Microsoft Access SIG —11:00 am

Larry Linson, co-Leader of the Access SIG, will present a quick review of using Visual Basic for Applications (VBA) code to clean up formatting of data in a text file, so it will import properly into Access. One of Larry's friends periodically receives data, extracted from public information, to be "cleaned" and imported for use in her clients' business.

Far more frequently than they might expect, there's some change in the formatting of the data – in this case, additional "precision" was added to one of the fields that contains a date. We'll discuss some options for working with this issue, and why a particular approach was selected. The solution, implemented in VBA, illustrates identifying and reading a text file, modifying the data, and writing a new text file to be imported.

We'll also discuss "obscuring test data for privacy". The test data for this demo originated as data on a public website and we wouldn't want anyone to be embarrassed or exposed to identity thieves.

In September, 2013, NTPCUG member and regular attendee of the Access SIG **Dal Jeanis** continued his discussion of Access databases,

the standards they must follow, and issues he has encountered – with *Eating the Elephant, Part 2*. It is always instructive to learn the constraints under which developers have to operate, the issues they encounter, and the solutions they apply. Dal says he will have more for us in the future, and we are looking forward to it.

Since May 2013, when we surveyed attendees on their Access issues, we have been addressing users' particular concerns about their databases. Not every issue applies to every attendee, but many are more widely applicable than is immediately apparent. Today's subject is not one of our attendees issues, but it is a real-life situation that Larry assisted in resolving. We'd be happy to add your database and issues to our list.

Why you should join us: If you have an Access application and need some guidance, assistance, or just encouragement, come to our meeting and let us know. If you have a need for a computer application, we may be able to help you determine whether Access is the right software to use. If you just wonder what Access database software is all about, we may be able to explain. We can't teach a class in just one hour per month, but we will discuss issues, perhaps solve some immediate problems, and identify resources you can use.

Microsoft Application Development Study Group SIG - 1:30 pm

This Saturday, and for the foreseeable upcoming SIG meetings, we will be examining ASP.NET MVC 4. This development platform seems to be the one Microsoft has settled on (at least for the present time), and it presents a rather different development paradigm.

This SIG series will consist of a guided tour through an introduction to MVC 4 concepts and techniques by doing a hands-on development of an MVC 4 website, including installing the website as an Azure (cloud) site.

Rather than re-invent tutorial information, we will use material already available on the web. The value of the class is that you can learn a new development process best by working through

examples, and by the interaction with other persons in the class doing the same project. Our experience has been that most learning in this field is of a secondary or tertiary nature, and not as a result of a brilliant presentation.

We will use a full-blown edition of Visual Studio 2012 as the primary product for our demonstrations; however, the project can be done using Visual Studio Express 2012, which is available as a free download at http://www. microsoft.com/visualstudio/eng/products/ visual-studio-express-products.

Please bring your laptop or tablet (Chris) with either Visual Studio 2012 or Visual Studio Express already downloaded. If you aren't able to do this, consider working along with someone during the hands-on session. I can guarantee that 1) you will learn quite a bit and/or 2) be guite entertained by the experience.

of Mail Merge in Word 2010. If you have been thinking about sending out holiday cards, but are not looking forward to getting writer's cramp - come to this session! We'll cover how to access information from various sources and use only what you need. We will also discuss how to print on different size labels and envelopes. Did you know?

During the September class on Tables, members learned they can sort text, numbers and dates in a Word table. Once the table is setup, a context sensitive menu for Tables appears with design and layout options. On the Layout ribbon is a function for Sort. Sorts can be ascending or descending. You can sort up to three columns. Word even wants to know


if your sort includes a header row or not, just like in Excel.

In addition, members also learned they can enter formulas in a Word table, just like in an Excel cell. It will calculate a simple SUM of a list of numbers. It also does COUNT, IF, TRUE or FALSE, AVERAGE and ROUND, just to name a few. Formulas for Tables is found on the Layout ribbon when the context sensitive

When and Where to use Compact and Repair (Aug 2013)

Compact and repair is commonly used to resolve or avoid database bloat -- which is mostly associated with tables and data. Some people use the feature "compact on close" to run the process every time the database is closed. However, this may be excessive and actually lead to problems. A judicious approach is to structure the database to avoid bloat and to put temp or work tables in separate files.

Your preferences and experiences may vary, but some recommendations include:

- Schedule compact and repair of data files based use and size. Make a copy of the file before running C&R, and keep the backup for a specified period.
- If a user file becomes corrupted, replace it; why risk undue complications? Space is cheap, so keep a zipped copy of user files and just swap in a fresh file when needed.
- If you need local work or temp tables, put them a separate local database. The tables or entire file can be replaced before or after use -- depending on the business needs.

These techniques can be mixed and modified to best suit the scenario at hand.

Renew Your NTPCUG Membership For "FREE"?

The Board has established a new NTPCUG benefit that permits renewing of memberships without the usual membership fee.

Simply put, any member that writes three articles for our newsletter, subject to the following criteria, can renew without cost. In this manner, we are encouraging our membership to share their expertise with other members, as well as providing an opportunity for members to research issues and share the results with others.

The current requirements for the program are as follows:

- 1. You must be a current member.
- 2. Requires at least three articles/year, submitted during the member's current membership year.
- Articles must be at least a couple pages long in the newsletter, excluding any pictures, diagrams, etc. NOTE that the length is determined after editing, if needed.
- 4. Longer articles may be broken up across two months, and consideration will be given to counting it as TWO articles. However, length by itself may not count as more than one it's meaningful content we're after.
- 5. Articles must be submitted at least two weeks prior to publication to allow time to review/edit. However, if the content is clean and readily understood, and requires only minimal review, and we have time to go over it, we might take it with less notice.
- 6. No plagiarizing, except for "small" amounts where credit is given to the actual author or source.
- 7. Articles must be relative to the goals and topics of our User Group. If in doubt, check with the Editor before writing it up.
- 8. At time of membership expiration, it is the member's responsibility to contact the Editor to request that their membership be extended, and list the months in which their articles appeared. We will confirm the details and have the Membership chairman extend you another year.

Please give this new program some thought, and come up with some good material we can use. Share your knowledge, in line with our motto –

"Share what you know, learn what you don't."
