On March 14, the United States government announced that it would hand over control of DNS maintenance and the assignment of new global domains to ICANN (Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers). Under the current system, ICANN works under the auspices of the Department of Commerce's NTIA (National Telecommunications and Information Administration). The government doesn't normally play a strong role in internet governance, though it has taken action from time to time.

FoxNews reports, "The decision ... has raised concerns that, in the void left by America's transfer of oversight, other nations that don't share the United States' commitment to free speech and expression could make a grab at Internet influence."

FCC Commissioner Ajit Pai said in a statement. "If I am not convinced that a different governance structure would preserve Internet freedom, I will strongly oppose it."

Robert Atkinson, president of the Information Technology and Innovation Foundation, wrote, "While on the surface this may seem like a simple administrative

Chris Morgan will make presentations on the “Basics of Microsoft ADO.NET” for the April and May meetings of the .NET/HTML SIG. Included in this presentation is the development of a Windows Form application which shows the contents of any SQL database.

This application has two grids on it. The top grid presents a tabular format of the rows (records) in a SQL table. The user can scroll both vertically and horizontally through the table, much like a spreadsheet. Any cell can be edited and it will automatically be saved back to the underlying database. The bottom grid on the form shows a list of all the tables in the database. By highlighting a different table and clicking on a button on the form, the top grid will change to this selected table.

Another feature of the application is the ability to sort the rows by clicking on a column title. Additionally, if the user selects a cell on the grid, clicking on yet another button will automatically filter the rows and show only those with the same value. For instance, if you are showing an address list and you click on a “City” cell having the value “Dallas”, then only those records for people in Dallas will be displayed in the grid. If you click on a first name of “Robert”, then you will see only the Roberts who live in Dallas.

Another part of the demonstration will focus on how you can link to a variety of databases other than SQL Server. These include Access databases (Extensions of MDB and ACCDB), SQL Server Express “dynamically attached” databases (MDFs), Microsoft SQL Server Compact Edition datafiles (SDF extension), and even Excel spreadsheet files (XLS and XLSX).

These other databases are accessed through a different, but related, set of .NET classes. The three class types shown will be: SqlClient (for MS SQL Server), OleDb (for Access and Excel files), and SqlServerCe (for SQL Server Compact Edition files).

A review of all the major .NET classes will include the following classes: SqlCommand, SqlDataAdapter, SqlCommandBuilder, SqlDataReader, and SqlException. These classes are a part of the “namespace” System.Data.SqlClient. The corresponding classes will be used from System.Data.OleDb and System.Data.SqlServerCe.

We will also unravel some of the mysteries of “Connection Strings” by showing a variety of examples.


The presentation will involve a mixture of lecture about ADO.NET and example code demonstrations.

Whatever we don’t cover at this meeting, we will continue to discuss this topic at the May meeting.

We will continue downplaying low-cost point-and-shoot cameras. For a beginner, these might make do as a social camera but really - your cell phone will do that. We will monitor costs as we go along as the hardware alone may be minimal while service fees to get where you doing what you want may tend to hurt a budget.

Taking a step up places us in the range of the compact camera. This model size assimilates good photos up to 8 x 10 prints under most circumstances.

When we step up to the newer mirror less full-featured cameras - we can sort of do everything up to a point. These may not be as versatile as the full DSLR. The largest pitfall here is these models didn't just remove the pentaprism and mirror but too often remove highly desirable features.

Here is where our new modern technologies are beginning to shine with a small light-weight DSLR that is easy to carry with new reduced physical sized. Lenses and bodies are designed to mate with the smaller image sensors. You will be restricted to smaller sized files (lesser pixels) which are perhaps 1/4 size of full-frame cameras. This reduction in overall pixels is equal to or better than the compact models and for most applications the use of these images will be quite adequate.

Take note that there are several conditions requiring full-frame (35mm sensors). Take note: depth of field, enlargement capabilities, better control of glass manufacture, and plenty more. However, the full-frame is much heavier (especially with the long lenses); will not fit in the largest pocket, and the price (ugh!) is 4 to 10 times higher priced.

