This month's topic is Envelopes, Labels and Mail Merge.

Formatting – The Paragraph Group

In April, we started a discussion of the Paragraph Group on Word's Home tab. We covered two commands – bullets and numbering. At the May meeting, we talked about the remaining commands in the Group. Here is what we covered.

What do you use to create a complex outline? You use the Multilevel List command. (No, this is not a pyramid scheme.) This command too has multiple groups, which are Current List, List Library, List Styles and Lists in Current Document. By now, you know the difference between Current List and Lists in Current Document. Right? If not, refer to our April session.

What is the difference between defining a new multilevel list and new list style you ask? The Define New Multilevel List command allows you to create and use a list style for your current document. It is available in previous Word versions. The Define New List Style command lets you define and save a multilevel

list to a template so the list can be used in other documents. When you name your multilevel list, it shows in the List Styles group. This is a new function. Because it creates a style, when you change the list style every instance of that list is updated in the document.

If you want to create a style to use in multiple documents, start with selecting Define New List Style on the menu. At the top of the screen, give your style a name. Near the bottom, select whether this style pertains to just your current document or if you want to add it to the new document template. Next, click the Format button and select Numbering in the dropdown menu. The Modify Multilevel List dialog box opens, which is the same as selecting Define New Multilevel List in the Multilevel List command.

Now whether you are defining a multilevel list for one or multiple uses you are in the same dialog box. You can define up to nine levels for your list or outline. Click on a level and go to the Number Style for This Level dropdown menu. Here you can select numbers or letters, plus bullets, pictures or symbols. Above that in the Enter Formatting for Number field, you can change the appearance. For instance, you may want to add a word before the character or you may want a period and not a parenthesis after the character. In the Position section of the dialog box, you can set indents for each level separately or you can click on the Set for All Levels button to define indents just once. In the right column find Link Level to Style and make a selection in the dropdown menu. Note there are nine Heading styles to coincide with the nine list levels.

In the Paragraph Group, there are Indent commands for use on lists or text. If you quickly want to move your list or text in or out, use the decrease or increase commands. Otherwise, open the dialog box where you can specify how much space you want for indentation. Also, in the dialog box you can specify different indentation for the first line vs. hanging lines in the Special field dropdown box. Notice the preview screen at the bottom of the dialog box to

help you determine if you like your selection.

If you want to choose from a few standard line spacing options, click on the line spacing command where you have six options between one and three lines. If you want to specify your spacing, open the dialog box where you can enter how many points before and after each line and if you want single, double, one and a half, etc. line spacing. Again, notice the preview screen at the bottom of the dialog box to help you determine if you like your selection.

Line spacing default in Word 2007 is 1.15, which I know some of you do not like. Therefore, in the Paragraph dialog box in the Indents and Spacing tab enter the spacing you do like and click the Default button at the bottom. A window pops up saying you are about to change the default and asks if you want to change the setting for the NORMAL template. Select Yes, if you do want to change the defaults for your current and future documents.

The Paragraph dialog box also has a Line and Page Breaks tab. The Widow/Orphan control in Microsoft Word is a feature that prevents single lines of paragraphs from appearing on a separate page from the rest of the paragraph (a widow is the first line of a paragraph left by itself and an orphan is the last line left by itself). The Widow/Orphan control will automatically keep two lines together on a page, shifting them as necessary when you add or take text away from the document. Use Keep With Next to keep one paragraph on the same page as the next paragraph. You can prevent Word 2007 from splitting up the lines of a paragraph between two pages with Keep Lines Together. Force a page break before a specific paragraph with Page Break Before. You can make any of the line and page break options your default in future documents by clicking the Default button at the bottom of the dialog box.

Other commands in the Paragraph group handle text alignment – left, center, right and justify.

Another command shows or hides paragraph markings. If you click the command

and you still see markings, check the Display section in Word Options in the Office button. If any box is checked under Always Show These Formatting Markings on the Screen, uncheck it so the markings are hidden.

The Borders command allows you to add a variety of borders to a cell/word, paragraph or table. There are multiple border options on the menu. If you want additional features within a border, such as shading, select the last option in the menu. Here you can select the style of line, for instance dashes instead of a solid line, line color and line width. In the Page Border tab, you can add shadows or 3-D effects to a box. In the Shading tab, you can select a specific color, gradation or pattern for a box.

The Paragraph Shading command adds color to text you have highlighted.

You don't have to create lists in Excel or some other program so they can be sorted. Word has a Sort command. You can sort text, numbers and dates in ascending or descending order. If you are sorting information in a table, you have up to three columns by which you can sort.

If you are interested in creating envelopes and labels or doing mail merge, join us on June 25 at 10 am.

