We hope everyone had a great Holiday Season. Now, sadly, it's back to work. For old and new members, a brief summary. Each year, at the 3rd Saturday meeting in January, we hold our elections for that year's Board of Directors and president-elect. (The 2008 presidentelect becomes the 2009 President based on being voted in the previous year.) We make every effort to complete and announce the elections at the Business Meeting held at Noon that same day.

Prior to the elections, ballots are sent out by e-mail to all members of record, accompanied by instructions on the methods available to cast your vote. We make every effort to be flexible, allowing for return of ballots by e-mail, fax, postal mail, or just bring it with you to the January 17th meeting. See the ballot instructions for details.

The ballot and instructions should have been received by each member by the time you receive this newsletter. If you have not received your ballot by Saturday, January 10th, please go to our web site (www. ntpcug.org) and download the ballot and instructions directly. If you have problems/issues, please e-mail postmaster@ntpcug.org and we will make every effort to resolve your issue.

As you prepare your ballot, please note that we do require you to include your member number on the ballot. While we try to keep the voting informal, we do need to ensure in some way that votes are cast only by valid User Group members. While the member number isn't a completely "tight" control against bogus votes, each member number is validated against membership records as it arrives. And if we have questions, we do know how to contact you if we have a need to verify your vote. So please work with us on this issue.

This year, the ballot also requests that you vote FOR or AGAINST proposed changes to our Bylaws. Our web site has a copy of the proposed bylaws as well as explanations of the changes and rationale for making them. Many of the suggested changes are as a result of difficulties encountered during the 2008 elections, and our hope is to prevent such problems in the future.

Many of the changes are intended to ensure that all members interested in running for a Board position are placed on the ballot, and that the membership has an opportunity to vote for anyone interested in running. In essence, the intent is to ensure that the "power" rests in the hands of the members rather than just the current Board. We'll let you be the judge of whether that effort was successful. - Create a master page.
- Create some sample pages for testing.

• Allow access to certain pages only for certain users, while allowing the Administrator to access all pages.

Allow role-based navigation.

Although not billed as the NTPCUG version of Meryl Streep's Momma Mia sing-along, each of the above objectives will be presented in a manner that they can be performed on an individual's computer, preferably with groups of people working on the same computer (a' la the shared code experience of Agile Programming). A handout will be provided.

Some of the other workshop topics being considered are Master Pages, AJAX, and Test-Driven Development. We might even convince Chris Morgan to frame his CSS presentation into a workshop format in the future. And, we welcome any ideas about topics you'd like to see presented as a workshop.

Come on out and join us for what is from time to time an edifying experience, but is always a great discussion and a lot of fun.

An Interesting but Expensive Venture

In December, I reported the supposed death of one laptop and the need for a replacement.

Expanding on this story, my two-year-old Dell Inspiron unexpectedly went through a series of failures without explanation. First, it booted <u>through</u> the Dell startup screen to the Windows startup screen, then died. <Hard power off> Next, it booted <u>to</u> the Dell startup screen and died. <Hard power off> Next, at power up time, it did <u>nothing</u>.

I suspected the hard drive had died and was prepared to buy a new one and replace it.

It was suggested that I take the machine to the Dell authorized service station in Plano, which I did. They did several diagnostic tests and told me the motherboard was dead, and replacement would cost \$450 <u>plus</u> labor. They also did a separate check on the hard drive and everything was there, so I decided a new machine was cheaper than \$450+ and left.

On the upside, there was no charge for the diagnostics.

Subsequently, I received an online offer from Dell for a new Vostro laptop, and decided to buy it. That's the one with Vista Home Basic I wrote about in December.

The Vostro arrived with 512K of memory. Since I had 2G in the original Inspiron, I decided to salvage *something* from the Inspiron for the Vostro. I then put the 512K from the new Vostro into the Inspiron so that I could offload the whole works, since it didn't work anyway.

I fired up the Vostro with the replaced memory, but nothing happened. On a whim, I fired up the Inspiron with the new memory from the Vostro and everything worked fine.

I decided to check the memory modules individually and found that one of the 1GB sticks had gone bad, causing a complete system failure.

So now I have an Inspiron with Windows XP that works fine and a Vostro with Vista Home Basic that works fine -- all for a misdiagnosed memory module which can be bought for \$20.

I'm not sure what the moral of this story is, but I have been told that service folks are often inclined to blame system faults on the motherboard. This whole experience reminds me of something else I have been told – to look for <u>simple</u> cures first.

