflective of a major price war. As could be expected, a number of "marginal" makers went out of business at this time. He went on to observe, "Largely unnoticed in all this is that component prices have been dropping faster than complete PC prices. Hard disk drives are a good example... 200M IDE drives that cost \$450 three months ago and \$600 this time last year are now available for \$325 (maybe lower by the time you read this.)"

According to Reagan, 1993 was also the year that PCs made it into the general retail stores. "Now I can order a new (name brand) multimedia PC, a canvas boat cover and carpet cleaning machine all at the same time and from the same source... That's style and convenience." Today we take this kind of convenience for granted but it was a new phenomenon in 1993.

Several members submitted significant articles on software they had found. We all have different patterns of searching for information. Maybe *you* have found something interesting that you could write up and share with the group. Why not? If you need help with "wordsmithing", we can do that. If your item is too large to fit in the current month's newsletter, we'll either split it into monthly pieces or defer it to next month.

In 1993 as now, changes to the bylaws were under review. Our current bylaws committee is going through changes and will make a recommendation to the Board with subsequent advice to the members. The report of the bylaws and changes spanned three pages in 1993. Look forward to future reports of the recommendations in 2008.

BREAKING NEWS: NTPCUG President, **Chris Morgan**, was recently doing some cleaning and found and presented a copy of *PCNews* from August 1984 leapfrogging our current archives by three years! Now, in 1984 we were the North Texas IBM Personal Computer User's Group. The Newsletter was printed duplex (at a printer since there was no way to output in duplex otherwise), stapled in the upper left corner and mailed. I have learned that the Group got in trouble with the Post Office for not putting little "thingies" to keep it from flopping open as it went through their system.

The peripatetic Users Group was then meeting at Jesuit Prep School on Inwood Road in Dallas.

Well, looky this: seems the acting President in 1984 was a guy named **Chris Morgan**.

Dues **24 years ago** were \$24 a year. Kinda makes the current \$36 dues a bargain.

SIG sessions then started at 9:00 and ran until 3:00. According to the newsletter there were 28 SIG meetings plus the general membership meeting. What later was to become the AppleCorps met with us and had several of the SIGs devoted to Apple systems or at least focused on both IBM and Apple applications.

The DOM (Disk of the Month) Squad column featured eight items and, gee, they were all "double sided"! The column doesn't specifically say, so I must assume there wasn't an option so, folks, these were 5¼ disks!

For many years there was an active newsletter exchange between user groups across the country. The August, '84 issue recounts on 3¼ pages, an article from the Boston Computer Society (BCS). The BCS was once the largest user group in the country – today it is gone.

In 1984 and for many years thereafter we had a column called *Swap Shop* in which members could post four lines of text each month for free. Non-members paid 15 cents a word. There were seven items offered at prices you would *never* pay today. Such was the non-commodity life of computers in 1984.

The back page (outside back cover) noted that ads could be purchased for between \$10 for a 1/16 page ad and \$60 for a full page ad. The newsletter had several paid ads spread throughout.

Anti-virus software

If you go on the 'net (and who doesn't), you really need to have anti-virus (AV) software. Even if you merely load files from floppies or thumb drives from others, you need AV software. The world is full of folks who feel it necessary to bugged up your data or even take over your machine to further their nefarious purposes. To try to counter this threat, new machines even come with pre-loaded trial versions of Norton or McAfee anti-virus products.

So what should you do with this trial ware? DELETE IT as soon as possible! Get something that doesn't demand so much of your system resources, thereby slowing down your machine.

"But I don't know what to get", you say. "I don't know what options I have." Actually, there are several choices including Kaspersky, which is well rated, and Panda which I have used for several years. The downside: both of these and most of the others cost money. "Well, gee", you say "A bunch of protection is worth *some* money, isn't it?"

How about getting all that protection for — are ya ready? (drum roll, please) — FREE.

Yes, there is a FREE anti-virus program – It's **Free AVG** available for download from free.grisoft.com.

Many of the Information Technology professionals in the NTPCUG recommend and even use AVG personally (although they may use the paid professional version for obvious reasons).

Unlike some other products, AVG does not slow down your machine operations while still providing valuable protection against virus threats.

The downside, from my personal perspective: AVG will update itself when it bloody well feels like it. I have seen video presentations interrupted by a request to let AVG update. You either tell it to do its thing or cancel it for later. (So do your formal presentations without an active 'net connection). I also understand the Free AVG is not updated immediately when a new threat is found to have been launched on the 'net (the paid Professional version *is*, as I understand it).

All told, not a bad product – in fact one pretty highly rated and it's <<FREE>>.

Open Office – One Person's View

I own a copy of *Microsoft Office* but I see that the MS license agreement does not permit loading this software on more than one desktop and one laptop machine. Gee, so I need to spend \$300 - \$500 to be able to load *Office* on my other laptop?