This Month in Our History

Well, there certainly was enough devastation around the country due to spring storms and tornadoes. Fortunately for us, the Metroplex was spared the kind of destruction that occurred elsewhere. And we observed Memorial Day signaling that we are now into summer.

This month, we will glance through the June '86 and '91 issues of *PC News* which can be found on our website.

In the June '86 issue, **Dick Gall** wrote a software review of IBM's Writing Assistant. He noted it to be a no-frills, not overly zippy, user friendly application. Writing Assistant was a basic word processing program that was reported to be well integrated with the other PC offerings by IBM at the time and it was WYSIWYG (What You See Is What You Get.). This was a major leap forward for DOS programs of this era.

In an article titled *The Elusive "Producer"*, **C. J. Handlogen** wrote of the early failure of micro computers to live up to their potential in being adopted by producers – Handlogen postulates a dichotomy of two groups; producers and gamers. The gamers he said were in thorough adoption of PCs while businesses were slow to adopt this new technology. While we arguably still have two basic groups of PC users, as identified, it can hardly be said that business has yet to adopt the desktop PC. By Handlogen's definition, gamers are those who relish the challenge of hardware setup, software setup and subsequent troubleshooting. Sounds like a regular propeller head to me.

Seventeen SIGs were reported on, the vast majority have long ago faded into history.

Tom Mack reported in the HAL PC Newsletter that NEC had developed a new 8088 chip that outran the Intel version by some 50%-70%. It seems Intel at the time was building chips using NMOS (N-channel Metal Oxide Semiconductor) technology while NEC made a leap forward to CMOS (Complementary Metal Oxide Semiconductor) technology. CMOS chips use approximately 15% of the power consumed by NMOS chips. Of course, all chip manufacturers later moved to CMOS and then the battle came over the nanometers of the chip's striping.

Fred Williams had a second article titled *Introduction to RS-232*, in which he detailed the steps and procedure necessary to build your own RS-232 communication cable. Detailed connector layouts were provided.

In the June '91 issue, **Jim Hoisington** wrote installment #52 in his series *On Complexity*. In this installment he noted how early computer programming consisted of hard wiring tabulator machine boards to determine how punch card entries would transfer to machine registers.

In *Variety Store*, **Reagan Andrews** wrote that IBM was responding to market pressure to reduce the retail cost of its OS/2 product from \$350 to \$99.99. At the same time, Compaq was under pressure to reduce prices of its products to something closer to the prevailing market. Prior to then, Compaq had enjoyed a reputation for very high prices for quality hardware. And finally, more than a few software producers were offering attractive price discounts to users of competitors' packages. Truly was a time of overall market demand for lower prices.

Fred Williams wrote an article titled *We Ain't There Yet* in which he noted that applications were getting progressively more complex, yet documentation was getting progressively less exhaustive. Pretty good rant, Fred.

Fully 36 SIGs were scheduled each month, nearly double what we have today but many of those SIGs covered hardware or software that is no longer available.

Ages in Years and Months (Excel)

Many times in early childhood education, a child's age in Years.Months format is needed for reporting, admitting, and evaluation. Basically, this format shows the number of elapsed years and months since birth, separated by a period.

There are several ways you can go about getting the desired age. The formula you choose to do the work depends, quite literally, on your preference in formulas.

Assuming that you have the birth date in cell A1, you might think you could use some math on the date to determine the proper information. For instance, you might think that you could use this formula:

=NOW() - A1

This produces a value that is the difference between the two dates, but if you then apply a custom format ("yy.mm") to the result, you'll find out that it doesn't give the sought-after Years.Months. You get something close; the years are right, but the months vary from 1 to 12 when they should vary from 0 to 11. (Somebody can be 12 years and 0 months old, but it is not proper to say 12 years and 12 months old.)

This means that you need to start casting about for a formulaic approach. A simple formula would be the following:

=YEAR(NOW())-YEAR(A1) & "." & MONTH(NOW())-MONTH(A1)

There are many variations on the above, but the problem is that they all only look at the month of today compared to the month of the birthdate; they don't take the day of the month into account. What is that important? Because the number of elapsed months since birth is dependent on how the day of the birth month compares to the day of the present month, and the formula doesn't allow for that distinction.

So, you might consider a more complex formula that actually tries to calculate elapsed years and months, such as the following one:

=TEXT(INT((NOW() - A1)/365.25),"##0")& "." & TEXT(INT(MOD(NOW - A1,365.25)/31),"00")

This comes much closer to what is needed, but it is still possible to be off by a day or two right around the time of the month when the birth day is approached. Closer still is a formula which uses the YEARFRAC function:

=ROUNDDOWN(YEARFRAC(A1,TODAY()),0)& "." & ROUNDDOWN((YEARFRAC(A1,TODAY())-ROUNDDOWN(YEARFRAC(A1,TODAY()),0))*12,0)

The best (and simplest) formulaic approach, however, is this one:

=DATEDIF(A1,NOW(),"y") & "." & DATEDIF(A1,NOW(),"ym")

The formula relies on the DATEDIF function, which determines the difference between two dates. The value returned by the function depends on the third parameter passed to the function. In this case, the first invocation of DATEDIF returns the number of elapsed years and the second returns the number of elapsed months. It provides the most accurate results of any of the formulas discussed so far.