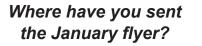

So Now, What Do I Do With The Old?

Did you get a new computer, LCD monitor, computer speakers, printer, PDA, cell phone, or other electronic device for Christmas? Do you want to avoid filling up a landfill with the old stuff?

Maybe you have children or even grandchildren to whom your old stuff could be migrated, but there's still the question of what to do with those castoffs.

For computers (desktop and laptop), monitors, keyboards, mice, and speakers, you can donate them to our Texas Center for the Physically Impaired (TCPI) project and even get a tax write off. Whenever possible, these computers are updated and loaded with legal copies of Windows XP and other software, then shipped to the blind throughout the country. What can't be used for this purpose is sent to a licensed recycler.

Now maybe you're worried about the data on your old machine's hard drive. Don't be. The TCPI agreement with Microsoft requires that hard drives be completely wiped before anything else is done. So nobody will ever see what you had stored on the drive.

Printers, scanners, fax machines and other electronics can also be given to TCPI and these will be sent to a licensed recycler who breaks down everything to its basic components and recycles them into new materials. Again, you'll get a tax receipt for your donation.

Old cell phones can be brought to our third Saturday meeting and delivered to me at the registration desk. I will arrange for them to be sent to a program that

provides refurbished cell phones to our service members overseas.

Then there's the question of old software. Hopefully you have seen the CD recycling box at our third Saturday meetings at the registration desk. All unwanted CDs and DVDs that are collected there are sent to a licensed recycler who separates the various materials and sends them off to be made into new products.

Why not make 2009 the year when you can make a difference in how old electronics are used, not simply cast into the local landfill.

"Don't recycle – reuse.

This Month in Our History

Hey kids, welcome and look at Uncle Chuck's new time machine that Santa brought! With this little sucker, we can go back 25 years and review the happenings reported in January 1984, and we'll come back through 1989, reviewing the issues of *PC News* at each stop.

The January 1984 issue was eleven pages long, one page of which was the membership renewal form. Back in those days, all memberships were based on the calendar year, and January was the time to tear off the back page of your newsletter and submit it with your payment of \$36 for a "professional" membership; \$24 for a regular membership or \$12 for a student membership.

The January issue had a two-page article by **Carrington Dixon** on *Word Proof*, an IBM spelling checker and thesaurus program. Menu driven, it was reported to be very easy to use and came with its own full screen editor, as well as enough facilities to qualify as a rudimentary word processor. It required at least 96K of memory and one disk drive and sold for \$60.

There were two half-page paid ads plus about a half page of Swap Shop offerings. Apparently those offerings weren't exactly being snapped up, as the items referenced back in November and December were still offered for sale.

The DOM Squad (**D**isk **O**f the **M**onth) highlighted a disk of over twelve programs designed to work with Pascal. It was noted that "All will compile on a 128K machine with two regular (160K) disk drives." WOW!

Tom Prickett in the *Programming Topics* column wrote an extended article titled *Lotus 1-2-3 to the Limit*. In two and one-half pages, Tom wrote about the limitations in that version of Lotus and noted that it had 2048 rows and 256 columns theoretically available, but that filling more than ten percent of the cells resulted in a memory overflow using 544K of memory.

The January 1989 issue was a full 24 pages. It noted that the auditorium program would feature Philippe Kahn, founder of Borland, speaking on the topic "PC Computing in the 90s and Beyond". The teaser said that Kahn "...will present his views of the future of software for personal computers in the 90s and the 21st century as the power of PCs and supercomputers come closer. Judging by his presentation at COMDEX, this should be a fascinating talk. A MUST-SEE EVENT!"

In Prez Sez, newly-installed president Jim Hoisington thanked outgoing president Reagan Andrews for his service and noted that Reagan would begin a new Microsoft Word SIG. (No donuts mentioned).

January was still the month for renewal of all memberships, and Jim noted that membership cards would be printed with the membership number in bar code to permit using a laptop to scan cards at the main meeting.

Reagan Andrews had his annual column reporting on the previous fall's COMDEX. He said, "Show officials estimated that 110,000 people had wandered through the eight show sights by 5:00 p.m., Friday... That's roughly 20,000 more than COMDEX/Fall 87's estimated 90,000 attendees...

"1988 was the 'Year of the LAN – and UNIX – and OS/2 – and DOS – and Optical Scanners – and FAX boards – and, and, and, no central theme that caught anybody's attention.

