Have a kid that hates school but wants to learn? Listen to the first coupla minutes of

Then go to: <http://www.khanacademy.org/>. Page down until you see four columns. Prepare to be amazed. Before you is a list of 1600 brief lectures on Arithmetic, Pre-Algebra, Algebra, Geometry, Biology, Chemistry, Current Economics, Banking and Money, Finance, Trigonometry, Precalculus, Statistics, Probability, Calculus, Differential Equations, History, Linear Algebra, Physics and a couple dozen lectures on the meltdown, bailouts etc. (These last reflect Salman Khan's background in the financial services industry.)

They range in technical maturity from second grade Basic Addition to "Convolution and the Laplace Transform" (covered in my junior year in Engineering school fifty years ago).

People who aren't interested in "school work" might find his lecture on Ponzi Schemes interesting or his lectures on the meltdown and bailout.

His history lectures cover Europe from the French Revolution to the banishment of Napoleon to Elba.

All of these lectures are produced by one man with a webcam and some graphics software. What an enormous resource for children who want to work on their own or adults who want to "brush up" on things they have forgotten or maybe never learned!

MIT has a lot of free courses. Look at <http://ocw.mit.edu/index.htm> then click on Engineering| Electrical Engineering and Computer Science. Then click on 6.00 Introduction to Computer Science and Programming . This will lead you to a set of video lectures (actually given at MIT in the Fall of 2008), the exams for the course and solutions and the assignments for the course. This is typical of a hundred or so of courses taught at what is arguably the foremost technical school in the US.

If you go to <http://webcast.berkeley.edu/courses.php> you will find a list of video lectures (no exams, no solutions, no assignments). Fewer than MIT but a wider ranging set of subjects.

Stanford.edu leads to an iTunes site. I don't have iTunes on my laptop so I couldn't dig any deeper.

I spent some time looking over courses at Open University (open.ac.uk). I thought they were more suitable for HS age children reading for interest than university students studying for examinations.

Carnegie Mellon explicitly addresses individual

learners at <http://oli.web.cmu.edu/openlearning/>. I drilled down to their engineering statics materials. I thought they were equivalent to my undergraduate introduction to the subject (fifty years ago).

Leaving the arena of free coursework, we have on-line degree programs. One that I know of (my son graduated with a computer science degree) is the Univ. of Phoenix. We attended his graduation. The school put hundreds of faculty members on stage. At that time, they were teaching in 35 languages and over 100 countries.

The internet has opened college to everyone it reaches.

Monthly Tips for MS Word and MS Excel

As a non-profit group, we get a number of requests from firms that want to “partner” with us. In my opinion, the majority of offers are just attempts to increase their market share, with minimal direct value to NTPCUG and its members.

So it’s nice when we receive an offer of something worthwhile, with no unrealistic conditions. Such is the case with Sharon Parq Associates, who provide a multitude of MS Word and Excel tips online at <http://word.tips.net> and <http://excel.tips.net>. They have offered to send us a couple tips each month – some very basic, and some more advanced. As they arrive each month, we’ll post them in our newsletter, and hopefully they will prove useful. For other tips, just go to the websites above.

Counting Cells with Specific Characters (Excel)

Let’s say that you have a Microsoft Excel worksheet that contains all the people who have ever worked in your department. Each name is prefaced by a single character that indicates the status of the person. For instance, if Fred Davis were retired, his name might show up as “RFred Davis”. With quite a lot of these names in the worksheet, you may need a way to count those people with a specific status character.

The easiest way to accomplish this is to use the COUNTIF function. If, for instance, the status character is the letter R (for “retired”), and your range of names is in cells A5:A52, then you could use the following to determine which cells begin with the letter R:

```
=COUNTIF(A5:A52,"R*")
```

The formula works because the comparison value is R*, which means “the letter R followed by any other characters.” Excel dutifully returns the count. To search for a different status character, simply replace R with the desired status character.