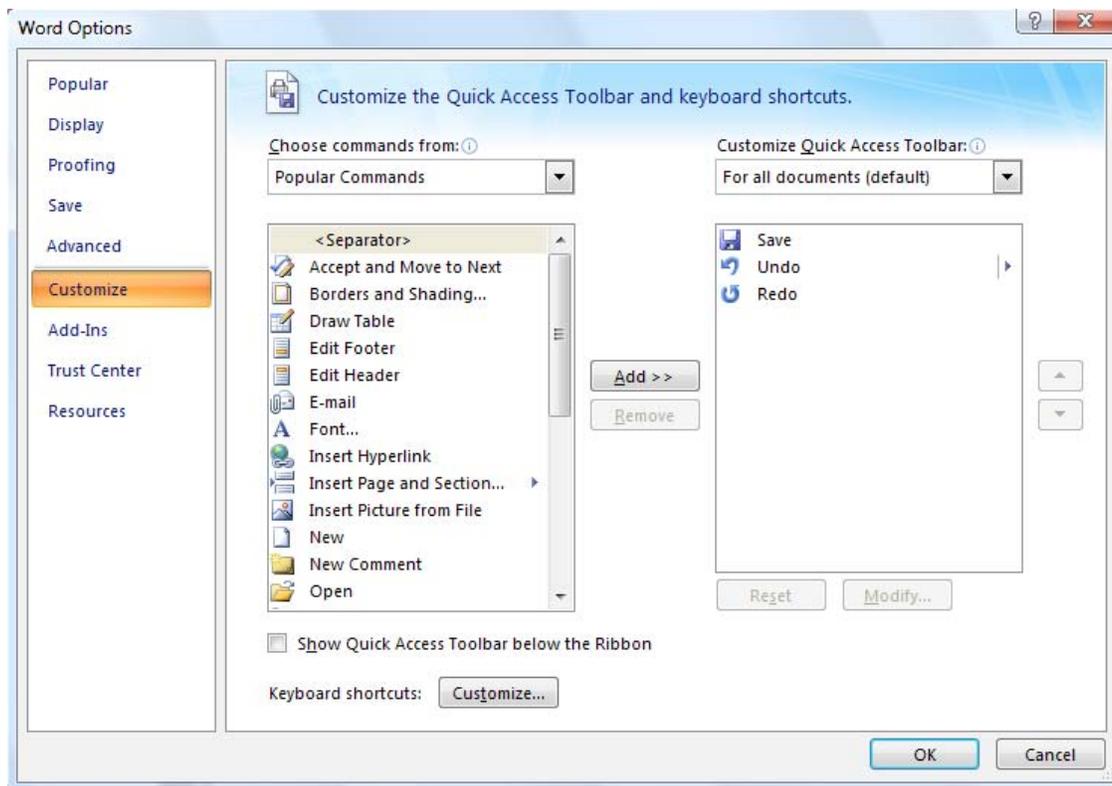

Customizing the Quick Access Toolbar (MS Word)

The Quick Access Toolbar is the area just above the ribbon, at the top of the screen, and just to the right of the Office button. The Quick Access Toolbar includes three tools that allow you to save your document, undo an action, and redo an action. You can, however, change the tools that appear on the Quick Access Toolbar. To customize this toolbar, follow these steps:

1. Display the Word Options dialog box. (In Word 2007 click the Office button and then click Word Options. In Word 2010 click the File tab of the ribbon and then click Options.)
2. At the left side of the dialog box click Customize (Word 2007) or Quick Access Toolbar (Word 2010).



The Customize area of the Word Options dialog box.

3. Using the Choose Commands From drop-down list, specify what group of commands you want listed in the dialog box.
4. In the list of commands at the left side of the dialog box, select the one you want to appear on the Quick Access Toolbar.
5. Click the Add button. The selected command is copied to the list at the right side of the dialog box.
6. Repeat steps 3 through 5 for any other commands you want on the toolbar.
7. If you want to remove any commands from the Quick Access Toolbar, select the command at the right side of the dialog box and click Remove.
8. When you are satisfied with the list of commands, click OK.

Your newly customized Quick Access Toolbar should be visible and usable at the top-left of your screen.
