Can we keep up with all of the new camera models available every month? I would say no and perhaps this isn't important either. Today's low-end cameras have these new gadgets developed for quickly doing a function faster than we can do by resetting controls. However, this in itself will not make better pictures.

One new refinement is an attempt to eliminate the need for using a computer for post processing. Just do it all in your camera (its way) and send to your printer. It appears that some suppliers don't want you to use your computer editor at all, or your printer either. Just accept the camera's compromises; push a button; the camera orders prints for you. That's OK if you like to pay for simplicity.

Most importantly, we need to sift through new gadgetry to determine if we can afford a new camera every few months or yearly. These new models might make certain things easier to do.

I sort of like the great versatility with my dSLR cameras and for making precise adjustments which also match the current environmental situation. My photography budget then allows making bigger purchases once per year or so rather than swap out littler cameras throughout the year.

It is easier for me to take my larger camera and learn all of the features available for improving photographing. One can spend months though just learning how well a new lens can be made to perform.

On September 17, 2011, SIG Co-Leader Larry Linson will continue our series on handling data in Access with "Moving Data Into and Out of Access", covering both manual import and export of different types of data and programmatic transfer of data. Transfer may be to or from other common software, in that software's file format, in binary or

text, or in defined formats for specific proprietary software, either in that software's format or a generic file format. The first topic of the day will be manual Import and Export as performed by an end user of Access. From there, we will proceed to other related topics on importing, exporting, and working with files, as time permits.

On August 20, 2011, SIG Co-Leader Larry Linson presented "VBA: Working with Windows Files". We only scratched the surface of the input-output functionality that's included in the Visual Basic for Applications (VBA) programming language supported by Access. Topics included: Opening and closing a file, modes of working with files, reading data, and writing data.



This Month in Our History

Yankees, who must like mosquitoes and black flies, laugh at our Texas summers but now we're entering the fall season, one of three seasons we moved to Texas for. Soon, the sensible Yankees will come for the winter. Go figure.

Anyway, let's take a look at the September editions of PC News from 1986 and 1991 as taken from our website.

By the way, I've decided to quit this column after fifty installments. I tried valiantly to catch our former president, **Jim Hoisington** with his *On Complexity* series but I yield to his tenacity. I encourage you to simply visit the Newsletter section of our website to see what was happening back when we all started this tremendous adventure.

In September 1986, there were two special presentations by vendors. The first was by Certified Software, Inc who presented their Certified Accounting III package. The second was by Data Access Corp of Miami, Florida. They presented DataFlex, a relational database offering speed, flexibility and ease of use. No mention was made of giveaways at either presentation.

Speaking of **Jim Hoisington** as I did earlier, he had another installment of his On Complexity series. Jim wrote of the increasing complexity of PCs from the original 4.77 Mhz to the then about-to-be-released, 80386 machines. Jim noted how some clone makers simply used a copy machine to make the motherboard masks for their units, based on the IBM design. Of course, some fidelity of design was lost in the process resulting in increased failures especially as operating speeds were increased.

In an article, *Nerd on the Street*, the writer noted a then-recent survey of computer-related company CEO salaries and reported that John Woodhull of Logicon, Inc was the highest paid executive at \$1,312,636. How things have changed since 1986!

The September 1991 issue reported that Microsoft Corp would make a vendor presentation on its Visual BASIC program. There would be a drawing for free products.

Richard Terreo wrote a review of the by-then ten-year-old book, *IBM's Personal Computer* published by Que Corporation. He noted that the original IBM PC was released on August 12, 1981. Believe it or not, Apple Computer Corp took out full page ads in the *Wall Street Journal* saying "Welcome IBM." Apple president Mike Markula said the IBM PC was "the legitimizing of the microcomputer industry."

Reagan Andrews had another installment of his *The Variety Store* in which he noted the flurry of acquisitions and mergers at the time with Novell merging with DRI, Borland acquiring Ashton-Tate and rumors of more activity yet to come.

Jim Hoisington wrote the fifty-fifth installment of *On Complexity* in which he dealt with the problems of various software licenses and positing a more user-friendly approach.
