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## Prez Sez



There are many different types of data sources that we can use, and we need to know something about each of them.


From simple text files to XML, Excel, databases and the Web, data is coming at you in a variety of formats and it helps to be able to recognize how to use each of these formats.

Developing better speed capabilities can make improvements that allow for faster auto focus, control of hue, reduce delays between exposures, make effective HDR less prone to error and so much more.

Early issues of mirrorless cameras with interchangeable lenses had lengthy delays for setups and between shots. Much of this was due analyzing data and painting images on a monitor. On **July 19, 2014**, we plan three segments of our meeting:

- In the first segment, SIG Co-Leader **Larry Linson** will moderate a discussion of our plan for the SIG, in the form of an “About the Access SIG” brochure / pamphlet, documenting a bit of history; the original stated purpose, which still holds: “we will learn Access together”, some limitations on subject matter to be covered (no ‘web apps’), demonstrations by members and guests of Access databases they use; discussion and demonstration of Access developer tool software, related office software, and of competing products; addressing attendees’ questions and problems; and planned presentations for the near future.
- In the second segment, we will solicit questions, problems, and issues that attendees have with Access and attempt to answer or suggest sources for answers.
- In the third segment, if time permits, **Larry** will continue our discussion (perhaps augmented with some projections or demonstrations) of the **Elements of Access Queries**, focusing on what queries are, what kinds of queries there are, and what different kinds of queries can accomplish. Where possible, demonstrations will use actual data donated by our attendees.

**NTPCUG Member Susan Williams**, after her successful demonstration in **March, 2014** of her personal database for keeping track of Martin Luther King Memorabilia and other historical items, donated a sample of typical data items for us to analyze and use in our examples. **Thank you, Sue.** We’ve had comments from other attendees about how interesting they found your discussion of items in your da-

tabase (the data you were showing). **We encourage attendees to see if they have Access objects, especially data tables, that they can and will donate to the cause.**

From SIG Co-Leader **Larry Linson**: We offer many thanks to SIG Co-Leader **Jim Wehe**, Assistant SIG Leader **Neel Cotten** and Assistant SIG Leader **Kathy Lee Brown**. Jim's been a gracious host and leader, Neel has raised some provocative questions, and Kathy has been a mainstay in our technical discussions, providing advice, and answering questions. I also thank each member and guest who has attended, brought questions, and added comments – without you, there'd be no need for our SIG.

**Why you should join us:** If you have an Access application and need some guidance, assistance, or just encouragement, come to our meeting and let us know. If you have a need for a computer application, we may be able to help you determine whether Access is the right software to use. If you just wonder what Access database software is all about, we may be able to explain. We can't teach a "course" in just one hour per month, but we can discuss issues, advise on immediate problems, and identify resources you can use.

**Valuable prizes:** Prize drawings, a fixture of the Access SIG since 1993, will be "occasional" when we get something of value to give away. With different versions of Office being used by SIG attendees, copies of the databases used in demos aren't as useful as they once were, though the tables may transcend version differences. And, databases created in older versions (at least as old as Access 2002 and Access 2003) can be imported and run in newer versions. **Databases as old as Access 2000 can be run in newer versions.**

# Digital Photography – Tips and Tricks

## **Wedding Photographer Wannabe? Part Two**

Part One of the series provided an introduction and how tips have evolved through the years. Wedding photography strongly documents social lives as it documents this divine partnership of wedlock beginning a strong element of permanence.

When we launch wedding photography as a new enterprise or just helping solve the budgets of close friends and relatives, this activity will cost a substantial sum. When I was learning the necessities involved and progressing to the point where I knew what I was doing right, there was notice of this outstanding intangible asset. One that offsets the substantive buildup costs and even shines above making a nice profit. This delightful and comfortable intangibility is the overpowering beauty throughout. The bride is having her finest coiffure and is wearing her exquisite gown. The groom may not have worn a necktie for months, but on this day he is the best dressed and most handsome gentleman of the day. Just about everyone in attendance is looking extraordinarily beautiful or handsome. Friends and relatives are all decked out in their finest. This outstanding display of a once in a lifetime grandeur also becomes a great pleasure just to be a part of the event.

Oh, oh! Are we jumping ahead too rapidly? Aren't individuals allowed to have their own nemesis and not be perfect in all other's eyes? Well yes, that is so but on this day – the bride is right and is forgiven for those tantrums and perhaps insinuations against you and the other help. Let it be said that this is her day. (Tomorrow, it's back to near normal and you no longer accept it was all your fault that she stepped on her own gown and tripped getting into the limo.)

You will still continue to feel great about being a part of this success.

When a contract (or friendly family agreement is reached) one has a master checklist to ensure order is maintained throughout until delivery of goods and payment received. For those beginning wedding photographers getting experience, you will likely find yourselves doing everything including being advisor. You may have an advantage here.

