In **October and November, 2013**, to accommodate attendees' interests, we've postponed the planned presentation, a quick review of using Visual Basic for Applications (VBA) code to clean up formatting of data in a text file. We've now deferred that presentation until sometime in 2014.

Holidays - Are You Expecting A Package Delivery?

Packages stolen off porches is very common all over this time of year. Here are a few tips that might help your package reach its final destination.

- If you are home when packages arrive, retrieve them immediately.
 - If you will not be home, consider having the delivery carrier hold the package at their local facility (e.g., UPS store) until you can pick it up.
 - If you must have the delivery shipped to your home and cannot be there, consider having a trusted neighbor retrieve the package.
 - Send the package to your work or the home of a trusted friend or relative who you know will be home when it arrives.
 - Request that your package be marked "signature required" to require that the delivery person stand by until you're available to retrieve the package.
 - Use a company that provides a tracking service and check online to see when your package is scheduled to arrive.

When and Where to use Compact and Repair (Aug 2013)

Compact and repair is commonly used to resolve or avoid database bloat -- which is mostly associated with tables and data. Some people use the feature "compact on close" to run the

process every time the database is closed. However, this may be excessive and actually lead to problems. A judicious approach is to structure the database to avoid bloat and to put temp or work tables in separate files.

Your preferences and experiences may vary, but some recommendations include:

- Schedule compact and repair of data files based use and size. Make a copy of the file before running C&R, and keep the backup for a specified period.
- If a user file becomes corrupted, replace it; why risk undue complications? Space is cheap, so keep a zipped copy of user files and just swap in a fresh file when needed.
- If you need local work or temp tables, put them a separate local database. The tables or entire file can be replaced before or after use -- depending on the business needs.
- These techniques can be mixed and modified to best suit the scenario at hand.

Renew Your NTPCUG Membership For “FREE”?

The Board has established a new NTPCUG benefit that permits renewing of memberships without the usual membership fee.

Simply put, any member that writes three articles for our newsletter, subject to the following criteria, can renew without cost. In this manner, we are encouraging our membership to share their expertise with other members, as well as providing an opportunity for members to research issues and share the results with others.

The current requirements for the program are as follows:

1. You must be a current member.
2. Requires at least three articles/year, submitted during the member's current membership year.
3. Articles must be at least a couple pages long in the newsletter, excluding any pictures, diagrams, etc. NOTE that the length is determined after editing, if needed.
4. Longer articles may be broken up across two months, and consideration will be given to counting it as TWO articles. However, length by itself may not count as more than one – it's meaningful content we're after.
5. Articles must be submitted at least two weeks prior to publication to allow time to review/edit. However, if the content is clean and readily understood, and requires only minimal review, and we have time to go over it, we might take it with less notice.
6. No plagiarizing, except for "small" amounts where credit is given to the actual author or source.
7. Articles must be relative to the goals and topics of our User Group. If in doubt, check with the Editor before writing it up.
8. At time of membership expiration, it is the member's responsibility to contact the Editor to request that their membership be extended, and list the months in which their articles appeared. We will confirm the details and have the Membership chairman extend you another year.

Please give this new program some thought, and come up with some good material we can use. Share your knowledge, in line with our motto –

“Share what you know, learn what you don't.”

More Crime Prevention Tips