Obviously, if the asterisk has a special meaning in this usage, you can’t search directly for an asterisk. Actually, there are three characters you cannot search for directly: the asterisk (*), the question mark (?) and the tilde (~). If you want to search for any of these characters, you must precede the character with the tilde. Thus, if you wanted to determine a count of names that had a question mark as a status code, you could use the following:

```
=COUNTIF(A5:A52,"~?*")
```

An alternative to using COUNTIF is to create an array formula that is applied to every cell in the range. The following will do the trick very nicely:

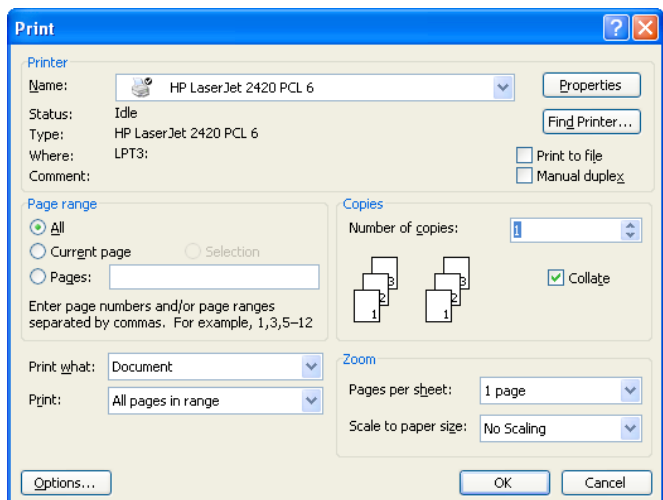
```
=SUM((LEFT(A5:A52,1)="R")*1)
```

This must, of course, be entered as an array formula. This means that instead of pressing ENTER at the end of the formula, you would press SHIFT+CTRL+ENTER. The formula checks the left-most character of a cell, returning the value TRUE if it is R or FALSE if it is not. The multiplication is done to convert the TRUE/FALSE value to a number, either 1 for TRUE or 0 for FALSE. The SUM function returns the sum, or count, of all the cells that meet the criteria.

Printing More Than One Copy (Word)

Microsoft Word gives you complete control over how it prints your document. If desired, you can print more than one copy of your document. To print to a file, follow these steps:

1. Choose Print from the File menu. You will see the Print dialog box. (To display the Print dialog box in Word 2007, click the Office button and then click Print.) A really quick way to display the Print dialog box is to simply press Ctrl+P.

2. In the Copies box, indicate the number of copies you want to print.
3. In the Range box, specify what you want to print.
4. Check the status of the Collate option. (Select or clear the option based on whether you want the pages of each copy printed in order or not.)
5. Click on OK.

Kraken botnet re-emerges

A June 30th article in SC Magazine notes that Kraken, a large and difficult-to-detect botnet that peaked in 2008 and was dismantled by early 2009, has returned, and according to researchers at Georgia Tech Information Security Center, anti-virus providers are having little luck detecting, preventing and/or removing it.

The Kraken bot malware uses a common technique to avoid detection, known as obfuscation or packing, whereby the malicious portion of the program code has been made to appear as seemingly benign data. The technique, used by most modern malware today, is intended to prevent traditional AV from being able to recognize the malicious portion of the code or detect the threat. This effort appears to be working successfully.

As of last June, the Kraken bot malware is reported to be poorly detected by the top three AV companies (Symantec, McAfee, Trend Micro), which hold at least 70 percent of the AV market, meaning the majority of users are not protected from this threat even with up-to-date AV software.

However, Paul Royal, research scientist at the Georgia Tech center, said that in late June, he ran a sample of the malware through VirusTotal's online virus and malware online scanner and it was not detected by either McAfee or Symantec.

"McAfee and Symantec probably detect older versions of Kraken, but the VirusTotal results clearly indicate a dearth of detections for recent Kraken samples," Royal said.

Symantec's Talbot added that Kraken relies on a large numbers of unique malicious files to evade detection, and is a "prime example" of why traditional signature-based solutions are no longer enough to catch all threats.

According to the Georgia Tech center, the botnet reappeared in April and as of late June, was made up of more than 318,000 unique IP addresses, or about half its 650,000 maximum size in 2008.

Machines infected by Kraken malware primarily are being used to send spam, and a single mem-

ber of the botnet is capable of sending more than 600,000 unwanted emails in a 24-hour period, he said. All of the spam is promoting male enhancement or erectile dysfunction products.

We assume that AV providers will eventually get a handle on this, so it's another reason to keep your AV up-to-date.

Microsoft sees jump in XP attacks

Computerworld noted on Wednesday that Microsoft had seen more than 25,000 attacks leveraging one of the critical bugs fixed in July's monthly security patches. Successful attacks secretly install malicious software on the victim's machine, often a program called Obitel. Once Obitel is on a PC, it enables other malware to be loaded, such as malware that can log keystrokes, send spam, or perform other nefarious task.

To protect themselves from these attacks, Windows XP users need to install the MS10-042 update, released Tuesday, July 13th. More-recent versions of Windows such as Vista, Server 2008 and Windows 7 are not affected.