You must visit the locations so you will know your way around, who's in charge of the facility, and what are the established rules for the church and officials. When you go to look the sites over you should bring a camera along. A point and shoot setup is in order as the family might say they want a picture at that lovely exit. Yes, and as you look where the bride and participants pass through, the predominant standout must not look like this.

**[do not overlook signage]**

**EXIT**

**USE IN CASE OF FIRE**

**or PUT TRASH HERE**

We work around and note positioning so as not to artistically legitimize those ubiquitous objects. Be sure your assistant is aware of this observation.

Find that grand aisle where the parading will follow. Arrange a firm spot for you, or better yet, your fine assistant so as to have this position reserved for allowing a perfect lens eye view of each

individual in the show.

You will need a long lens for yourself to be out of the way for the ceremony and yet capture all pertinent details. NO CLICK-SILENCE!

The cost effectiveness of modern digital capture now shows itself. With your fast recovery camera setups, quiet operation, no cost for deletes, and possibly protection against an eye closing. Take duplicate shots—just in case.

Have you learned how to use HDR (High Dynamic Range)? It may work wonders on a few of those group shots or when a wide range including objects and scenes are important with the subjects.

We have taken so many shots with our older cameras and even with fast film we required a flash. You may too! As a point of interest, I remember the last time I shot over a hundred images at a single location. Each was taken with very high ISO (digital sensor speed) and the color was fine, no blurring, and minimal delay between shots. You will need to check out your gear to ensure it is advanced enough for this, otherwise you will need flash. (Did the Priest or minister edict that there may be no flash during ceremony?) I trust you are constantly checking out your cameras' limitations.

One fine advantage to using existing light and high ISO settings will allow eliminating those troublesome shadows caused by the flash.

The wedding cake cutting ceremony is a must for documenting. It often may end up in an awkward spot for everyone. See if this can be worked out early.

Bride gets her cake, groom gets served his by bride. Great!

Now for the no-no! Some people love to see cake shoved in brides face and bride smearing cake all over that grooms black coat and tie. It should be your duty to never suggest such antics. Don't insinuate its existence. We don't want to instantly create an irate bride and groom. Let's keep all happy and showing love. Now is a great time to bring the starring couple closer to the dance floor.

About that [first dance](#) –

The band may not know better that this number one dance is for the newlyweds. Afterward they can bring family and others into the dance. (Send assistant to make sure band knows who is on first. You rush in and get the time-honored shots of B & G and fathers and mothers.

The dance floor will then get very crowded but get as many happy couples as you and your assistant can. Wander around and get those charming guests at their dining tables too. Did you get acquainted with a couple of guests close to the newlyweds. Ask them just who we had better not leave out.

That garter toss is often cute. It is unpredictable though. You and your partner just align yourselves to catch that elusive projectile looking for the next bride-to-be.

The third issue will get into finances, profits, unsavory persons working to steal pictures without payment. Also, low-cost protection against lawsuits and non-payment. You may also look for those mistakes yours truly made which you can avoid.

Updated digital cameras are emphasized along with photo techniques. Those ever important check lists are numerous and will be documented as attachments on our Digital Photo Web Page.

Remember, the inherent beauty working with a wedding shoot does provide us with that tranquility of being a part a wonderful event.

# Renew Your NTPCUG Membership For “FREE”?

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The Board has established a new NTPCUG benefit that permits renewing of memberships without the usual membership fee.

Simply put, any member that writes three articles for our newsletter, subject to the following criteria, can renew without cost. In this manner, we are encouraging our membership to share their expertise with other members, as well as providing an opportunity for members to re-search issues and share the results with others.

The current requirements for the program are as follows:

1. You must be a current member.
2. Requires at least three articles/year, submitted during the member's current membership year.
3. Articles must be at least a couple pages long in the newsletter, excluding any pictures, diagrams, etc. NOTE that the length is determined after editing, if needed.
4. Longer articles may be broken up across two months, and consideration will be given to counting it as TWO articles. However, length by itself may not count as more than one – it's meaningful content we're after.
5. Articles must be submitted at least two weeks prior to publication to allow time to review/edit. However, if the content is clean and readily understood, and requires only minimal review, and we have time to go over it, we might take it with less notice.
6. No plagiarizing, except for "small" amounts where credit is given to the actual author or source.
7. Articles must be relative to the goals and topics of our User Group. If in doubt, check with the Editor before writing it up.
8. At time of membership expiration, it is the member's responsibility to contact the Editor to request that their membership be extended, and list the months in which their articles appeared. We will confirm the details and have the Membership chairman extend you another year.

Please give this new program some thought, and come up with some good material we can use. Share your knowledge, in line with our motto –

***“Share what you know, learn what you don’t.”***