Photo editors have not altered much with the new camera technology. There are still reasons to edit outside of the camera. One not often considered is to capture the image and wait a day before looking it over blown up on your computer monitor. Now, put it away because what you have seen is still fresh in your mind. After three days, you can look at the image and not see a fresh memory on your mind. Now you can better assess, correct, and do whatever may be necessary to convert good image to great image.

Just like camera selection, we should not go for the highest priced do everything editor, unless of course, you have a job at plant where everyone uses that one particular editor. What you need is to start moderate with low-cost down to free for your editor. You will learn more - providing you did get one that will do all of your cutting, shaping, and fine tuning. Now if you are ready to expand, learn (definitely) layers and methods to cut and paste and replace eyeballs if necessary. Remember your buddies that may be using the Mac, the Linux, or the Windows machinery. You all might get together and still share with several software models but don't make this a firm requirement as you must remain comfortable with your system.

As a minimum, everyone needs at least a simple editor. You may get the minimum coming free with your camera purchase.

One word of warning. Beware of freebies. Someone has to pay for these. You may get one and find that there will have a full inbox of things to buy resulting and not all of these will be within weakest perceptions of image processing.

Come on in to our class and tell us how you solved your problems. If so, we'll give you ours.

On **April 5, 2014**, co-SIG Leader **Larry Linson** will talk about the ***Elements of Access Queries***, focusing on what queries are, what kinds of queries there are, and what different kinds of queries can accomplish – and the underlying language of queries ***Sequential Query Language (SQL)*** and the fact that behind the scenes, opening a Table in datasheet view is accomplished with an SQL query. Access Queries in the user interface are just another graphic way of looking at the SQL. A few of the features of SQL that are supported by the Access database engine, for example, union queries which append tables of the same structure together, cannot be generated through the user interface and must be coded directly in SQL.

In **March, 2014**, **Sue Williams** demonstrated her personal database for keeping track of memorabilia, which she accesses (no pun intended) through the end-user interface of Access 2013. She posed some questions about Queries and we worked through one simple Query.

Our discussions, demos, and Q-and-A sessions have been well-received by the attendees for the past few months. We'll soon discuss whether we'd like to plan ahead for some structured presentations, as well. Larry has a presentation on VBA topics that he's postponed because most of the SIG attendees who'd benefit weren't present, just waiting for an appropriate audience. It's been suggested we might enjoy a presentation of database products competitive with / alternatives to Access, such as Alpha Five and FileMaker Pro (if we can find a member or acquaintance knowledgeable about FileMaker). The set of alternatives with a user interface is somewhat limited, but that's a defining characteristic.

We offer many thanks to SIG Co-Leader **Jim Wehe**, Assistant SIG Leader **Neel Cotten** and Assistant SIG Leader **Kathy Lee Brown**. Jim's been a gracious host and leader, Neel has raised some provocative questions, and Kathy has been a mainstay in our technical discussions, providing advice, and answering questions.

Coming soon: Because *Microsoft's* recent emphasis on many products appears to be "everything in the cloud" and because most of our SIG attendees use *Access* as it comes "out of the box", for individual, workgroup, and client-server database applications, we are going to deal with the state of the current *Access* client. That would include an extensive list of features and functions dropped from the "client side" of *Access* 2010 and 2013.

Also, *Access* is part of the package in *Office 365* (software as a service) as is *SharePoint*, so we want to explore how using *Access* linked to *SharePoint* lists in the 2013 version of *SharePoint* in *Office 365*. Interestingly, *SharePoint* lists are now implemented with SQL Server. Could a combination of this type be the answer to networking for an organization just a little too small to implement their own network? Perhaps we can explore.