Well, I recently learned about **OpenOffice.org** (www.openoffice.org) with the functionality of *MS Office*. **OpenOffice.org** is open source software. To make the deal even better, the price is FREE. Of course, you can make a contribution if you so desire. Let's say you decide to send them \$50 in May out of your Federal Tax Stimulus payment – you're \$300 ahead and have contributed to a worthwhile project.

Not only is there nothing in the user agreement prohibiting loading on multiple machines, you are even encouraged to spread the program to others. So I am trying to do so.

To get **OpenOffice.org**, go to their website and download one of three flavors: Windows, Mac or Linux. (For Linux users, there is no comparable *MS Office* application as you probably know.)

The Windows download is 120 MB and goes pretty quickly over broadband. If you're still using dial-up access, either start the download and go to bed or let me know and I'll give you a CD-ROM (\$2 for the disks – I had to pay to get them).

OpenOffice.org consists of six parts: **BASE**, a database program compatible with *MS Access*; **CALC**, a spreadsheet program compatible with *MS Excel*; **Draw**, a drawing program compatible with *MS Paint*; **Impress**, a presentation program compatible with *MS PowerPoint*; **Math**, for creating and editing mathematical formulae and equations similar to *MS Equation Editor*; and **Writer**, compatible with *MS Word*.

Everything I have tested works just like its *MS* counterpart with a similar look and feel of all the *MS* applications. There are even familiar icons and toolbars. In fact, this article was created with **Writer** and saved as a .doc file, then brought up in *MS Word* and viewed with no change in anything. I could also have saved as an RTF or any of nearly 20 other formats. There is even a handy button to export directly to PDF.

Writer has a spell checker but not a grammar checker (arguably an improvement over *Word* in my not so humble opinion.) I was told there are problems with *Word* and *Excel* files containing macros

and am advised that this is correct since the *MS* products and **OpenOffice.org** use different macro languages so this is something of which the user would need to be aware.

OpenOffice.org apps cannot yet handle the various *MS 2007* file formats but an upgrade to version 3.0 is expected for September and is expected to be able to do so.

I have tried opening and using files from *Excel* in **Calc** and files from *PowerPoint* in **Impress**, all functioning just as they would in the *MS* application. Again you will see familiar icons and toolbars.

All told, and at the risk of offending Bill Gates, I see no reason to spend GOOD money on *MS Office* when you can get **OpenOffice.org** for free or with the option of making a voluntary contribution.

For those of you, like me, who depend on our various SIGs to learn things about Microsoft products, keep coming – you can apply everything you learn there to your **Open Office.org** existence.

So, why do I call it "**OpenOffice.org**" rather than just "**Open Office**"? Every EULA (End User License Agreement) has its requirements and that's one here.

In a nutshell, the contest is to see who can sign up the most new NTPCUG members. Included in the “new” category are previous members whose membership has been expired for six months or more.

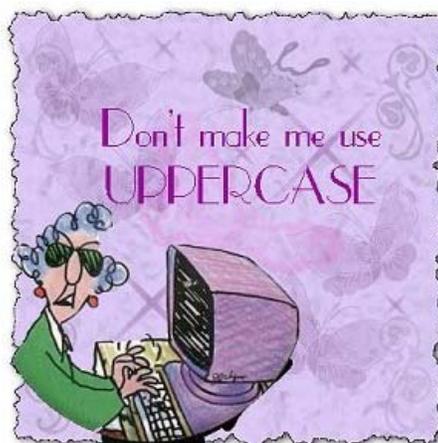

Special Guest Speaker for April: MVP Cory Smith

This month we are fortunate to have a really keen topic for the 9:00 AM hour. Cory Smith, an MVP, will be presenting a topic called "**Developing for Windows Vista using Visual Studio**". When I asked Cory about what he was going to say, he told me:

There's more to Windows Vista than Glass and Sidebar. Learn what Vista has to offer you as the developer, what you can take advantage of to enhance your customers user experience and how you leverage many of these new features using the tools you have today.

Note that this presentation purposefully avoids delving deep into WPF, WCF and WF, partially for time constraints and partially because those subjects are being discussed in more detail by many other presenters. This presentation is more about the features in Windows Vista, how you can leverage them and how you can interact with them using interoperability; as many of the new features in Vista are not .NET native (such as Aero/DWM, Windows Experience Index information, etc.). Some examples show how to "skin" the .NET 2.0 TreeView control to look and feel like the Vista Explorer / Windows Mail applications and modify the behavior of a WinForms menu to show and hide similar to Windows Vista counterparts.

Demonstrations include leveraging Aero and the Desktop Window Manager ("Glass") utilizing P/Invoke, using COM Interop to access Windows Experience Index information, changing the look and behavior of the TreeView control, and the ability to modify the behavior of the menu bar.
