A great image capture seldom requires any editing except for sizing. Whether we are using a 10 megapixel cell phone or flat camera or larger

cameras, even large view cameras with film backs, we compose and plan our formal pictures the same way.

The advent of digital cameras doesn't change pre-capture techniques. Digital only makes our shoots more economical and faster. Although my greatest enjoyment with photography is with large prints, I, like everyone else, have smaller cameras for daily use. We should spend some time to learn the special characteristics, shortcomings, and methods for achieving the most out of the newer and more popular camera sizes.

Whether we are using Photoshop, Paint Shop Pro, Gimp, Google, or perhaps other excellent imaging editing products, come join our SIG as we learn, share, and enjoy improving the effectiveness of our captured and created images.

Do we need a photo editor with our present everyday snapshots? Well, most people don't. Our popular cameras have evolved considerably within the past few years. Among the enjoyable changes are the dSLR (digital single lens reflex), which has improved quality and reduced costs. The prosumer cameras have given us many features for near-professional quality. A new series of compact cameras has developed into high image quality image capturing and at a much smaller size and reduced costs than the dSLR. Also, there is an amazing improvement in image quality with those ultra thin shirt pocket cameras and cell phone cam-

eras.

With these improved tools for snapshots, many of our present users just ignore any editing concepts. Why bother when we can directly transfer (or thru our personal computers) the images to the Internet and email? These pictures have already been enhanced somewhat as they convert our captured image into the JPEG format. These images look better, have more detail every year, and we will just expect continued improvements to be made.

Now that we have quick and easy photographs, what are the benefits for importing these into our imaging editor? For one, you may be amazed how those 'good' pictures you view on the camera monitor can look better when transferred to your computer. Several flat cameras and cell phones of today have an image that is enlargeable, cropped, customized, and may well work into your social club's newsletters. Get with it and build a collage and prepare images for e-Bay, Amazon.com, and other money-making systems.

Of course, we will include in our monthly meetings editing of high-definition images from larger cameras as well as those popular economy series devices.

Whether you would like to refresh your techniques or learn from scratch – bring your questions and comments to our SIG meetings.

We will even speak the language of: layers, masks, filters, vectors, and curves. It's easy though if we take them one at a time.

On November 19, 2011, "Remembering – Oh So Easy", about using Access as an adjunct to memory by end-user queries and by automating the procedure using basic developer techniques. Larry points out "You don't have to be old to forget things, but you can use Access to refresh your memory." Our sample database's acronym is **ROSE**, but there's more to the name than that... look for the short article of that name in this month's North Texas PC News.

In October, 2011, SIG Co-Leader **Larry Linson** continued our series on handling data in Access with "**Moving Data Into and Out of Access**". We looked at storing inside Access information from an external file and recreating that external file from the stored

information, an approach that works regardless of the file's format (and we do not even have to know that format), and stores it in what is called a **Binary Large Object** (appropriately enough, abbreviated as **BLOB**). An example database has been uploaded to the "Files" section of our SharePoint site. Download it and give it a try!

Coming attractions: We solicit your suggestions for topics.

- VBA: When, where, and how to use it (we are covering some of these topics right now)
- More about the look and feel, and the features and functions, of Access 2010.

As part of my job search, I have been boning up on PivotTables in Excel 2010. They have become more automated and some features are subtle. Now, you can create a sophisticated report without using a single formula or function. Simply using a mouse and making menu choices gets the job done.

Once the report is complete, changes are also just a click or two away. Add or limit calculations as you go. It can be really impressive if you are used to digging for your answers. So I am preparing to show some of what I have learned. If an attendee has a more pressing concern, we will address that before we move on to my prepared material.

HTML (formerly Microsoft Expression Web) — 10:00 am

A number of years ago, Microsoft decided to drop its popular Front Page web site design tool and introduce Expression Web. Since then, I have been learning Expression Web and making presentations about web page creation using it.

Over time, Microsoft has introduced several new versions of it and they are now up to version 4. Over the same period, a lot has changed in the world of web site creation tools and technology. We are ramping up now on HTML5, and Microsoft has introduced several new technologies for the web; namely, MVC and ASP.NET Web Pages. The latter technology is being promoted via a new, free product called Web Matrix. Web Matrix, as well as MVC, has a technology for web pages called "Razor syntax". This syntax is used to "program" web pages by accessing data bases and perform various actions on a web server.

What I am proposing to do with the Expression Web SIG is make a shift in emphasis. We will still talk about Expression Web when appropriate, but now, I plan to focus on foundational web site technologies such as HTML, CSS, and the Razor language. At the same time, I will be looking at how certain tasks can be carried out by PHP, since there are a lot of interesting parallels between Razor and PHP programming for web pages.

So, the “Expression Web SIG” will now be called the “HTML SIG”. We will cover a lot more than HTML (like CSS, JavaScript, ASP.NET, AJAX, & PHP), but the simple name will suffice for now.

Over the coming months, we will look at how to properly structure a web page using modern concepts for web site design. We will use both Web Matrix and Expression Web as the basic tools for editing pages (If I had Dreamweaver I would use it too).

To build web pages from scratch it is important to have a good understanding of HTML and CSS. With this foundation, we can then launch into studying HTML5 as well as incorporate things like Javascript, jQuery, AJAX, ASP.NET Web Pages, and PHP.

My approach has, and will continue to be, laying a foundation over multiple sessions rather than just presenting single topics about what is hot and new. I am trying to develop understanding and skill in web site creation and will present what I learn over the course of this venture to promote this goal. Things are coming at us fast, but the basics are still important to understand.