Another Neat Site - Electronic House

There are more neat sites out there than we could ever peruse or review, but here is one that's pretty neat – ElectronicHouse.com. If you are into home theater, multi-room audio/visual gear, neat TVs, DIY projects, and reviews of newer electronic gear out there, this is worth checking out. Topics range from 3D televisions to wireless outdoor speakers to Powerline Ethernet. If you can't get wireless to go where you need it TO, powerline ethernet can be used to carry your home network around the house using your existing electric wiring. It sure beats running a CAT5 cable across the house.

This Month in Our History

Just where does time go? This column is now three years old. It's hard to believe that I started this column in 2007. In that time, I have had the pleasure of reviewing the issues and concerns of our Group over the years since our inception. I only hope that you have had the same pleasure reviewing this history as I have had guiding you through it.

Since this column began, a very important thing happened: thanks to the efforts of members Diane Bentley, Elva Roy and Doug Gorrie, all paper copies of the *PC News* since 1982 were scanned and uploaded to our website. This means that if I say something here that interests you, you can go to the website and view the original copy of the referenced newsletter.

So let's begin our examination of the July 1985 and 1990 issues of *PC News*.

The July 1985 issue reported an overwhelming success of our first meeting at the InfoMart. Nearly 300 members attended the eleven SIGs. It was reported that nearly 70 new members were received this month.

Announcement was made of plans to establish a bulletin board system (BBS) for the group. This eventually happened and was a very popular benefit amongst the members.

Jim Janeway wrote an article named *Lotus Tips, Ltd* in which he gave several useful tips to establishing a spreadsheet, not only in Lotus, but in any other application. First, determine what your input is going to be: which numbers are constants, which are variables and which are assumptions. Finally, plan what your output should look like. Good advice in many life situations, but especially when building business spreadsheets.

By 1990, we had two or three monthly corporate presentations thanks to the efforts of **Timothy Carmichael**. Ashton-Tate made a presentation of d-Base IV version 1.1, Worldwide Technologies Inc. discussed the use of modems by PC users and IBM made a presentation titled *A new DOS Hardware/Software Product*. In each session, free product and discounts were given at member drawings.

In Prez Sez, President **Zack Porterfield** noted that we had 1,375 members at that time.

Reagan Andrews wrote a four-page comparison of graphics editors; *Arts and Letters*, *GEM Artline* and *Corel Draw 1.1*. For those with limited computing power, he recommended *GEM Artline*. A web search reveals nothing about this extinct product. For those with greater computing power, *Arts and Letters* was recommended for a fast 386 or 486 machine.

In *The Variety Store* by **Reagan Andrews**, the big talk was about the May, 1990 release of *Windows 3.0* and a variety of applications designed to work with the new Windows release.

Jim Hoisington wrote the 41st installment of his series *On Complexity* in which he noted that PC support was becoming a significant need as companies began to implement PCs throughout their operations. He noted that the PC support role had been projected to be filled by PC consultants working out of their home. Of course, this did occur and is still true today. Many of our members serve in this capacity and several of them serve as SIG

leaders, sharing their expertise with the rest of us. Major corporations, on the other hand, have generally chosen to have their own in-house cadre of IT support personnel. In addition to hardware and software troubleshooting, these personnel may attend to legacy business-critical systems.

A reprinted article from the February, 1990 National Association of Catering Executives' *NACE News* had some worthwhile advice for us today. It read:

10 Sure-fire ways to sabotage your Association

No one purposely sabotages a group which he or she has joined. But a glance at this list reveals ways to work against an organization without being aware of it:

1. Don't come to meetings.
2. If you attend, find fault with the work of others.
3. If you are ever asked your opinion, say nothing; afterwards tell everyone how things should have been.
4. Do no more than necessary. If a few persons work tirelessly, complain that the group is run by a clique.
5. Don't bother to help get new members.
6. Don't tell the leaders how the group can help you or achieve certain goals... but if it doesn't, quit coming.
7. When you attend a meeting, vote for one thing then forget about it after you go home.
8. Get all the benefits your organization provides... but don't make a personal contribution.
9. Agree to everything at the meeting, disagree later.
10. Talk about contribution but don't practice it.

There were over five pages of shareware and freeware reviewed by various members in the *Disk of the Month* entry. In most cases, DOS 2.0 or higher was required and some programs were beginning to require 386 hardware.

Mike Firth wrote an interesting review of *Microsoft Works*. At the time, *Works* could be bought for about \$100, much less than major competing office suites. While he found many reasons to dislike *Works*, he concluded that it was worth the \$100 street price.