"Deal of COMDEX/Fall 88 was the Po Hai 12 MHz, 0 wait-state, 80286 combination... they were selling 80286 mother-boards, cases and power supplies, already crated for shipment for approximately \$300. No DRAM included in this price..."

COMDEX/Fall 88 seems to have been the first showing of 1GB+ drives, both in 51⁄4" and 3.5" configurations. Imprimis (CDC under another name), Micropolis and Maxtor were noted as offering these "huge capacity" drives.

Tom Krieg had his final installment of *The Family Tree of Personal Computers*. As you will recall, in December he left off with a discussion of the effects of television on the development of the PC. This month he focused on "Solid State Electronics History".

The first several paragraphs detailed the invention by Walter Brattain, William Shockley and John Bardeen of Bell labs, and development of the transistor, (for "*Trans*ition res*istor*"). The next development was the integrated chip invented by Jack Kilby of Texas Instruments. This was followed shortly by the "planer process" integrated circuit which didn't need wires, thus permitting the printing of a circuit design onto a silicon surface.

Next came the invention of the hand-held calculator by Texas Instruments. In 1968 Frank Noyce and Gordon Moore left Fairchild Semi-Conductor to found Intel. Developments continued fairly rapidly thereafter until, in 1975, the first personal computers hit the market. One was a do-it-yourself unit called the Altair advertised in *Popular Electronics*. Soon after came offerings of microcomputers from Apple, RadioShack and IBM.

In 1986, Texas Instruments invented the gallium arsenide IC on a silicon substrate.

In 1987, Intel introduced the 80286 microprocessor, which could process data much faster than the previous 8086 processor. Even then, Intel was coordinating with programmers on the capability of the soon-to-be-released 80386 processor.

And the rest, as they say, is history.

PC Bit-z & Byte-z

Do you always want to be found when someone is trying to phone you?

Personally, I <u>do</u> want to be found every time, but until recently, I had to give different phone numbers to different people, depending on "why" they might be trying to reach me. I gave my day job manager, customers, and staff the phone number printed on my "day job" business card—that is my daytime office number and my BlackBerry number. Then, for personal calls, and my little weekend side business, I gave out my home number and/or my personal cell phone number.

But now, I use a free Google service (still in Beta, claims Google, but it works great for me). It's called Grand Central (www.grandcentral.com), and I use one common number which rings every device I tell it to ring. The number is in my normal area code, and was assigned to me by Google without any charge or commitment. So now I give out <u>one</u> number to everybody, and it <u>simultaneously</u> rings my office, BlackBerry, personal cell, and home numbers.

As soon as I answer any ringing device, all the others stop ringing. The automated attendant tells me "An unidentified caller. Press 1 to accept, Press 4 to record the call", etc. I nearly always press "1" to accept, but if I did want to record the call, I could

simply press "4" and the automated attendant would announce to both parties "Call Recording On," and the call would be digitally recorded and saved in my Grand Central account. I could then replay both sides of the conversation over and over if I wished.

If I don't answer any of the ringing devices (maybe I'm at the movies and turned them all off), the caller hears my outgoing Grand Central recorded message and is able to leave a message in my Grand Central voice mail box. Grand Central recognizes the caller's number, logs the number and name of caller (if known), time of the call, and then sends me an e-mail to advise that I have a new voice message.

One negative is that Caller I.D. shows every call as coming from the Grand Central number, which means that I have no idea who the caller is before answering; that is, every call shows that it's coming from the same number (my Grand Central number). However, if I login to my Grand Central account online, I can see a call log which tells me the number each call was made from (after the fact) and listen to any voice mail messages.

Grand Central is unbelievably rich in features. I can't think of a thing they've missed except for the inconvenience of not being able to identify the caller before answering a call. It includes call recording, call screening, message recording and playback through the web (accessible from anywhere you have internet connectivity, including your mobile phone). You can Click2Call from your PC address book, and a WebCall Button lets prospective customers browsing the web call you without you're ever having to reveal your phone number. It sends e-mail notifications to your mail client's mailbox when someone leaves you a voice message, and has personalized outgoing greetings in your own voice. You can even listen in to hear *why* someone is calling before taking the call, block callers, and more.

I can even switch phones in the middle of a call. For instance, if you are at home but need to get in the car and drive somewhere, just switch to your cell phone number. You can do that without ever hanging up.

Check it out. Thank you, Google, for making my life a little bit simpler! And did I say it's *FREE*.
