She delivered AV support from her iPad to a projector that showed the audience an image of her iPad screen. cell phones with built-in photography can provide a full need for many amateur photographers.

Before digital we learned film characteristics and after digital we learn image sensors.

With all our digital photography learning, we still have our basic photography techniques like formatting, positioning for emphasis, and making your end image tell the stories.

- copying a file just until specified text is encountered (*to obtain a manageable-size test data file*)
- eliminating extraneous information such as page headers, page footers, and footnotes,
- initial 'cleaning' of unformatted or incomplete data (perhaps old records), and
- extracting and loading the data into an Access table.

1. queries an SQL Server database for some data

2. creates a CSV file from the SQL result set
3. creates an Excel spreadsheet from the CSV file
4. performs various Excel formatting steps
5. saves the spreadsheet as a standard XLSX file, and, finally
6. sends this file as an email attachment to an email address that automatically saves the spreadsheet on a SharePoint page.

We have a *stellar lineup of Access MVPs, Access Test Team, and seasoned Access developers!*

This annual event is an evening filled with a series of 15 – 20 minute presentations to demonstrate favorite tips, techniques, tools and strategies. The majority of the time will be invested in demos and discussions so that our members can incorporate these techniques into your projects. Tips and Tricks – Digital Photography

Turning Back The Clocks

Calumet Photo Store

What are those once-great film camera makers and photography equipment sellers doing since digital photography has come of age? Where would you turn to if you suddenly needed some old style well-trusted cameras, equipment, and supplies for use or backing up an existing setup?

An example of one of these great oldies is Calumet Photo, a premier long-time source (www.calumetphoto.com). I used to receive their huge mailer catalogs and these proved a great success for obtaining my equipment and supplies and provided tutorial information for capturing, processing and using specialty items. I contacted Web sites to discover what this type of suppliers are doing in today's market.

With *CalumetPhoto* opened and instead of displaying their once familiar graphic film cameras and high-end processing – it opened to other than the Calumet brands.

As I browse thru, first seen are three views of Canon EOS 7D digital camera kits listing from around \$1,900 to \$2,100. Whoops! Where are the huge selection of their once famous view cameras and processing supplies?

Opening their Shop Online pages provides nine categories of products opening with currently designed digital cameras. These pages show digital SLR models, medium format, and other digital cameras.

For the very enthusiastic photographers and professionals – the medium format then begins with: Hasselblad, Phase One, Mamiya 645 AFD (body only for \$4,409, digital back \$33,000). Other brands range from a hefty \$40,000 down to \$20,000. Selecting premium optical glass for these quite heavy lenses still give major threats to anyone's budget with lenses often costing three or four times that of the cameras..

If you are still in the market for heavy-duty versatile film processors, film, and even today's modern replacements, there are still reputable enterprises like this Calumet offering to offer you versatile sources and also that grand ole nostalgia associated with time-proven tools that we are not ready to give up. But don't expect to see them on the front pages anymore. Look for them to follow into at the end or under special requests for information.

Do I still believe in photographic film? You bet! With all the advantages of digital systems there are times when size of finished product alone dictates not using this medium. If I were to look for a digital sensor pack - something to fulfill the need for a film pack larger than 35mm, I would try renting one for a short period. If the film pack is even larger (8" x 10" I'd definitely consider film and if very large – consider nothing but film). I still know of a place in Dallas where the film back on their special (stationary) camera is around 8 feet by 20 feet (can you visualize the amount of hypothetical digital pixel sensors this could require if replaced?).

DxO FilmPack 3.2

DxO Labs believes that we should love those oldish styled film looks of legacy photography. This *FilmPack* is their latest edition of conversion from the *crudeness* of digital to the softness

of analog in apps for you to buy, use, and share images with others having a liking for this here kind of stuff.

I kind of like to invent new and exciting ideas and innovations on my own whereas DxO applications programs make it real easy to mimic and copy the venerable looks of decades old film prints into your newest creations; software which faithfully emulates film appearance on your digital images. (Your favorite image editor may just accept these apps directly as plug-ins.)

DxO does not just make things to make you look and feel older but they have other tools to make your drab images look like they were taken on a sunny day. Its specialty is to have most any photo image change by a mood simulator thus making the image fit into almost any desired mood of choice.

If you'd rather not take the shortcut and decide to do it yourself, I'll bet most of you can create these alterations with your own versatile editors. However, DxO Labs does it quicker and easier like being almost effortless. Another way to look at it is to see what several different mood changes or film simulations fit the ideas you wish your images to emulate. How about an ebulator? I do not know about this (bubbling boiling appearance) but there sure are several emulations to whet your fancies.