If your interest is to develop skill in building HTML web sites (as opposed to using frameworks like DOTNET Nuke or WordPress) and want to employ these new technologies, please come to our SIG.





Tips and Tricks – Digital Photography

SHOULD WE BE LOCKED IN WITH RAW PRE-PROCESSING?

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CAMERA PRESETS

When you leave your house, studio, or office – do you preset your camera to take advantage of spur-of-the-moment candid? I have an alternate setting philosophy; one for formal photography, and another for non-specific activities.

We have previously discussed the following settings several times in their simple form –

- AUTO camera setting
- SELECT FUNCTION – Program, Time, Aperture
- ISO=800 for reasonable film sensor speed.
- ISO 200 for cleanest detail and where higher speed may not be desired
- Aperture for typical depth of field requirement.

Let's add another preset criteria – RAW vs. NO-RAW.

I don't use RAW where the highest setup speed and shooting recovery time is necessary (soccer game, race track, etc.).

My alternate preset uses RAW for the formal outings default... just in case a person captured at the event may happen to show up later in highly desired use list.

RAW Benefits

RAW benefits are about the same now as they were ten years ago except perhaps their pre-processing is now easier to achieve. If we have been coerced into using RAW capture settings on our cameras for everything then we need to look closer into what RAW entails. If you have a \$1,000 and higher priced camera and take pictures of formal events and scenery for resale, you may leave your capture setting to RAW + JPEG. Some fanatics urge one to forever and always use RAW as a setting. Now, for those low-priced compacts and cell phone cameras – does RAW mean anything to these users? You bet! Stay tuned in.

All digital single-frame cameras of today utilize RAW as this being the name given the data from the digital sensor. High-end cameras give users the option for outputting RAW for use with separate image editors. This option is not available with low-end cameras and cell-phone cameras (but don't despair).

Ten or more years ago we were told that we cannot take full advantage of our digital image sensors unless we use RAW along with separate conversion software and make results into TIF or whatever native format the advanced photo editor requires. This 'advantage' statement is only partially true and depends upon camera vintage and quality. Since digital cameras all take their RAW image from photo sensors that have partially altered their original output they are then further manipulated by proprietary software in the camera to make the sensor outputs ever so much better. Since this is a proprietary treatment, some cameras are considerably better and more complete with this exercise than others. This is important for us users to realize when upgrading and advancing our future photographing arsenal.

Use of RAW data has been constantly improved from sensor output to camera intern pre-processing to assembly as it converts information; into refining the JPEG image; to preserve much of the 12-14 bit characteristics and the 8-bit image information. You will notice this JPEG image in a photo editor may look much better than the image from the outputted RAW data. (See! You guys and gals with those smaller cameras (and those using JPEG for their final edit) that the non-RAW results are not bad at all as the salesman had told us.

RAW IS EASIER TO MANIPULATE (NOW)

People (like us) have wondered why we should spend hours after a photo shoot just getting the pictures ready for final viewing and cleanup. Well, there was just a lot to do and furthermore – it is constantly changing as each update to camera software and all model changes require updates for RAW processing. Adobe Photoshop just had a lot for us to do. Then along came Adobe's Lightroom which acts as a wonderfully efficient front-end eliminating a lot of prior time with Photoshop. Less time is now used for editing and more for taking photographs. Oh, yes – Lightroom is self standing and many use it and go on to Photoshop.

Well, understanding the complexities of having several versions of RAW for several makes of cameras – I'll just use the RAW converter manufactured by my camera and the one matching my present updates. These work best.

Attention those with lower priced cameras. Those most reputable camera makers have continuously improved RAW and its conversions to JPEG. That's one reason why you see a much better image every year or so even with the same pixels in end file. Use the highest quality JPEG setting and dare your neighbor make a better looking print – your printer or mine.

WHAT DID YOU SAY RAW WAS?

There is one big name in the photo camera industry and you can believe it's Kodak. Kodak is not this biggest camera maker anymore but they make money off of their many patent royalties for digital devices. When we take an internal look of the workings of almost every single digital camera today we are coming to task with the Bayer Interpolation Filter a Brice E. Bayer/Kodak patented device that defines why and how we use a blue sensor, a red sensor, and two green sensors to make one color pixel. Well, this is what is done because it works that way. Perhaps, digital still cameras could have used one red sensor, one blue sensor, and one green sensor like movie cameras do but (likely the cost) didn't. Scanners use three separate colors also. Now that you know there is apparently one more green sensor that seems normal – perhaps you can better understand that RAW is a very complex system and that's good enough for me to go with the camera maker and his camera computer software to select what's best for my imagery.

ABOUT SMALLER CAMERAS

When we get down to the nitty-gritty and what can take the best pictures – here is the lineup (bearing in mind external editors may be used with all) –

- dSLR
- o same sensor – RAW of JPEG
- o select optimum lens
- compact and higher quality small cameras

-
- o computer fine tunes RAW for best JPEG available
 - when larger than 8-1/2 x 11 prints required use film camera
 - o fine-tune with digitized file from scanner

The above assumes there will be proper lighting available for very small cameras.

If you want to do more photography and perhaps more editing – then you can well just accept the Bayer Interpolation and that there are fewer sensors than you imagined as each sensors assembly uses a monochrome sensor and one-at-a-time use R, B, and G filters with it. I'm going back to the users' manual for camera and editing; at least until we get a full set of R, G, and B sensors per pixel.

Keep up the good work with emphasis on either editing or capturing photos. We should learn both but take time for emphasizing one. More on user techniques in forthcoming issues.