Why you should join us: If you have an *Access* application and need some guidance, assistance, or just encouragement, come to our meeting and let us know. If you have a need for a computer application, we may be able to help you determine whether *Access* is the right software to use. If you just wonder what *Access* database software is all about, we may be able to explain. We can't teach a "course" in just one hour per month, but we can discuss issues, advise on immediate problems, and identify resources you can use.

Valuable prizes: The Microsoft organizations, or Microsoft-sponsored organizations, who have been so good to provide us prizes in the past have been shut down or reorganized and, it appears, are not going to be providing those nice prizes. So, until we find a new source of prizes, or a "sponsor",

prize drawings will be “occasional” when we get something to give away. With different versions of Office being used by SIG attendees, copies of the databases used in demos aren't as useful as they once were, though the tables may transcend version differences. **Databases as old as Access 2000 can be run in newer versions.**

Wondering if you need business insurance? Feb 2014

We've had this topic come up in the past, so I'll take this opportunity to share some excerpts from a discussion where George Hepworth shared some of his knowledge based on his experience of writing training materials for an insurance company. Things to consider:

1. There is a difference between commercial general liability coverage and Errors & Omissions coverage.
 - a. Commercial liability coverage protects against things like starting a fire that destroys a customer's premises. However, it will not pay nor provide legal defense if when sued for defects in software you deliver to that client.
 - b. Your E & O coverage will protect you against lawsuits for things like failure to deliver the software you contracted to provide as well as defects in that software.
2. Every business (likely) needs commercial liability coverage; professionals providing services may also need Errors & Omissions (E&O).
3. Personal liability coverage typically excludes any claims arising out of providing professional services; you need commercial and E&O coverage regardless of whether you have any personal coverage.
4. At times, the legal defense provision of liability coverage can be at least as valuable as the indemnification provision. That's because the insurance company will either:
 - a. Pay a claim (up to the limit of insurance) on behalf of a policyholder when it deems the claim to be valid, or
 - b. Provide legal counsel to defend the policyholder if it deems a claim to be invalid. The amount spent on such defense can be considerable and is separate from and in addition to any judgment amount awarded against you by a court. That's good and bad, of course. There is an incentive for the insurance company to minimize its overall costs (defense + indemnification), so the insurer may settle a claim against a policyholder rather than drag it out in court while the lawyers' fees spiral. The indemnification amount is often less than it would cost to go to court, where you'd still risk losing the case—and have to pay the claim-- anyway after incurring huge legal bills.
5. If a client requires you to provide proof of insurance, it might be good to clarify whether they are interested in general commercial liability or E&O coverage. The former won't help you if your database causes loss of income due to inadequacy in design or development. The latter will.

Renew Your NTPCUG Membership For “FREE”?

The Board has established a new NTPCUG benefit that permits renewing of memberships without the usual membership fee.

Simply put, any member that writes three articles for our newsletter, subject to the following criteria, can renew without cost. In this manner, we are encouraging our membership to share their expertise with other members, as well as providing an opportunity for members to research issues and share the results with others.

The current requirements for the program are as follows:

1. You must be a current member.
2. Requires at least three articles/year, submitted during the member's current membership year.
3. Articles must be at least a couple pages long in the newsletter, excluding any pictures, diagrams, etc. NOTE that the length is determined after editing, if needed.
4. Longer articles may be broken up across two months, and consideration will be given to counting it as TWO articles. However, length by itself may not count as more than one – it's meaningful content we're after.
5. Articles must be submitted at least two weeks prior to publication to allow time to review/edit. However, if the content is clean and readily understood, and requires only minimal review, and we have time to go over it, we might take it with less notice.
6. No plagiarizing, except for "small" amounts where credit is given to the actual author or source.
7. Articles must be relative to the goals and topics of our User Group. If in doubt, check with the Editor before writing it up.
8. At time of membership expiration, it is the member's responsibility to contact the Editor to request that their membership be extended, and list the months in which their articles appeared. We will confirm the details and have the Membership chairman extend you another year.

Please give this new program some thought, and come up with some good material we can use. Share your knowledge, in line with our motto –

“Share what you know, learn what you don't.”




